Joe Louis Wins Fight

LOUIS IN KNOCKOUT

Louis, the 21-year-old Detroit prize fighter, created a sensation Tuesday night when knocked Primo Canera out in the sixth round. Canera was knocked down three times before he received the decisive blow from the paws of Joe Louis. So terrific was his punch, that it drew blood from the helpless contender's mouth. Louis displayed fighting ease and confidence, along with wondrous footwork to show his superiority over his opponent. The only time Canera ever attempted to strike with any significance was in the first round, when he pounded Louis one or two light blows.

Jimmy Braddock, the present world's heavy-weight champion, was present to witness the victory of Louis. When asked if he would fight Louis, he refused to answer.

Promoter Mike Jacobs announced that Louis would be matched in a 15-round bout with Max Baer in New York this fall.

Nearly 70,000 saw the fight between Louis and Canera. There were 1,500 police officers present to preserve order in the big American League ball park.

LOUIS IS UNMARKED CARNERA IS BLOODY

New York, June 25—Joe Louis was unmarked as he left the ring at Yankee Stadium tonight after his spectacular six-round kayo victory over Canera.

The giant Italian's lips were badly cut and swollen and one eye was completely closed.

DETROIT HARLEMITES CELEBRATE

All of Harlem celebrated the victory of Louis with an all night and breakfast dance Tuesday night. As soon as the fight had ended, the colored inhabitants of Harlem, along with their Detroit friends and admirers of Louis, staged a riot of good time. Colored servants, maids, chauffeurs bell hops and inhabitants of the 125th street section declared a holiday and neglected going to work.

But, how they celebrated in their own way was magnificent! The celebration was similar to a carnival with plenty of music, plenty to drink and plenty to eat.

Jack Johnson, a former world heavy-weight champion, was present to see Joe Louis defeat Primo Canera, the Italian. Tuesday night, Peter Jackson and Sam Langford, champion prize fighters, were also present to see the fight.

JOE LOUIS' MOTHER PROUD AS SON WINS

"I'm proud of my boy." These were the first words of Mrs. John Barrow, mother of Joe Louis, who was at the ringside as "her boy" knocked the props out from under Primo Canera in the sixth round of a fight which will loom as a heavyweight classic.

With Joe's mother were his sisters and others of his immediate family.

RACE "MED" SPEAKS TO 10,000 DOCTORS

Atlantic City, N. J., June 27—The joint convention of the American Medical Association and the Canadian Medical Association which ended here Friday, not only brought together the largest number of physicians ever to assemble in America, but made history, in that, for the first time, a Negro physician appeared before that august body delivering an address on a subject about which little has been hitherto known.

The physician was Dr. Kenneth F. Melville, Jamaican born, and hailing from Canada, where he is assistant professor of pharmacology at the University of Magill. Dr. Melville has held this position for two years. Prior to joining the staff at Canada's premier institution, he did research work in France and Germany. The subject of his address, which was illustrated with lantern slides was, "The Comparative effects of Pressor and Oxytocic Fractions of Post Pituitary Extract on Blood Pressure and Intestinal Activity." Dr. Melville was most cordially received.

A number of outstanding Negroes attended the convention, among them being Dr. T. T. Tilden, director of Diagnostic Service, Tuskegee Veterans Hospital; Dr. Mae McCarroll, Dept. of Health, Newark, N. J.; Dr. Roscoe Giles, Staff Surgeon, Provident Hospital, Chicago; Dr. Harry Poindexter, Professor of Bacteriology, Howard University; Dr. Henry Turner, Hartford, Conn.; Dr. Howard McNeil, Pontiac, Mich.; and several physicians from Philadelphia and other neighboring cities.

IT CAN BE DONE

While Negro calamity howlers spray pessimism about the future of the Negro and race relations in America and daily predict a dire outcome for the greatest experiment in bi-racial living the world have ever seen, interracial conditions steadily improve.

Pennsylvania and New Jersey adopt civil rights laws that really mean something. A spirited N.A.A.C.P. protest forces the Board of Agriculture of Michigan to order "equal opportunity" for Negro students at Michigan State College. Lawyers Charles H. Houston and Thurgood Marshall start the N.A.A.C.P. le-

gal campaign against educational jim crowism by forcing the Law School of the University of Maryland to admit a young colored man. Reports of Negroes being called for jury service come from various parts of the South. Down in Louisiana, the magnificent work of the New Orleans N.A.A.C.P. compels lynch justice at Franklinton, La., to capitulate and free Luther Wilson, whose brother, Jerome, was lynched last January when the State Supreme Court reversed his death sentence and ordered a new trial.

It all demonstrates that Negroes CAN do something about their plight. It proves that their condition as citizens can be bettered. The slow improvement in race relations has been due almost as much to the ignorance and indifference of Negroes as it

has to the prejudice and indifference of Nordics. It can hardly be said that the race has really done much to win full citizenship recognition when it gives well under \$75,000 a year for that purpose. Had we during the past quarter century pushed our fight twice as vigorously and intelligently as we have, we would have been four times closer to our goal.
