General Studies, Bachelor Degree

The General Studies degree program is designed for students intending to complete a <u>first</u> baccalaureate degree whose educational objectives are not aligned with a more traditional degree program. The Bachelor of General Studies degree is intended to establish the foundation for a lifetime of continual learning and offers flexibly scheduled highly individualized curricula. Through individualized advising, the program helps students define their educational goals and design interdisciplinary curricula drawing on a variety of course offerings. The program is also intended to allow a student who has completed most of the requirements of a major but has not yet completed the major of an approved program to complete a baccalaureate degree in a timely manner. Transfer credits from technical programs will apply to this degree; however they may not apply to other degree programs at the University.

In addition to the baccalaureate degree requirements on page 42 of this *Catalog*, the following are required for students seeking a General Studies degree.

- 1) Students must have 18 hours within an individual college outside of and in addition to General Education requirements to receive their General Studies degree.
- 2) Any courses ordinarily accepted for credit by Eastern Kentucky University may be chosen as hours to apply to the 128 hours required for graduation.
- 3) Students seeking a General Studies degree must have 60 credits from a regionally accredited institution which may include completion of an AA, AS, or AAS degree.
- Students pursuing a General Studies degree are not permitted to declare a double major, minor, or concentration.
- 5) Students may not declare General Studies as a subsequent degree after the completion of a baccalaureate degree at EKU or any other institution.
- 6) Students will be considered a member of the College in which they have their 18 hour major requirement.

The General Education Committee agreed to allow students to opt into the new general education program regardless of their term of entry to the University on January 18, 2006. As a result of this, the catalog text needs to be revised. The current catalog text states:

For general education requirements, students will be governed by the Catalog in use at the time they enter the University. Their major program requirements will be those in effect at the time they declare their major; however, if those requirements change, students may elect to complete the later requirements. Students who stop out for more than two years but who stay in the same major upon returning will meet the major requirements in place at the time they reenroll.

The revised catalog text would be as follows:

For general education requirements, students will be governed by the Catalog in use at the time they enter the University. However, any student regardless of their term of entry to the University may opt into the revised general education program commencing in fall 2006. Their major program requirements will be those in effect at the time they declare their major; however, if those requirements change, students may elect to complete the later requirements. Students who stop out for more than two years but who stay in the same major upon returning will meet the major requirements in place at the time they reenroll.

RE: General Education Requirements for Associate Degrees

The following proposal was passed by the General Education Committee on January 18, 2006.

The University currently requires 16 hours of general education course work for associate degree programs. The current catalog text is below:

Students in associate degree programs must earn a minimum of 16 hours in courses approved for general education. These hours must include ENG 101 and ENG 102 or their equivalent. The ten additional hours must include approved courses in categories 05-08 (humanities); categories 09-12 (social science); and categories 13-16 (natural science) or an approved MAT course from category 03. Courses meeting general education requirements have been identified by an asterisk (*) in program plans in Section Five. For certain curricula, individual requirements are waived if they are satisfied in the major program.

SACS requires a minimum of 15 semester hours for associate degree programs. These credit hours are to be drawn from and include at least one course from each of the following areas: humanities/fine arts; social/behavioral sciences; and natural science/mathematics. Our current requirements include these courses in addition to ENG 101 and ENG 102. Therefore, I propose decreasing the general education hours required for associate degree programs from 16 to 15 and revising the current requirements to reflect the new general education program. The revised catalog text would be as follows:

Students in associate degree programs must earn a minimum of 15 hours in courses approved for general education. These hours must include ENG 101 and ENG 102 or their equivalent. The nine additional hours must include one approved course in each of the following categories: IIIA, IIIB, IIIA/B, or VII (Arts and Humanities); VA, VB, VC, or VII (Social and Behavioral Sciences); and II, IVA, IVB, or VII (Mathematics and/or Natural Sciences). Courses meeting general education requirements have been identified by an asterisk (*) in program plans in Section Five. For certain curricula, individual requirements are waived if they are satisfied in the major program.

The program of study is individually designed for each student, based on previous graduate work, in order to meet the requirements of the specified school psychology content areas.

Psychology courses taken as part of a previous graduate degree may be substituted for undergraduate prerequisites in psychology. Proposed Course Syllabus

PUB 480 – Integrated Communication Strategies (3 hrs)

Course Description:

PUB480 would examine the interactions within an organization's overall communication efforts, including public relations, industrial and graphic design, organizational communication and other related initiatives. This senior-level seminar would provide an in-depth analysis of the opportunities and obstacles for integrating communication initiatives by the company or organization as a means of reaching a unified view of these interacting efforts. A complete view would be provided through a focus on budgeting, strategic planning, creative development, execution and evaluation.

Instructor:

Jim Gleason, M.S., Visiting Instructor, Department of Communication

Student Learning Objectives:

Following this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate increased awareness and sensitivity to the importance of context in the development and application
 of individual communication initiatives;
- Articulate a unified view of significant aspects of communications programming within organizations, as well as individual disciplines necessary to support those programs; and
- Demonstrate an improved and acceptable level of proficiency in skill sets developed through other courses by applying them in real world business application settings.

In order to offer a more structured and consistent curriculum, the graduate faculty has decided to reduce the number of electives and increase the number of required courses. Each student is required to take a one hour introduction to the graduate program course in addition to the other 30 credit hours required. As such, the total credit hours required has increased to 31. Due to feedback from students, faculty, and potential employers, the graduate faculty has decided to remove the portfolio requirement as well. The maximum allowable credit has been lowered for COR 806 and 839 from 6 hours to 3 hours to ensure that students who are not pursuing a thesis do not receive all six of their required elective hours through either of these courses individually. Additionally, the maximum allowable credit for COR 823 and 839 has been lowered from 9 hours to 6 hours because with the new 6 hour elective requirement, there is no longer a need for students to utilize a maximum of 9 hours credit for either of these courses. Furthermore, we are requiring students who have not had our undergraduate juvenile justice course COR 311 (or its equivalent) to take that course prior to or simultaneously registering for COR 820 (our graduate juvenile justice course). The faculty feels that the student will be too far behind from the beginning, as COR 820 assumes a foundation that a student who has not had the undergraduate course will lack. For the same reason, we are requiring students who have not taken COR 201 or its equivalent (Introduction to Corrections) to take that course prior to or simultaneously registering for COR 830, 835, 850, and 856. Each assumes a foundation of knowledge that a student who has not taken COR 201 will lack. We are also requiring that COR 808, 810, and 818 be taken by all students as part of our program. As the comprehensive exam (and, to some extent, the thesis) is based largely on these three classes, the graduate faculty feel that all students should be exposed to the same course material in preparation for those exams. Finally, we are now requiring a thesis proposal defense for each student so that the student and their thesis committee are in agreement regarding the nature and scope of the thesis prior to the time the student actually begins conducting their thesis research.

MASTER OF SCIENCE

The Department of Correctional and Juvenile Justice Studies offers the Master of Science degree in Correctional/Juvenile Justice Studies. Graduates of the program are expected to demonstrate advanced-level critical and analytical thinking; to apply principles from multiple academic disciplines to problems in corrections and juvenile justice in an effort to formulate creative solutions; to respect, evaluate, and synthesize information from diverse sources; and to communicate effectively with both client and professional audiences. Further, graduates are required to show competency in the following areas: (1) the historical, theoretical, and legal foundations of the field; (2) the methods of gathering and analyzing information for research purposes; (3) knowledge of the major bases of literature; and (4) the ability to assume positions of responsibility and leadership in correctional and juvenile justice agencies.

Special Program Requirements

Admission: Applicants must (a) meet the requirements of the Graduate School, (b) hold a baccalaureate degree from an accredited institution, (c) have achieved an undergraduate grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 overall or in the last 60 hours of the baccalaureate program, (d) have a combined Graduate Record Examination (GRE) score of at least 1250 under the GRE scoring system in use until October 1, 2002 or a combined verbal and quantitative score of at least 800 and an analytical writing score of at least 3.0 under the scoring system in use after October 1, 2002; and, (e) have three persons qualified to assess the applicant's potential for graduate work submit letters of recommendation directly to the Graduate Coordinator in the Department of Correctional and Juvenile Justice Studies (Stratton 105). Applicants who do not meet these GPA or GRE requirements, but who otherwise demonstrate promise for successful graduate study, may be granted probationary admission, but such applicants must comply with all requirements of the Graduate School regarding probationary admission.

<u>Prerequisites:</u> Students lacking undergraduate coursework or practical field experience will be required to take the following undergraduate coursework either prior to or simultaneously with enrollment in the corresponding graduate course(s): COR 311 required for COR 820 and COR 201 required for COR 830, 835, 850, and 856.

Candidacy: Please refer to the "General Academic Information" section of this catalog for complete information on candidacy.

Thesis: A six-hour thesis is optional in this program. If the thesis option is chosen, the topic must be approved by the student's thesis committee, and <u>a proposal defense and</u> an oral defense is required.

Comprehensive Examination: Students who do not choose the thesis option must pass a comprehensive examination, with both written and oral components assessed by a comprehensive exam committee. Such students must also complete six additional hours of elective courses.

Graduate Portfolio: All students are required to develop a portfolio as part of their graduate studies. The portfolio is meant to enhance preparation of the thesis or comprehensive examination and to be of use in the student's career following graduation.

Program: A minimum of 30 31 semester hours of graduate credit is required. A maximum of nine hours of approved, outside credit may be transferred to this degree program, but credit may not be transferred for COR 808, 810, and 818. All outside credit must be approved by the Department Graduate Committee.

This class is designed to familiarize students with the various ethical issues that surround juvenile justice practices. The role of ethics will be examined within the context of legal issues and court decisions related to juvenile justice. The course will begin with students exploring and familiarizing themselves with ethics in general. During this section of this course, specific attention will be paid to identifying and discussing historical, as well as current ethical issues that exist in juveniles justice. Next, the course will focus on the constitutional rights of juveniles and adult offenders. Specifically, students will learn about first, fourth, fifth, sixth, eighth, and fourteenth amendment rights, as they relate to juveniles. Finally, the course will focus on the specific court cases, which have examined the constitutional rights of juveniles. Such issues include curfew, police contact, detention, waivers, adjudication, disposition, and conditions of confinements. Throughout the course students will be exposed to hypothetical situations in an effort to enhance their ability to apply the theoretical and legal concepts learned in this course to "real life" situations.

Course Competencies:

The Department of Correctional and Juvenile Justice Studies emphasizes **seven** core competencies for its students. You should be aware that this course is specifically designed to promote the following competencies:

1. Problem Solving/Decision Making

Students should be able to:

- (a) Identify their own values and understand how their decision-making reflects these values.
- (b) Articulate the strengths and weaknesses of their own problem-solving processes.
- (c) Apply the problem solving process (i.e., define the problem, brainstorm potential solutions, analyze solutions, select a strategy, implement a strategy, evaluate process and outcomes) to a personal problem.
- (d) As part of a team, collaborate in designing and implementing a problem solving process to address a profession-based issue.

2. Written and Oral Communication

Students should be able to:

- (a) Convey their knowledge and understanding of the discipline through written and oral modes of communication.
- (b) Communicate their ideas and opinions in ways that integrate the theory, practice, and research of the correctional and juvenile justice profession.

I also expect each of you to do your part in terms of preparing for the class. However, if at any time in the course you feel that you are not doing well, I strongly encourage you to contact me. I have an open door policy, which means that I welcome students to contact me to discuss class-related issues, current corrections or juvenile justice topics, or just to say hello. On that note, you should be aware that I am available during my posted office hours, as well as other times by appointment to provide you with feedback regarding your progress in this course. I would like to point out that if you do not have an appointment with me and you are trying to meet with me outside of office hours, you may find that I am already meeting with another student, engaged in a research project or at a meeting. So, to minimize your wait time, please make an appointment if you can. Finally, please note that the last day to drop a course is October 14th. If you feel it necessary to drop the course, please do so by this date.

Course Requirements

Exams

The exams will consist of following: multiple choice, listing, short answer and essay questions. There will be a total of four exams during the semester, which are worth 100 points each. Each exam will be divided into two sections: (1) the multiple choice, listing, and short answer questions and (2) the essay questions. You will be required to take part 1 of the exam **on the date** posted. Part 1 will be delivered in class. The essay portions of our exams will be handed out in class on the date of the exam. Essay answers must be submitted to me via the safe assignments section of the course website. The exam dates are listed in the attached class schedule. You are expected to take the exam **on the date posted**. Make up examinations will only be given under emergency situations. In order to receive an excuse for an exam (which allows you to make it up), you must contact me **PRIOR TO THE TIME THE TEST IS ADMINISTERED** (this means **before** class) to obtain such approval. Failure to contact me **prior** to the test date will result in an unexcused missed exam. Any unexcused missed exams will receive a grade of 0. Only one make-up exam per student will be allowed. If you miss an exam and are allowed to make it up, make-up exams will be administered December 14th immediately following the final exam.

Portfolio

The portfolio will consist of three separate assignments and will comprise 30% of your final grade in this course. Please be aware of the importance of successfully completing these assignments. Specific instructions for each of these assignments will be presented later in the course. However, you should know the general requirements of each of these assignments. These requirements are as follows:

(1) Ethical Reaction Papers

Each student will be required to complete a 5-page ethical reaction paper. You will be **assigned** a hypothetical scenario and asked to explore associated ethical. Students will be asked to read the scenario and respond to a series of specific questions concerning the scenario. The purpose of this assignment is to become familiar with common ethical issues, as well as to examine these situations from the standpoint of ethical theory. In addition to the written assignment, you will be required to lead your fellow classmates in a discussion surrounding your scenario and the ethical issues associated with it. Your final grade for this assignment will be based on your paper (graded for content, spelling, and grammar) **and** your discussion of the ethical issues related to your scenario. The paper will account for 75% of your grade on this assignment and the discussion will count for 25%. **Specific instructions regarding this assignment will be handed out the second week of class.**

(2) Legal Synthesis Presentation

Each student will be required to pick one of the various legal topics that we will cover during the course of the semester (see course schedule for legal topics), synthesize the material related to that topic, present the material to the class, and to facilitate discussion related to the topic. The purpose of this assignment is to have the student learn to synthesize complex and large amounts of information related to a specific legal topic to gain a better perspective of that topic as it relates to common issues in the juvenile justice fields. The student will be required to produce the following written materials with respect to his or her chosen topic:

- (1) A power point presentation on the topic
- (2) List of 5-10 questions designed to promote discussion regarding the topic. Students will also be graded on their ability to facilitation discussion surrounding the legal topic. The written assignments will account for 50% of your grade on this assignment and the actual facilitation of discussion will account for the remaining 50%. Specific instructions regarding this assignment will be handed out the sixth week of class.

(3) Debates

Each student will be required to participate in a debate on a timely issue in juvenile justice. The issues that we will debate may include topics such as juvenile death penalty, juvenile curfew laws, religion in schools, drug testing of students. Students will be assigned a debate topic. For the written component of this assignment, students will be required to produce an annotated bibliography of 10-15 sources. Students will also be graded on their participation in the debate. The actual debate will account for 75% of the final grade for this assignment, while the written document will account for 25%. *Specific instructions regarding this assignment will be handed out the thirteenth week of class*.

Class Policies

Submission of Assignments

All written assignments, essay questions for exams, ethical reaction papers, and other assignments are noted in the instructions for that assignment **must be** submitted to me in word format and via the safe assignments section of our class blackboard site. Please be aware that they will be checked through safe assignments for plagiarism. Specific instructions for submission to the safe assignments site will be provided in the written instructions for all assignments and exams.

Attendance and Participation

My class policy is that if you do not attend class meetings, **you will NOT pass the class.** I recognize that emergencies arise. Thus, you are given five "free" absences. It is not necessary for me to know the reason behind your absence, unless you feel obliged to share that information with me. However, you are only given five absences. If **for whatever reasons** you do not attend the specified amount of classes, you will receive an "F" in this course. If you will not be able to meet the requisite amount of class meetings, you will need to discuss the situation with me **during the first week of the course.** If you fail to discuss any potential attendance problems with me during this time period, then you will be held to this attendance policy.

It is also **your responsibility** to sign the class attendance sheet that will be passed around at each class meeting. Failure to do so will result in an absence recorded for that date. Also, if you do not attend the **whole** course period, you will not receive credit for attending Thus, if you come to class late or leave class early you are subjecting yourself to a loss of credit for attending.

Participation is also an essential component of this class. It is imperative that each student come to class prepared and able to participate in discussions. Please read the assigned course material and participate in class discussions. Each student will have ample opportunities for class participation. However, it is the **student's reponsibility** to engage in these discussions. **Please note that merely attending class the required number of times does not guarantee you a satisfactory participation grade.** Participation requires attendance, as well as discussion. Regular attendance and academic etiquette are expected. I will be presenting the information that you need in the classroom during our proscribed meeting period. If you are unable to come to class, it is **your** responsibility to obtain the missed information from your **fellow classmates**. If you are absent on the day of an in-class assignment, that assignment cannot be made up.

Class Conduct

I do not allow cellular telephones or pagers in my classroom. Please turn off all of these devices prior to the beginning of class. If you fail to do so, I will ask you to leave the classroom, so as to avert any distractions for your classmates. If your pager or cellular phone becomes a continual problem (disturbs the class more than twice in a class period), you will be asked to leave the class for the remainder of the course period and you will lose credit for your attendance.

Because the University fosters an environment of academic freedom, it is likely that you will be engaged in discussions where various viewpoints, ideas, and beliefs are being offered. I expect each student to be courteous and respectful of the opinion's of others. **I will not tolerate** disrespect of any kind to either myself or another student. I believe that as mature adults we will have to problems engaging in lively and spirited discussions throughout the semester. However, should this type of behavior become disruptive, I will ask the student to leave the class, which will result in a recorded absence for that class period.

Academic Integrity

This is an extremely important portion of the syllabus. I <u>strongly</u> encourage you to review, digest, and commit this information to memory. Failure to comply will result in severe penalties.

You are expected to demonstrate the highest level of academic integrity in this class. Dishonesty, in any form, is unacceptable. Any student engaging in such behavior in this course will be assigned an "F" for the course and be subject to university disciplinary action. Be advised that academic integrity is expected on all assignments, including quizzes, exams, papers, and any other written or oral assignments (including discussion board assignments).

The *EKU Faculty Handbook* defines plagiarism as "the act of presenting ideas, words or organization of a source (published or not) as if they were one's own, without acknowledgement of the source. Since university instructors assume material presented by students is their own unless otherwise indicated, all quoted material must be in quotation marks, and all paraphrases, quotations, significant ideas, and organization must be acknowledged by footnotes or by some other form of documentation acceptable to the instructor for the course. Plagiarism also includes presenting material which as composed or revised by any person other than the student who submits it, as well as the deliberate falsification of footnotes. The use of the term 'material' refers to work in any form including written, oral, or electronic (as in the case of computer files)" (p. V 10).

The *EKU Faculty Handbook* defines cheating as "Cheating includes buying, stealing, or otherwise fraudulently obtaining copies of examinations or assignment for the purpose of improving one's academic standing. During examinations or in-class work, it includes receiving information from others

and referring to unauthorized notes or other unauthorized information. In addition, copying from other, either during examinations or in the preparation of homework assignments, is a form of cheating. Computers should not be used to acquire or provide information in conflict with the academic honesty policy. Furthermore, the Code of Ethics for Computing and Communications makes it the responsibility of computer users to keep information, data, and programs in their computer accounts secure from others." (p. V10-11). The handbook further says "Anyone who knowingly assists in any form of academic dishonesty shall be considered as guilty as the student who accepts such assistance. Students should not allow their work to be copies or otherwise used by fellow students, nor should they sell or give unauthorized copies of examinations to other students" (p. V 11).

ONLINE COURSEWORK

The major requirements for the B.S. and A.A. degrees may be completed online. In addition to satisfying Eastern Kentucky University's (EKU's) requirements for full freshman admission or provisional admission, admission to an online cohort requires either that students reside at least 60 miles from campus, or if they reside closer, demonstrate a rationale that is satisfactory to the department for pursuing requirements online. Admission to pursue major requirements online further requires a composite ACT score of 20 or greater. Students with composite ACT scores of 18 or 19 may be admitted on a probationary basis but are required to furnish a writing sample. Though students transferring from another accredited institution are not required to submit test scores, such students must meet EKU's requirements for admission as a transfer student. In addition, transfer students must have an overall 2.5 or greater grade point average (GPA) on a 4.0 scale on all work from accredited institutions. Transfer students with overall GPAs less than 2.5 but at least 2.0 may be admitted on a probationary basis but are required to furnish a writing sample. The requirement that students must earn a minimum of 15 of the last 18 hours through EKU is waived for students pursuing these A.A. major requirements online. Likewise, the requirement that B.S. students must earn a minimum of 30 of the last 36 hours through EKU is waived for students pursing these B.S. major requirements online. However, for the AA degree, a minimum of 16 semester hours must be earned through EKU, and for the BS degree, a minimum of 32 hours must be earned through EKU. Criminal Justice and Police Studies CRJ 801 The History of Criminal Justice (03)

Course Description

CRJ 801 History of Criminal Justice. (3) A. An examination and analysis of the historical development of the criminal justice system.

This course analyzes how today's police departments developed into the organizations they are. It will look at some present-day assumptions made about the police, and discuss the nature of their underlying values and messages. It will look at the beginnings of the police, how police departments were structured, the underlying rationale for the structure, and how that structure changed over time. It will also analyze who the police were and are.

Topics addressed will include: the consolidation of the police from the night watch and day patrols; the reform movements to professionalize the police; the incorporation of women into the police; and the move toward community policing.

There will be group studies on such cities as: Chicago, Los Angeles, and New York, (other cities are also possible) which will focus on particular individuals, events, and commissions that have become major markers in police history.

Every effort will be made to cover all of the material, but the student is responsible for the content of the readings, whether they are discussed in class or not. While the course should follow the syllabus, circumstances may warrant changes.

Course Objectives

There are two main objectives of this course: 1) to cultivate the ability to analyze and critically evaluate ideas, arguments, and points of view. This will be done within the context of the history of the police; and 2) to understand the development of the big-city police.

Course Requirements

<u>Attendance</u>—Class attendance and participation are required. More than four (4) absences (this is 2 weeks of classes) will result in a full grade reduction. If there is a medical reason for the absences, it needs to be documented, and the material made up. More than six (6) absences will result in an "F" for the course. An "F" will translate to the numerical grade of "0". If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to contact another student for any lecture notes, assignments or handouts missed.

Everyone is expected to be at all of the presentations. If you miss someone else's presentation, your own grade will be lowered.

<u>Exams</u>—There will be two essay exams. Both exams are required. If you are unable to take an exam, I must be notified by the day of the exam, not afterwards. There will be no acceptable excuses afterwards. There will be no make-up exams except in absolutely exceptional circumstances. Only one exam may be made up.

Papers–Students will write a 10 page paper (not shorter, not longer).

Grades

Grades will be based on the two exams, one paper, homework preparation in general (a subjective assessment), and class attendance and participation. If you are called on, and you shrug your shoulders, or in any other way convey that you did not do the homework or have no interest in the class, you will receive a "0" for that day's class participation.

Three "0"'s will result in a full grade reduction. Six (6) "0"'s will result in an F for the course. An "F" will translate to the numerical grade of "0".

Each exam-20%; the paper -20%; homework preparation-15%; group presentation-15%; attendance and participation-10%. Some grades will be given in terms of numbers. That is 83 or 96. The final grade will be based on the cumulative number translated as follows: A=90-100; B=80-89; C=70-79; D=60-69; F=0-59.

Criminal Justice and Police Studies CRJ 815 Policing Global Insecurity (03)

Course Description

CRJ 815 Policing Global Insecurity. (3) A. Examines "global security threats" (e.g., terrorism, transnational crime, ethnic cleansing) and the State and private sector's role in their construction and control. Late-modern social, political, and cultural movements are used to make theoretical sense of these phenomena.

In studying the topic, "policing global insecurity," this course examines the contours and intersections of three major socio-political-economic movements:

- Globalization in the context of the late-modern era;
- Blurring boundaries in state and private security efforts (police / military; national / international; public / private); and,
- The emergence of numerous threats (perceived or real) to global security (terrorism, public protest, ethnic cleansing, transnational crime, organized crime, drug trafficking, corporate crime).

Human rights and civil rights in the context of global insecurity will also be examined, along with a brief look at alternative solutions to these difficulties beyond the police and military security apparatus.

Required Textbooks

The required readings are listed in the weekly learning modules.

Course Objectives

- a. Understand the concepts, history, and phenomena referred to as "late-modernity" and "globalization."
- b. Understand the relationship between late-modernity / globalization and numerous emerging threats including state crime, corporate crime, terrorism, and numerous forms of transnational crime.
- c. Identify and comprehend the complex mix of state / private / military / police / national / interntational entities in responding to global insecurity, and the implications of these blurring distinctions.
- d. Understand the human and civil rights implications of policing global insecurity.

Each of you will be expected to complete weekly research / writing assignments. These will relate directly to the next class's learning module and these exercises will be used in class discussions. The assignments will vary from week to week but the typical assignment might be to find and review three journal articles related to United Nation's security forces. These projects in total will be done in lieu of an end of the term research paper.

You will be graded according to the following criteria:

Criminal Justice and Police Studies CRJ 877 Postmodernism and Justice (03)

Course Description

<u>CRJ 877 Postmodernism and Justice.</u> (3) An introduction to the ideas of postmodernism as applied to criminal justice. In contrast to the scientific model of inquiry most often used in criminal justice, the use of postmodernism brings to the field of criminal justice new models characterized by relationships, the importance of symbols, and assumptions that underlie our understanding of the concept of justice.

In contrast to the scientific model of inquiry used by those in criminal justice, postmodernism brings to the field new models characterized by relationships. This course introduces some of these concepts through the ideas of several of its the major figures, including: Husserl, Heidegger, Merleau-Ponty, Ricoeur and Derrida in phenomenology; and de Saussure and Lévi-Strauss in structuralism.

Late response papers will not be graded.

Paper: Each student will write a 10-12 page paper on a topic decided in conjunction with the professor.

Participation: This class depends upon meaningful discussion. You are expected to complete your homework assignments with enough comprehension to allow you to participate in an intelligent exchange of views on the topic. Participation refers to the <u>quality</u> of the contribution you make to the class discussion. Students who do not prepare adequately, or who fail to engage in quality participation will be assigned the grade of "F." In these cases, the number value assigned to an "F" is "0."

Grades

Response papers (total) 40%; class participation 30%; paper 30%.

Course Requirements

Papers

The student is expected to complete a very focused response paper on each of the chapters and reading assignments. Each paper is to be independently written by the student. Failure to following this requirement will be deemed academic dishonesty. Each paper will be between 2 and 3 typed pages (excluding references). Response papers will be written and brought to class on the day the readings are discussed. Each response paper will be presented in strict "APA" style and reflect *substantial* research and thought. The student is to present the following the response paper: a brief summary of the core ideas in the reading (not to exceed 1/3 of the paper). The response papers will constitute 1/3 of the student's final grade for the class. Students who do not complete all response papers will be assigned the grade of "F" for the course.

Examinations

One examination will be given during the semester on the last day of class. This examination will consist of essay questions. The examination will constitute 1/3 of the student's final grade for the course. No make-up examinations will be given under any circumstances. If, in my judgment, the class is progressing well I will retain the option of dropping the examination or giving a take home exam; grading, however will remain the same. Student's who do not take and pass the examination will be assigned the grade of "F" for the course. In cases of failure the numerical value assigned to an "F" is "0". Students must secure, in writing, permission for any deviation from these requirements.

Preparation and Participation

The student is expected to be prepared before coming to class and <u>demonstrate</u> that preparation. Preparation refers to completing all readings before coming to class with enough comprehension to contribute to an <u>intelligent</u> discussion (see reading list below). Participation refers to the <u>quality</u> of the contribution the student makes to the class discussion. Students will be expected to serve as facilitators of all readings and will be graded on the quality of their facilitation. From time to time the professor may assign special readings that do not appear on the reading list provided below. Toward this end 1/3 of the student's final grade for this portion of the course will be based on preparation and participation. Students who either do not adequately prepare for class or fail to engage in quality participation will be assigned the grade of "F" for the course. In cases of failure to participate the numerical value assigned to an "F" is "0". Students must secure, in writing, permission for any deviation from these requirements.

Every effort will be made by the professor to maintain a class atmosphere conducive to learning and the free exchange of ideas. Since learning is an interactive process of communication between faculty and students, each student is expected to participate in this process. This class is being taught as a seminar, and it is my expectation that we will conduct this class as true seminars. This expectation carries with it the following assumptions:

- a. All students will have completed the readings prior to the scheduled class meetings;
- b. All students will be prepared to participate in an informed discussion of issues raised in and about the assigned reading materials;
- All students will be able to critically analyze the reading assignments and will contribute original thoughts and ideas about the subject matter under discussion; and
- d. All participants in the seminar will respect opinions and ideas expressed by others and will, in no way, discourage open conversation and the sharing of ideas.

The "bottom line" to be drawn from all of the above is that we are all expected to be active participants in the learning process through discussion and as such respect the opinions of one another.

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all sessions in their entirety. Missing substantial portions of the course will result in the student being assigned the grade of "F" for the course. An "F" will carry with it the numerical value of "0". More than one **unexcused** absence will constitute failure.

Criminal Justice and Police Studies CRJ 879 Vice and Criminal Justice (03)

Course Description

CRJ 879 Vice and Criminal Justice. (3) A. A historical, analytic overview of America's response to vice. Particular topics will be chosen from the major vices in American society: prostitution gambling, drugs and alcohol, as they relate to this country's relationship between morality and the criminal law.

This course is an historical, analytic overview of America's response to prostitution and alcohol as they relate to this country's relationship between morality and the criminal law. While both prostitution and alcohol are or have been considered immoral, they address different aspects of the morality question. The course will be divided into two parts: one focusing on prostitution, the other on alcohol and prohibition. Topics that will be included are: the American reform tradition, deviance, social control, regulation vs. prohibition, feminism, government enforced morals, and politics, law and religion.

Response Papers:

Late response papers will not be graded.

Participation:

This class depends upon meaningful discussion. You are expected to complete your homework assignments with enough comprehension to allow you to participate in an intelligent exchange of views on the topic. Participation refers to the <u>quality</u> of the contribution you make to the class discussion. Students who do not prepare adequately, or who fail to engage in quality participation will be assigned the grade of "F." In these cases, the number value assigned to an "F" is "0."

Attendance

Attendance is expected at all classes. If you miss more than 2 classes, you may fail the course.

Term Paper

The student is required to write and present one 10-page paper on a topic approved by the professor. These papers should have footnotes and a bibliography.

Grades

Response papers (total) 33%; class participation 33%; paper and presentation 33%.
