NEGROES ADMITTED TO JURY DUTY

WILSON, N. C., June 13—The jury commissioners of Mecklenburg and Wilson counties last week voted to include Negroes in the jury lists. In Mecklenburg county, the commissioners unanimously adopted a resolution that in the biennial purging of the county jury list all non-delinquent tax-payers of good morals and sufficient intelligence be listed for jury service. In Wilson county, the commissioners took action after the recent Supreme court decision it was the duty of the judge to quash the indictment if no Negroes served on the jury before which the indicted man or woman was being tried.
