FRESHMEN BEWARE: Math course now mandatory

Academic advising

Each student who has declared a major is assigned an academic adviser in the department which offers the major. The adviser must be consulted before the student can register for the next semester and drop or add a class. Students who are undeclared are assigned an adviser by the Office of Undergraduate Studies in Keith 121.

The academic advising office will help you locate your adviser in case you forget who it is or are having a problem getting an appointment. This office also has information about your placement tests and assignment to developmental courses.

Finally, if you decide to declare a major or to change your major, stop by this office to fill out the paperwork and learn who your new adviser is. Call 2265 or visit Keith 129.

Drop-Add/ Withdrawal

In order to drop or add a class or to withdraw from a class, students must see their advisers to complete a drop/add form. The student must then take the signed form to the registration center in Combs to actually record the drop with the registrar.

Students may drop a class beginning Aug. 23. The last day to drop a full semester class without a grade of "W" is Aug. 29. After that date, a student has until Oct. 18 to drop a class with a grade of "W." Students must officially drop a class through the registration center or they will receive a failing grade for the semester. Partial

semester classes can be added up to the day the class meets and can be dropped through the halfway point of their duration.

Students who must withdraw from the university because of an emergency or illness should report to the Registrar's Office in Coates 15 or call 2410 to initiate the process.

New Telephone Registration

All students will have the option to register and drop/add classes for Spring 1997 by phone. Students can obtain information about their class schedules, housing, financial aid and grades using the Colonel Connection, 622-2020.

Library Services

The John Grant Crabbe Library has been expanded and renovated to include the old University Building, the oldest structure on campus. The name has also been changed to The John Grant Crabbe Library and Thomas and Hazel Little addition. In the basement are periodicals such as popular magazines and academic journals and newspapers from across the nation and the world as well as weeklies from across Kentucky. The basement also houses the University Archives and Special Collections.

The main floor contains the circulation desk and the reference

room and InfoTrac computers which provide quick access to popular and scholarly publications. Education majors can find materials for their classes in the Learning Resources Center on the third floor. The Law Library on the fourth floor has over 14,000 volumes in its collection including the Kentucky Revised Statutes and is intended for use in legal research.

The university has a computerized system for locating items in the library. The Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC), located in the circulation room of the library, allows the user to search for over 420,000 documents, including books, microfilm and microfiche. OPAC can also be accessed through the university's VAX system. (See Academic Computing on page 4.)

The Wolford K. White Law Enforcement Library, located in the Stratton Building, houses information relating to criminal justice, corrections, fire technology, security and loss prevention and traffic safety.

In addition, the Elizabeth K. Baker Music Library in the Foster Building offers musical scores, books, sound recordings, compact disks and videotapes.

NEW MATH REQUIREMENT

Starting this fall a three-hour mathematics requirement is being added to the general education requirements for students in baccalaureate programs. This is effective for all students in four year programs who first enter the institution in the Fall of 1996 or later.

Students whose major program specifically requires a three-hour math course will satisfy both the general education math requirement and the major requirement with the same course. The recommended course is MAT 105, others include MAT 106, 107.

Student Support Services NOVA Program #1047

Only the first 120 entering freshmen who qualify with an academic or economic need will be accepted into the NOVA Program. The NOVA program provides private tutoring, personal counseling, peer advising, study skills training, academic advising and financial aid assistance. The NOVA office is located in the second floor of the Turley House and is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

University Writing Requirement

You have to write an essay proving you can think and write at the same time before graduating from the university.

You must schedule the University Writing Exam after you have passed ENG 101 and 102 AND earned 60 hours or your dean will get on your case and eventually prevent you from enrolling for any other classes.

The computer center offers access to the Internet and OPAC.

Academic Computer and Telecommunicating Services (ACTS) offers a computing service located on the second floor of the Combs Building, providing access to computing equipment and services to students at no charge.

Students may use personal computers, software, laser printers and state-of-the-art equipment including scanners and plotters in the Micro Center in Combs 230.

In addition, the computing center offers access to the university's gopher server and the Internet through its VAX computer system with minicomputer terminals located in most residence halls, the library, many classroom buildings and the Powell Student Center.

To set up a free VAX account, fill out an application form in the computing center's offices in Combs 207, open daily from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

You will be assigned an account name and will select a password to access your account. You can send

and receive e-mail within the university by simply using the account name.

Outside the university, people can send you messages through the Internet by using your full address. The university will assign you a user name which is a combination of "stu" for student and the letters of your name. For example: STUGILLA@acs.eku.edu.

A computing center consultant is available from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily to assist students. They will also be available most evenings when classes are in session. The computing center publishes a quarterly newsletter called The Password which provides students and faculty with updates on computers. Subscription forms are in Combs 207.

HOUSING FAQ: Answers to everything you wanted to ask

Moving into a dorm for the first time can be scary if you don't know where to go for answers to your questions. The following are some of the important answers you will need to make your move into the dorm a good experience.

Q. Where do I find the rules that I need to follow while I am at EKU?

A. Rules that students must follow while at EKU are written in the Residence Hall Guide, the student handbook and other university publications. The Residence Hall Guide and student handbook will be provided to you on the day you move into the residence hall.

Q. How can I change rooms or roommates?

A. See your residence hall director for an authorized room change. Unauthorized room changes will result in an assessment of \$50 and each student must return to original room assigned to; each student will lose the privilege of a room change for the semester. Room changes are available on designated dates after the semester begins. In-hall room changes are completed by the area coordinator (hall director) within the hall. Inter-hall room changes require a trip to the housing office. The residents must then check out of their current hall with the resident assistant and then with the area or assistant area coordinator. Following check-out, the resident may check into a new room. See the calendar for deadlines.

Q. Can members of the opposite sex come to my room?

A. Guests of the opposite sex are allowed in your room from noon to midnight Sunday through Thursday. On Friday and Saturday nights the open house hours are extended to 2 a.m. The resident and guest must register at the front desk of the hall. Residents should also inform the front desk of any overnight guests of the same sex and complete a registration card. Overnight guests of the same sex are allowed the maximum of two nights.

Q. What is room inspection?

A. During room inspection, hall staff members check your room for fire, health and safety hazards. They also check for illegal items, such as alcoholic beverages, which are confiscated. Consult your student handbook for health and safety guidelines. Remember, your RA is required to give you 24 hour notice prior to room inspection.

Q. Where can I study?

A. Residence halls have designated areas for studying. Ask your RA or at the front desk where the areas are located. The Little Library is also available. Look for the library in the academic section for more information.

Q. How do I make local and long distance phone calls from my room?

A. If you are calling an on-campus number, dial the last four digits of the number. For long-distance phone calls, each student is provided with an AT&T Acus Service Card. To use this card, dial 9 + number you're dialing + your personal security code located on the card. Call 1-800-445-6063 if you have any problems using your Acus card.

Q. How can I get cable TV channels in my room?

A. All rooms have basic cable hook-up, including Lexington channels, USA, QVC and ESPN, for any cable-ready television. A deluxe package is available with 44 channels. If you want pay cable channels, American Cable Entertainment has an office in Burnam Hall and tables set up at other halls. For more information, call 623-6163.

Q. May I stay in my room during vacations and breaks?

A. All halls are closed for vacations and breaks, except for the Brockton apartments. Students from any residence hall may apply and register by the posted deadline for guest housing during a break period with the housing office. There is a daily charge to help defray the cost of staffing and utilities.

Q. May I request a private room?

A. Yes, however, most private rooms are filled by returning residents. Private rooms are allowed on a space available basis. The cost for a private room is approximately one and one half the cost of a double occupancy room.

Q. What is consolidation?

A. Consolidation is the process by which students in a double room without a roommate, who do not want to pay for the room as a private are able to be located in a new room. This process occurs and continues throughout the semester. Students receive a series of letters explaining the process and are requested to meet with an Assignments Staff member of EKU Housing to receive assistance. This process is necessary to provide for more efficient use of space within the residence halls. It allows for additional space to be used to meet students requests for private and special purpose rooms.

Q. What appliances are allowed in dorm rooms?

A. Microwaves, televisions, computers, hot air corn poppers, crock-pots or slow cookers, thermostatically controlled coffee pots, floor and desk fans are allowed. Appliances not allowed include: hot plates, toaster ovens, deep fryers, electric frying pans and any appliance with an open heating element. All appliances must be registered with the Resident Assistant. Registration information is provided through the hall staff.

Shuttle bus helps keep the tow trucks away

Beginning this year, students will be permitted to briefly park in employee lots adjacent to Martin, Ellendale, and Case Hall to move in. This will be in effect Aug 20-21.

Employees affected will be offered a shuttle bus from Begley lot to the Daniel Boone Statue from 7 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

All students must renew their parking permits. Vehicle registration is at the Keen Johnson Building daily from 8 a.m.- 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m.- 4 p.m.

Students must bring receipt for paid parking permit and auto registration.

Campus police will start patrolling employee lots Aug. 19 and student lots Aug. 30. At this time, tickets will be given for not having a valid parking permit.

Shuttle Bus

The ECU shuttle buses run scheduled routes each day along Kit Carson Drive, stopping at Case Lot, Daniel Boone Lot, Begley Lot, Ashland Fire Science Lot, Stratton Building and in front of the State Police Post.

Beginning Aug. 26, the buses will begin picking up at the Alumni Coliseum Lot at 7:45 a.m.

Shuttle van available for females after dark

Females have the option of calling for a shuttle van to pick them up and take them to and from their residence halls between 6 p.m. and 2 a.m. This service will begin Aug. 25.

The number for the nighttime shuttle is 2821. Phones are located in the Lancaster, Van Hoose, Alumni Coliseum, Brockton and Stratton (lobby) lots.

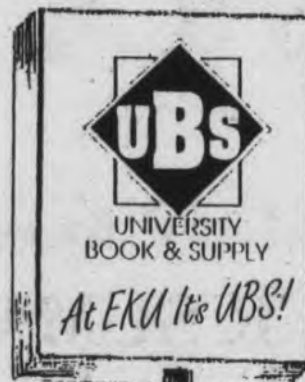

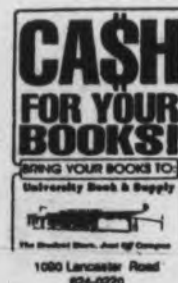
