Department Added to riculum Last Year Proves Popular

A department of commerce was organized at Eastern in the fall of 1926 for the purpose of training commercial teachers for the high schools and private schools of Kentucky. It has had a phenomenal growth since that all courses during the year was about

The first semester only Shorthand, occupied by the manual training in Typewriting, and Accounting were ofthe basement of Memorial Hall an- fered. For the second semester, Business Law was added. Many new courses are planned which will place the department on a plane with other colleges having such departments. Among these courses are Salesmanship, Marketing, Banking and Bank Accounting, Secretarial Practice, Business Organization, Business English, Teaching Commercial Subjects.

Eastern has had a number of calls for commercial teachers the past year URGED but had no students ready to go out. Several are preparing for positions next year. A certificate will be issued upon the completion of two years' work in Commerce which will permit the student to teach in any high school in the state and recognize by most other states.

Salaries for teachers follow, very largely, the law of supply and demand. Considering that Commercial teachers can command larger salaries than any other class of teachers considering the training required. 


