Mr. Charles Boyd and Mr. Cutler Hisle were visitors in Winchester Monday.

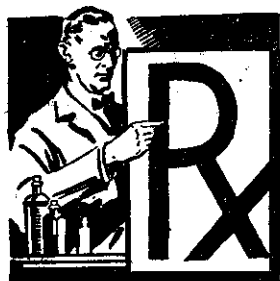

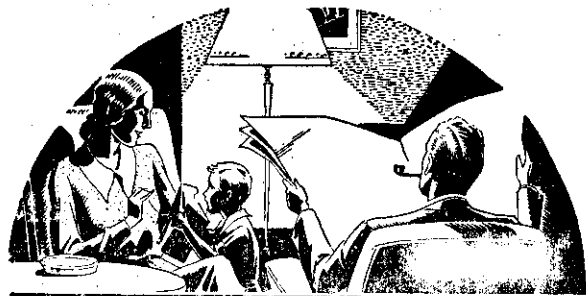

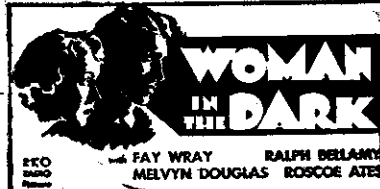
