We see them come and we see them go; a columnist's life on this paper is not very long it would seem. Oh, well, the reader can console himself with the thought that Sanders has gone to OCS at Fort Sill and will come back in May to take it out of the hide of his successor in person.

The title for this column announces its purpose better than any two paragraphs of words which might be written in this space could do; and believe me, I will ramble.

People ask all the time, when will the war be over? There is no reason for any one to ask any one else their opinion, for the asker is just as likely to have the right answer as the answerer. So, telling you before I begin that your guess is as good as mine, I venture to make a few predictions.

In Europe, the war will probably be over before the winter of 1944, but certainly not before the summer of the same year. The aerial bombardment of the German Empire will continue on the same mighty scale, and even increase, but the fact remains, that you can bomb every city on the continent, to dust and rubble, and still not occupy it as long as the enemy has sufficient ground force (which in the final analysis is the Infantry) to withstand open invasion. And, of course, until we have troops in Berlin, and the Nazi leaders in captivity we have not conquered. Look for the extensive continuation of the Italian campaign with large and fierce tank and troop battles at the Po river line when the Allies shall have taken that far north. Look for a landing in Yugoslavia; the landing itself to be near the Trieste-Fiume district, and a subsequent march to the forces of the Slavic patriots wherever they shall be when such a landing is effected. Look for simultaneous landings on the French coasts, at or near Marseilles, and the other gently sloping beaches of the French Mediterranean Riviera spots (Monte-Carlo and the other hot-casino spots are good prospects), and on the Atlantic coast near Bordeaux, and farther up the coast at Brest and St. Malo, and Dieppe, and the other places from which British troops had to evacuate not so long ago. At the same time there may be landings attempted in Norway and possibly Denmark; perhaps a strong force, but more likely merely a token force, will make an attempt at the coast of the Netherlands and Belgium. No matter how it is done, the invasion of the continent will be a military feat unparalleled in the annals of military history. We are waiting until our forces are ready and can strike together with such terrific force as to completely overwhelm the German war machine.

The South Pacific arena, and the conquest of the Japs, and the re-seizure of our own island possessions will take much longer; for the basic reason that every moment we hold off in striking the Japs in their own territory they are more completely assimilating and amalgamating their own vast holdings in their Eastern Co-Prosperity Sphere, and so with each passing day, are just that much better prepared to resist the forces of the Allied powers. It will be a struggle of the titans, and there will be several devastating sea battles until the Jap Navy is effectively annihilated. Only then will we be able to march to Japan proper; and treat it (forgive me!) proper!

Does that ramble? Oh, yes, the date on the end of the War—the final peace treaties will not be signed for many many years, but most of the fighting will be over by winter of 1946.

How's that for calling the trick?

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TEN ROTC JRS TO FORT SILL OCS SCHOOL

Juniors Leave Eastern

The ten ROTC Juniors, who were at Eastern, have been ordered to the Field Artillery Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and left Richmond November 30, 1943 for that station. Included are Cpls. Earl Gibson, of Portsmouth, Ohio; Billy Brashear, Irvine; Elmer H. Graham, Covington; Lloyd Hudnall, Paris; Jerome Keuper, Ft. Thomas; Thomas A. Love, Delbarton, West Virginia; Edsel Mountz, Clay City; Louis A. Powers, Brooksville; Gilbert Wilson, Paint Lick, and Ben L. Sanders, of Richmond.

These ten were called to active duty from Eastern last April 26, and completed fifteen weeks of basic training at the Field Artillery Replacement Training Center at Fort Bragg, N. C. Subsequent to that, they were five weeks at Ohio State University, and arrived back at Eastern September 20.

While at Eastern they were taking a special ASTP-ROTC course designed to prepare them for the type of work they would undergo at Fort Sill. Lt. K. M. Funchess has been attached to the unit to instruct the Juniors in advanced ROTC.

The Officer Candidate course now being taken at Fort Sill by these ten is scheduled to last seventeen weeks and upon graduation, and successful completion, the men will be commissioned second lieutenants of Field Artillery.

RYLE READS DICKENS WORK

"Christmas Carol" Read in Little Theatre

Elmore Ryle, Graduate Student of Eastern, read Charles Dickens' delightful and familiar "Christmas Carol" to a capacity audience in the Student Union Little Theatre, Sunday afternoon, December 5, 1943.

Mr. Ryle announced before he began that he would read the descriptive and explanatory passages of the story in the manner of an English gentleman, which he did.

He read the speeches of the various characters as if the characters themselves were speaking, rather than in the usual dry fashion of readers. There were times, however, when his interpretation of "Scrooge" had a slight tendency to sound like his well-known imitation of Mr. Roosevelt, and his "Marley" sounded at times a wee bit like Happy Chandler of Kentucky fame, rather than the English miser he was.

Photo Club Sees Demonstration of Color Printing

At the regular bi-monthly meeting of the Photo Club Thursday night, December 2, Mr. G. M. Brock of Eastern demonstrated the art of color photography. He showed some of his color prints and the club listened to his clear and most interesting explanation of how the prints were made. Mr. Brock brought along his own color camera and showed the club the main differences between it and an ordinary camera, the main one was that the color camera makes three negatives, each of a different color, when the ordinary camera makes only one. The club learned the general process of developing and printing the color shots. From the three different colored negatives, red-blue-green, the positive prints are made. The negatives are dipped in dyes of complementary colors and then transferred, one at a time, to white printing paper. The club enjoyed Mr. Brock's demonstration very much and wish to extend to him an invitation to join them again in the near future.

KO AND PREXY ATTEND MEETING

Jones, Noble In On Ohio Conference

Col. John R. Starkey, commanding the 3539th Service Unit (ASTP) and Capt. Earl T. Noble took part in an ASTP conference called by the C. G., 5th SA Command, at Fort Hayes, Ohio, November 30, and December 1, 1943. The conferees included the military heads and civilian heads of ASTP Unit schools in the Fifth Service Area Command, including Ohio State Univ., Western Reserve, Purdue, West Virginia State, Univ. of Indiana, Univ. of Cincinnati, and the University of Kentucky.

Discussions were of the future of the ASTPs, after graduation from the school unit—a small percentage to go directly to an OCS, and others to become highly rated (if they are highly qualified) in specialties in which they have demonstrated either a marked ability in, or a strong aptitude for; some will be selected for further training in special schools.

Graduates will be used in all kinds of engineering, including electrical, mechanical, and structural.

Those men who fail while in ASTP will be returned to duty with troops.

President William F. O'Donnell and Dean W. C. Jones sat in on the conference and traded curricula information and methods with other deans.

NEW ASTPS ARRIVE

Two Groups, Some to U. of C.

A certain number (actual number—restricted military information) of ASTP men left Eastern Kentucky State Teachers College, and were transferred to the University of Cincinnati Monday, December 6, 1943. But don't worry, girls, an equal (approximately) number of new men arrived, fresh from their basic infantry training at Fort Benning, Georgia, Wednesday, December 8.

The number of "old" and "new" men here now balance so that there will be what amounts to an "upper" and "lower" class of B.E.-1 (Basic Engineering). No indication has yet been given by the head of the Military Department that the upper class will indulge in the traditional function of upper classes, namely, the hazing of the lower class; in fact, the indication seems to be that hazing, as such, will not exist at all.

The new men are largely from the North and North Central states, in spite of the fact that they have just come from Kentucky's beautiful sister state of Georgia, so it will be necessary for all of us to make allowances for what may seem to us to be strange accents and ideas.

Several of the departing ASTP men who are now stationed at U. of C. have expressed in no uncertain terms their dislike to leave Eastern, and it is not editorializing too much to say that the new men will probably be just as "sorry" to leave here when their time for so doing comes.

The new arrivals will make possible a rotating and continuous class system, so that, as one group graduates, there will still be one class in attendance.

12TH ANNUAL "MESSIAH" PRODUCTION

Whatever is in human existence is valid because it is so, and we are in college to learn to accept that fact; all others are related to it. But since all in life is not the truth, we must first learn selectivity, which is one of the reasons you came to Eastern; because you thought that Eastern could best teach you to choose.

Learn as much as you can absorb, and learn to apply it, for you will need all the knowledge you can hold to see you through a whole lifetime.

TRAIN-CAR TRAGEDY

Seven people were killed and one seriously injured in a collision of an automobile and train at Pewee Valley grade crossing November 20. Miss Edith Ransdell, of Campbellsburg, a graduate in the 1935 class and for several years teacher in the Campbellsburg Consolidated School, was among those killed. Sgt. William Suter and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Suter were killed. William and Charles are brothers of Lt. John O. Suter (40) of Campbellsburg, now stationed at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo, but recently returned from almost two years of service in Iceland. Mrs. Sarah Stout Lee, an Eastern student in 1935-36 and wife of Ensign Henry Lee (37), on duty with the fleet in the South Pacific, was injured and is seriously ill in a Louisville hospital. Dr. J. B. Lukins, who was in law Mrs. Lainer Lukins (Katherine Holcomb, '37), is Mrs. Lee's physician.
