3. Social Work Definition: THE GENERALIST PERSPECTIVE: The practice of social work requires that a practitioner be prepared to intervene in a range of different settings with client systems of any size. Class time will be spent with lecture, class discussion and in class activities. There will be various written assignments to assist the student with integrating the material. There will also be a midterm and final exam, plus two quizzes which cover research terminology and methods.

<u>Written assignments will be expected on time</u>. Spelling, grammar, and organization of thought and content will be considered in the grading of papers. Late work may result in a grade reduction so every effort should be made to hand in work on time. If there is a problem with handing work in on time, the instructor should be contacted prior to the due date. Each student is required to actively participate in class activities and discussions.

11. Sample Assignments

- 1) Students will be asked to locate in a local newspaper an article that involves **research methods** and present this to the class. This is a way to help students see how to immediately apply what they are learning.
- 2) Language and terminology "game" and/or quiz. Crossword puzzle. To learn and practice using research language.
- 3) Article critique. Students will be given an empirical article and asked to identify the various components and provide critique.
- 4) **Research design activity**. Students will be asked to articulate four researchable questions and identify what type of research question it is as well as how one would begin an investigation to address the question.
- 5) **Surveys/needs assessments**. Students will construct a client satisfaction survey or needs assessment instrument. This instrument may also be used for practice in data entry and analysis.
- 6) **"Mini" research proposal** (and/or grant proposal). Students will be asked to write a using the research outline and steps taught in class.
- 7) **Literature review assignment**. Students will be asked to locate 6-10 empirical articles related to a topic of their choice and synthesize those articles.
- 8) Quizzes and Tests: In addition students will be given 2 -3 quizzes throughout the semester and two exams. This allows for the instructor to assess student learnings.

COURSE SYLLABUS

Catalog description: The history of the reproducible image in Western Art, from the introduction of printing and typography in the 15th century, through the advent of photography and the emergence of the modern graphic design profession.

Pre-requisite: ARH 391, Survey of Art History II – Renaissance to Modern.

Course-Specific Learning Objectives:

1) Students will distinguish and call upon specified works of graphic art from the fifteenth to the twentieth century by subject, medium, regional origin, period, and artist (when known);

3) Students will recognize the technical, iconographic, and formal characteristics of graphic art over that same period;

2) Students will differentiate the cultural, social, philosophical and/or theoretical changes that influenced graphic aesthetics over that same period;

4) Students will integrate critical thinking skills, through the application of disciplined reasoning to art history.

Course Description:

This course is designed to satisfy the art history elective requirement for studio majors and art history minors, but may be taken by anyone with an interest in the graphic arts who has satisfied the prerequisite. The format is that of a seminar, with the presentation and discussion of information in class, and research and reading assignments outside of class. Beyond the prerequisite, the instructor must necessarily assume a reasonable foreknowledge on the part of each participant of the history of Western civilization since the fifteenth century, and of the corresponding geography of Europe and North America. Students should also expect to make full use of their writing and communication skills and of their ability to comprehend reading assignments.

The course is a specialized study of the impact produced across the visual arts by innovations in graphic communication technique and theory, with primary consideration given to the social and cultural context of ideas. As an exercise in art history, the basis of the course is fact, extracted objectively from primary and secondary sources and represented in enlightening ways, but with objectivity

intact. The disciplined application of such method can in its own way continue the development of your critical and analytical skills, wich can be applied in turn to the development of a personal aesthetic. But this cannot occur at the expense of a healthy respect for thoroughness and accuracy. As such it is a worthwhile component of any curriculum in the Humanities and Liberal Arts. It is this broad base of utility and wide range of relevance that will be stressed throughout the course, regardless of how remote the familiarity of the images may seem.

The concept of the reproducible image is as old as written language, but seal impressions, lapidary rubbings, and coins remained the extent of the form until the advent of relief printing in the Far East little more than 1000 years ago. It took another 500 years for the idea to make its way to the West, but since then it has generated a popular revolution in the image that has only increased in its magnitude over time. The result of rapid advances in graphic technology has been to make graphic art into the equal of the other visual arts in statue, and indeed their master in the ability to project ideas into the culture at large.

Content:

The course will consist of visually illustrated lectures and discussion, supplemented by other media if and when available, with readings assigned to prepare for discussion and to reinforce retention of the material. Outlines will be provided.

There will be a required format, and a given set of possible topics distributed at the start of class.

Course Description:

This course will introduce students to the various ways Africans, past and present, have expressed and still express themselves through their oral and written literatures. Through selected readings of African poetry (oral and written), folktales, short stories, novels, and plays, students will be encouraged to interrogate the skewed image of Africa propagated by the western news media, and to explore and develop for themselves an informed view of the continent. Students will also be encouraged to appreciate the rich diversity and histories of the various peoples living in Africa and to examine how their literatures critique and reinforce their worldviews.

Learning Objectives:

Students will identify and examine important concepts in African culture and thought as reflected by their literature, both oral and written.

Students will demonstrate an understanding of the historical and cultural issues that have helped shape African life and ways in which African values and traditions are critiqued and reinforced by their literatures.

Students will reflect on some of the stereotypes that cloud western perception of Africa and will be encouraged to construct a more healthy view of the continent and its peoples.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course serves as an introduction to the black literary voice, stressing the connections between minority and mainstream voices in American literature. Students will examine trends and themes in these texts to better understand the issues of being a minority in a larger white culture in America both before and after manumission.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

This course will generally foster a dialogue between the class and the professor with occasional workshops and brief lectures. I believe in an exchange of ideas; this necessitates your reading and reflecting on the daily assignment before you arrive in class. All texts are to be completed before the first day of discussion. I reserve the right to give unannounced reading quizzes (though I warn you from the outset that reading quizzes will occur often). Students will write two (2) different papers, will present an oral project on the first day of a particular work, will take a midterm examination and will write a cumulative final examination. Students are expected to attend each class period. Attendance will be taken.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Students will identify and examine the history, roles, contributions and/or experiences of African-American people through a close study of literature (poetry, stories, folktales, novels, drama) written by and about African Americans.

Students will demonstrate an understanding of the historical and cultural issues that have shaped the interactions of African-American people with other ethnic and cultural populations in the United States.

Students will identify and analyze racial, cultural and historical assumptions and biases in the United States and recognize and question their consequences at personal, social, and cultural levels.

- 2. Identify and analyze various ideas and literary movements in African-American literature.
- 3. Effectively communicate through oral and written means critical and analytical ideas about African-American literature.

- 5. Demonstrate skills of productive collaboration with peers.

Successful class participation is comprised of the following:

- constructive contribution to class discussion
- constructive contribution to group exercises
- regular attendance
- punctuality
- positive attitude in the classroom (this can not be emphasized enough)

DAILY QUIZZES: I will often give a reading quiz on the material required for that day. If you have read that material carefully, you should have little problem completing the quiz. These quizzes can NOT be made up. If you can demonstrate that you are exempt from that class due to a valid *university* excuse, then I will not count that quiz (see "Excused Absences" below).

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION: I expect each student to attend every class. Missing class will impact your final grade in a number of ways. You will lose attendance/participation points from the "Participation/Attendance" portion of your grade; you will not be allowed to make-up the daily reading quiz or writing portion of that class period lowering the "Daily quizzes" portion of your final grade; and you will probably be less prepared for the tests and the final exam. Equally importantly, participation literally means doing just that. Coming to class and simply sitting in a chair does not aid in an interaction of ideas. The ideal classroom is one in which everyone shares individual ideas which the group then evaluates allowing everyone present to re-imagine his or her own concept on that topic. Coming to class is good, but not enough. I have allocated 15% of the final grade for "Participation/Attendance" – do not believe that simply being present is enough while attendance is crucial, I will also assess you actual participation in the verbal ideas expressed in the classroom on a daily basis.

EXCUSED ABSENCES: These are determined by the university rather than by the instructor. When you present an official letter from some recognized academic area of the administration telling me that you are to be excused since you are representing the university in some formal capacity, you are then considered excused without penalty. Doctor's notes, mother's notes, work notes, etc. are not the same. They do not constitute in themselves a valid absence. Don't Miss Class!! I follow the Department of English and Theatre guidelines. Missing more than 10% of the total number of classes will result in automatic failure.

PAPERS: You have two papers to write in this course. I expect originality, outside sources, and a synthesis of ideas and information (your own and those of critic). We will discuss plagiarism (in all its forms – summary, paraphrase and quote) which is not only unacceptable but unforgivable. Do not steal another's ideas whether in text or on line. If you do and are caught, the result is failure in the course and possible expulsion from the university. I will turn any plagiarism problems over to the appropriate areas of the University.

ORAL PROJECT: The list of Oral Project dates and topics has been posted on my office door. Each group of two is responsible for a presentation of 20 minutes. There are no make-up dates. I expect you to arrive at the beginning of class and begin your presentation. Notice how much the presentation is worth – 15%. I expect these to be informative, professional, smoothly delivered and carefully prepared. DO NOT rely on plot summary; biography should be used ONLY if it directly and meaningfully addresses the work of literature itself. I welcome meeting you in my office to discuss the project, but NOT the day before you plan to deliver. This does not allow you enough time to re-prepare should we find problems with what you plan to do.

TESTS AND FINAL EXAM: Tests #1 and 2 cover only the material leading up to them (that is, Test #1 covers only May 22-May 31 while Test #2 covers only June 5 – June 12). The final exam is comprehensive and covers the entire course from the very first day until the last day.

PAPER REQUIREMENTS:

Each student will write three (3) critical essays (3-4 pages). The essays will be turned in at the beginning of the class on the day on which they are due. Late papers will **NOT** be accepted unless prior arrangements have been made. In the event that it is necessary for you to miss class when the paper is due (because of illness or an emergency), you are required to send your paper to class by one of your classmates. I do not accept emailed papers. Proofreading is an essential skill for the effective writer. One advantage of a word processor is the "spell check." Please use the spell check as another tool to create the best possible paper.

ATTENDANCE:

I follow the policy dictated by the Department of English and Theatre at Eastern Kentucky University. You cannot miss more than 10% of the total number of class meetings. If you do, you automatically fail the course. DO NOT ASSUME that you are therefore allowed to miss a certain number of class days. I take attendance regularly. Absences will markedly affect the class participation portion of your final grade. Unlike larger lecture classes, our course is composed of fewer students. Each missing member on a particular day narrows the range of responses to that particular topic of discussion covered.

Paper #1 –

In a 4-5 page researched paper please discuss the gender differences between how Jacobs and Douglass approach the problems of writing a slave narrative. That is, how does each author present his/her own gender and opposite genders? How does each author deal with concepts of marriage? How does each author deal with concepts of sexuality? How does each author deal with concepts of family? Why do you think that each author makes the assumptions that he/she does? (You need to use at least four sources, at least two of which have to be off-line [print]).

Paper #2 -

Looking at the two chapters "Cora Lee" and "The Two" of *The Women of Brewster Place* discuss the problems of race and sexuality in the broader understanding of American mores. What is Naylor suggesting about the human need to seek companionship? Does poverty affect this drive? Why does society feel the need to disrupt monogamous lesbianism while condoning – at least to some extent – repeated heterosexual liaisons with different partners out of wedlock? (You need to use at least four sources, at least two of which have to be off-line [print]).

ENG 362 North American Native Literature Dr. Charlotte Rich

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In this course, we will study literature by a variety of North American Native authors. As we read the literature we will also look at the social and political forces which have affected Native Americans on this continent. We will explore historical perspectives, images of the "vanishing" Indian, images of the "half-blood" or "mixed blood," representations of "traditional" Indians in relation to those who attempt assimilation to non-Indian culture, and narrative structure and how it relates to oral traditions and to Anglo-European literary forms.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Students will gain aesthetic appreciation of and detailed knowledge of the literary contributions of North American Native authors through close study of their works.

Students will show understanding of the indigenous historical and cultural contexts that have shaped North American Native literature.

Students will interrogate stereotypes of Native Americans by gaining understanding of the unique experiences and concerns of Native American groups within the United States as reflected in this literature.

The **midterm and final exams** will consist of 1) several short-answer identifications for which students will need to write explanations of the significance of quoted passages from works, and 2) essay questions. The essay question on the final exam will also serve as an assessment tool for the course.

The **short reading response papers** will be written from a list of topics on the readings that is supplied by the professor; students may select topics from the list and must turn in the response papers on the day those readings are to be discussed. At least two of the papers must be written by the midterm of the semester.

The **formal essay** may be written on a topic from a list supplied by the professor, or students may create a topic of their own based on readings from the course, pending the professor's approval. A draft conference on the formal essay

is not required but encouraged. Students must submit the final drafts of their essays along with material documenting their writing process: outlines, notes, previous drafts, etc., as well as copies of secondary sources used.

Students will sign up to give a short **presentation** on one author studied this semester. They must create a handout with enough copies for the whole class that provides a guide for their discussion, and on the handout they must include full citation information for the sources they consulted to create their presentation.

STATEMENT ON ACADEMIC HONESTY:

All students are expected to adhere to EKU's statement on Academic Honesty. The definition of "plagiarism" in this statement follows: "Plagiarism is the act of presenting ideas, words, or organization of a source (published or not) as if they were one's own, without acknowledgement of the source. . . . COURSE DESCRIPTION: Study of literature by women writers.

OBJECTIVES

Department objectives

- Students will demonstrate the ability to apply criticism/theory to texts and/or to analyze texts for rhetorical/historical/cultural contexts, literary techniques, and/or connections to other tests in/out of class.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to compose effective, discipline-appropriate texts.
- Students will demonstrate an understanding of the characteristics of literary/rhetorical contexts, periods, genres, theories, and trends.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to conduct research, to assess sources, to effectively synthesize their ideas with those of others, and to correctly document that research.

Course objectives

- Students will identify and examine the history, roles, contributions and/or experiences of women through a close study of literature (poetry, stories, essays, novels, drama) written by women.

- to facilitate an understanding of queer culture's contributions to contemporary culture,
- to encourage student research and correct writing,
- to promote critical reading and thinking as well as plural interpretations,
- to promote an understanding the struggle for acceptance of queer culture, particularly in the past century,
- to promote diversity and gender related issues,
- to encourage student discussion and participation,
- to facilitate an understanding and appreciation for the language, imagery, structure, characterization, and thematics of art in queer culture.

Course Objective: Queer Studies is a rapidly growing field which includes many subject areas. This course will concentrate on literature and gender/cultural theory. We will examine the ideas of theorists such as Michel Foucault, Eve Sedgwick, and Judith Butler and will briefly survey the evolution of modern concepts of homosexuality over the past one hundred and fifty years with occasional discussions of homoerotic behavior of earlier periods. We will review and interrogate the discussions which have in recent years occupied the discipline such as essentialism v. social construction and the gay v. queer debates. We will also devote time to discussions of contemporary social issues as they relate to the struggle of lesbian, gays, bisexual, and transgendered persons for social acceptance and legal protection. We will read selections from novels, plays, essays and poems. Finally, in this course, I hope to examine the way in which potentially subversive queer cultural productions negotiate a space within the dominant culture in order to reach an audience that extends beyond the converted and to open up a space for greater tolerance and social change.

Exams: There will be a midterm and a final administered on the following days.... Exams will consist of short answer questions, requiring about a paragraph response to each. Make up exams will only be given if the student has a compelling excuse for missing regularly scheduled test.

Essay: Students will be expected to write a six to eight page critical analysis of a primary work from the reading list, the goal of which is to create a thoughtful and unified discussion of a single or several related features of a primary text while integrating no fewer than five secondary sources, either critical or theoretical. All essays must be typed and turned in on Each day that an essay is late, it will fall a letter grade.

Academic Integrity: Academic Dishonesty will not be tolerated in this course. This includes but is not limited to cheating on exams and plagiarizing or fabricating source materials for essay assignments. If a student violates the academic integrity policy s/he will receive an "F" for the assignment and/or the course. The student will also be reported to the Academic Integrity Coordinator and may be subject to still more sanctions which could even include suspension or expulsion from the University. When a student turns in a paper to me, s/he is affirming that s/he understands the rules prohibiting plagiarism, and any evidence of dishonesty will be construed as willful. In other words, once the student turns in a paper to me, it is too late to claim that s/he did not know what plagiarism is. The student has the responsibility to determine in advance that h/er research and composition

Abstracts: Each student will read three secondary articles/chapters that discuss a work from the reading list and will write a single page summary for each of these works. This assignment is due on Also, the articles that the student reads must be at least five pages long, and those that merely summarize the primary work (*Master plots, Cliff Notes, Monarch Notes* etc.) are not acceptable for this assignment. Computer sources are not acceptable for any of the writing assignments in this class unless approved by the instructor in advance.

Class Participation: Students will be expected to participate in class discussions. Five percent of the grade will be attributed to participation.

Attendance: The student is permitted to miss no more then ten percent of the scheduled class periods. For a night class, this would be a total of two class periods. Those who exceed two will fail the course. Those who are late will incur a half absence for the period. Remember the two absences are specifically for emergencies and sickness; thus the student cannot miss two times and then produce excuses for further absences. Two is the limit.

Course Text: The Stage Management Handbook, by Daniel A. Ionazzi

Course Description & Objective

THE300, Stage Management, is an upper level course designed to examine the role of the Stage Manager in a theatrical production. This course will focus on in-depth exploration concerning the function and purpose of Stage Management, ultimately culminating in an advanced understanding of Stage Management and why it is a crucial dynamic to theatrical productions.

Further, it is expected that upon completion of this course the student will be knowledgeable, "well-equipped", and prepared to take on the task of serving as a competent Stage Manager as needed for EKU Theatre productions, but also as one seeks to establish a theatrical career upon graduation.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of THE 300 Stage Management, the student will be able to:

- 1. Articulate the role and responsibilities of a Stage Manager in theatrical production, in general, and for EKU Theatre, in particular
- 2. Serve as a competent and knowledgeable Stage Manager in the working theatre
- 3. Create and administer a serviceable working environment in the rehearsal and performance processes

Course Requirements

The prerequisites for this course are Stagecraft (THE110) and Acting II (THE235). Due to the intensive nature of this course, this course is not open to freshman or non-majors. Students without the proper prerequisites may be granted admission into the course pending instructor approval.

Course Methodology

THE300, Stage Management, will incorporate instructional methods such as: Lecture, Open Discussion, Assignments & Exercises, and Demonstration/Practical Application.

The evaluation tools used in this course may include, but are not limited to; Midterm & Final Examination, Class Participation, Attendance, Minor Projects & Assignments, and a Major Project (Production Book).

This course will entail the detailed study of the three main areas of concentration for a Stage Manager (as well as all involved with a theatrical production). Each focus will be broken down as follows:

- D) Blocking & Notation
- E) Tech & Dress
- F) Command & Control

Performance:

- A) The Physical Plant
- B) Basic Electricity, Lighting, & Sound
- C) Troubleshooting & Emergency Measures
- D) Pre-Performance
- E) Command & Control
- F) Running/Maintaining the Show

Besides gaining basic competence in each of these areas, it is hoped the student will develop an appreciation for all of the technicians involved in any theatrical production and learn proper technical theatre practices, responsibilities and management structuring.

Learning Objectives & Means of Evaluation

Objective 1. Students will be able to explain general principles of cognitive neuroscience and a system's approach to the study of brain function.

Evaluation. Each exam will include questions that will require the student to relate general principles in the field and a system's approach to the study of brain function.

Objective 2. Students will be able to explain the general methods, approaches, and technological bases of cognitive neuroscience techniques.

Evaluation. Each exam will include questions that will require students to describe the methodological procedures, approaches, and technological strengths and limitations that characterize and distinguish techniques used in cognitive neuroscience techniques.

Objective 3. Students will be able to use the basic vocabulary in cognitive neuroscience.

Evaluation. Each exam will include questions that will test students' knowledge of key terms and theories discussed in the textbook, readings, and lectures. The appropriate inclusion and use of key terms will also be evaluated in the research paper, class presentation, and in-class discussions.

Objective 4. Students will be able to apply cognitive neuroscience principles to understanding the brain bases of everyday thoughts and behaviors.

Evaluation. Each exam will include at least one question that will require the application of principles and theories to an everyday task or activity.

Objective 5. Students will be able to critically evaluate recent advances in cognitive neuroscience, including determining the strengths and limitations of new scientific findings and breakthroughs.

Evaluation. The research paper, oral presentation, and in-class presentation of a research article will be evaluated for integrating past and current theories and approaches in cognitive neuroscience. Additional evaluation will occur in the context of in-class participation.

<u>General Summary of Grade Calculation</u>: There are 500 possible points in this class. The first two exams are non-cumulative, and count for 100 points each. The final (third) exam is cumulative and counts for 130 points. The research paper (100 points) and class presentation of the paper (10 points) collectively make up another 110 points. The last 60 points come from presenting a research article to the class (40 points) and in-class participation (20 points). Your course grade will be based on a standard grading scale with 90 – 100 % = A, 80 – 89 % = B, 70 – 79 % = C, 60 – 69 % = D, & 59 % and below = F. Thus, the point cutoff is 450 points for an A, 400 points for a B, etc..

Exams & Adjustment Procedures: There will be three exams:

- Each of the first two exams are not comprehensive and will consist of short answer and essay questions.
- The third (final) exam will be comprehensive and will consist of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions.

<u>Make-up Exams & Deadlines:</u> Missed exams will be excused only with legitimate documentation that verifies a valid illness, emergency or conflicting school function. **Make-up exams will be given up to a week following the exam at the convenience of the instructor.**

<u>Research Article Presentation</u>: During the semester, you will need to write a written summary of an article and use this summary to discuss this article's contents to the class. A list of articles will be provided for you to choose from, and each student will summarize a different article. A total of 40 points will be awarded based on the quality of your written summary and oral discussion.

<u>Research Paper:</u> A 9 – 13 page research paper will be due towards the end of the semester. The paper will review and discuss research concerning a particular topic in cognitive neuroscience. Although this writing assignment must adhere to APA format, the paper must also contain a cover page, 7 to 10 full pages of body, and a reference page. Each paper must also contain at least 7 primary references, be word processed with 12 point Times New Roman font, left justified, double spaced, and have one inch margins. The final draft will be worth 100 points and will be graded on thoroughness, integration of past and current theories and approaches, scientific tonality, clarity and logical flow, adherence to length and format requirements, and grammar and spelling errors. Note that plagiarism will not be tolerated and may result in failing or being dropped from the course. This means that you must clearly distinguish other's ideas and concepts (i.e., cite their work) from your own. Late writing assignments will be penalized 10% per day. *Note that all assignments must be given to the professor in person*.

For the oral class presentation, you will give the class an oral synopsis of your paper. You will need to discuss what question(s) directed your inquiry, summarize the research relevant to your inquiry, and discuss your findings and conclusions. Your presentation should last 10-12 minutes, allowing for at least 3 minutes to field questions. This presentation is worth 10 points. Failure to complete an oral presentation will result in a 10% reduction in your final grade.

<u>Written Work Policy</u>: Students are expected to use correct grammar, spelling, and composition in written assignments. These elements of writing will be taken into consideration in grading all out-of-class writing assignments. If you would like free help with your writing, you may use the writing lab located at Case Annex 173 (622-6191).

To teach, to learn, to help others teach and learn.

The Office of Teacher Admission and Certification is responsible for admitting students to professional education programs at EKU. In addition, certification applications for teachers and school personnel (principals, supervisors, superintendents, counselors, pupil personnel directors, business administrators, librarians, and speech pathologists) are processed through the Office of Teacher Admission and Certification.

To be recommended for certification, all students seeking initial teacher certification, regardless of the college in which they are enrolled, must meet the requirements for admission to professional education, complete an approved teaching curriculum, and pass the required PRAXIS tests as determined by the major/minor.

Students are advised to enroll in EDF 103, Introduction to Education, during their freshman year and in EDF 203, Schooling and Society, during their sophomore year. However, students should not enroll in EDF 103 until all developmental requirements have been met. EDF 310 will be required for students who have an equivalent transfer course for EDF 203.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS and APPLICATION PROCESS

Admission to Professional Education

Admission to the University (academic college) is not synonymous with admission to professional education. Students will apply for admission to professional education in the College of Education's Office of Teacher Admission and Certification (Combs 423). Formal applications will be accepted based upon completion of the following requirements:

A. Hours / Residence

- Complete 60 hours of credit (excluding developmental level courses).
- Transfer students must complete 12 hours of credit at EKU.

B. Admission Test Requirement

- A passing score on one of the following tests:
 - ACT (American College Test Fall 1989 or after)
 - 21 Composite OR Alternative ACT Options: 20 Composite with an overall GPA of 3.00 or

19 Composite with an overall GPA of 3.25

Individuals using an alternative ACT option must maintain or exceed the overall corresponding GPA requirement throughout the program. GPA compliance will be reviewed each semester. Individuals using an ACT alternative option will be required to participate in a PRAXIS preparation program to help ensure success on the PRAXIS exams.

C. GPA and Grade Requirements

- Minimum overall 2.75 on all undergraduate course work. Candidates using an alternative ACT option must maintain or exceed the
 overall corresponding GPA requirement throughout their program.
- Minimum 2.75 on college work at EKU.
- Satisfactory grade in EDF 103 and a grade of "C" or higher in EDF 203 (requires completion of admission test requirement [section B] prior to enrollment), ENG 101 and ENG 102.
- Satisfactory grade in EDF 310 for transfer students having completed EDF 203 at another institution.

Undergraduate degree student GPA is based on the hours attempted as shown on the official EKU transcript. Post degree certification student GPA is based on all undergraduate course work and on the hours attempted as shown on the official EKU transcript.

D. Mathematics Requirement

• Complete a college level math course: MAT 105 or higher (excluding MAT 201 and 202) with a grade of "C" or higher.

E. Computer Literacy

• Complete CSC 104 or CIS 212 with a grade of "C" or higher.

Students with prior computer knowledge and skills may demonstrate proficiency by satisfactorily completing both the written and performance portions (word processing, database, spread sheet) of the computer literacy test. Students who fail the test must complete CSC 104 or CIS 212 with a grade of "C" or better. The test option is not available for students required to take CSC 104 or CIS 212 as a part of their major. The university course by examination will not satisfy the computer literacy requirement for the College of Education since it does not have a performance component.

F. UWR (University Writing Requirement)

 Achieve satisfactory performance on the University Writing Requirement. (Undergraduate students should also refer to University requirements described in the current Undergraduate Catalog).

F. Oral and Written Communication

- Oral communication: A grade of "C" or higher in CMS 100 or CMS 210
- Written Communication: A grade of "C" or higher inENG 101 and ENG 102 or HON 102 or a grade of "B" or higher in ENG 105 (those earning "C" must also take ENG 102).

G. Examinations

- Achieve satisfactory results on examinations taken in EDF 103 and 203 and on other examinations which may be required by the Professional Education Admissions Committee.
- Demonstrate proficiency in oral and written communication including evidence of satisfactory speech and hearing screening. Screening is provided by the Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic in Wallace 278 B.
- Students scoring below minimum requirements on the tests for oral and written communication shall be required to improve their competencies to an acceptable level before admission to professional education. This may include therapy, tutoring, and enrollment in credit or non-credit remediation courses.
- Any hearing impaired student unable to pass the speech and hearing screening who can benefit from remediation should receive it. Documentation concerning remediation and communication competency (oral or manual) must be provided to the Speech and Hearing Clinic. The Clinic, in consultation with faculty of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program will submit a recommendation for consideration for admission to the Office of Student Services. This should include documentation of communication competence.

H. Recommendations

• Submit satisfactory recommendations from *four* EKU faculty members including the EDF 203 instructor, the advisor and two faculty members with one being from the major.

I. Interview / Portfolio

• Satisfactorily complete a formal interview which will include the portfolio presentation. Two faculty members will conduct the interview and portfolio review process.

J. Ethics Declaration

Complete and sign a "Personal and Professional Fitness Declaration" form. This process includes a review of the Professional Code of Ethics for Kentucky School Personnel established in 16 KAR1:020.

NOTE: Based on your disclosure an interview by the Professional Education Admission Committee may be required.

K. Student Behavior

- Have no physical or psychological impairments that would preclude teaching success.
- Students preparing to work in schools as teachers or other professional school personnel must demonstrate dispositions necessary to help all students learn.
- Demonstrate acceptable social behavior at the University and in the community-at-large.* A student interview may be required by the Professional Education Admissions Committee.

• Student admission status may be reevaluated if the student is placed on either academic or social probation or has a record of criminal conviction(s).* A student interview may be required by the Professional Education Admissions Committee.

The Office of Teacher Admission and Certification will also contact the Administrative Office of the Courts to obtain a criminal records check for each candidate for admissions to professional education.

The Office of Teacher Admission and Certification will process the formal "Application for Admission to Professional Education." The Professional Education Admissions Committee will review applications, supporting documentation, and other relevant materials brought before the committee and will take appropriate action concerning the student's admission to the professional education program. The student will be notified of the committee's decision.

Course Descriptions

Core Courses (18 hours)

COR 100: Orientation to Online Learning (3)

Focuses on department goals and objectives, curriculum, student - faculty relationships, career options, and the development of competencies needed for success in college and professional environments. Includes experiential activities designed to promote team-building and leadership skills.

COR 201: Introduction to Corrections and Juvenile Justice (3)

An introduction to the concepts, history, processes, and issues in corrections and juvenile justice within the social and legal contexts that these systems function.

COR 301: Institutional Corrections (3)

Surveys history and current status of jails and various types of adult prisons with emphasis on punishment rationales, institutional programs and procedures, inmates' social structures, correctional officers, and contemporary issues.

COR 315: Legal and Ethical Issues in Adult Corrections (3)

An overview of legal court decisions related to adult corrections. An analysis of the various ethical issues surrounding adult correctional contexts and practices.

COR 330: Community Corrections (3)

Surveys history and current status of community correctional programs, including diversion, probation, parole, and other community programs for adult offenders, with emphasis on programmatic philosophies, operations, effectiveness, and related issues.

COR 350: Evidence-Based Offender Intervention Strategies (3)

An in-depth examination of the treatment role of the correctional worker in juvenile and adult settings. Includes a historical and theoretical review with particular emphasis on contemporary approaches to treatment. Both institutional and community-based efforts are discussed.

Elective Courses (6 hours)

COR 310: Foundations of Correctional and Juvenile Justice Practice (3)

Provides a basis for informed responses to delinquency and crime. Examines the conceptual foundations of correctional and juvenile practice from a multidisciplinary standpoint and implications for the effectiveness of these practices.

COR 340: Correctional and Juvenile Justice Administration (3)

Application of management concepts to corrections with emphasis on organizational structure, planning, decision-making, and directing.

Special Topics Electives (COR 423 or COR 320)

Intervening with Drug-Involved Offenders (3)

Examines the link between substance abuse, criminal behavior, and other problem outcomes. Reviews the categories of drugs and the physical, psychological, and social effects of their use. Examines evidence-based strategies for intervening with substance abuse.

Addressing the Mental Health Needs of Offenders (3)

Examines the etiology and effects of mental health problems common to the adult offender population. Describes strategies for intervention within corrections and juvenile justice contexts.

Women in Corrections (3)

Analyzes recent trends in the arrests and dispositions of female offenders. Examines relevant theories of female crime. Reviews research regarding gender-responsive programming. Also examines the challenges faced and recent advancements by women employed in correctional agencies.

Gang Identification and Intervention (3)

Provides an in-depth examination of the gang subculture, the functions that gangs serve within community and institutional contexts, and effective techniques of gang intervention.

Diversity in Corrections and Juvenile Justice (3)

Examines various forms of diversity (e.g., race, ethnicity, sexual orientation) in corrections and juvenile justice populations, and the variation in causes and patterns of criminal behavior across subgroups. Discusses strategies for enhancing cultural sensitivity among correctional and juvenile justice workers.

American Jails (3)

Explores the operation and administration of American jails as a key component of contemporary correctional systems. Examines the political and fiscal challenges faced by local jails and the multiple functions that jails serve within a community.

The Death Penalty (3)

An introduction to the history and use of the death penalty in the United States. A indepth examination of the purpose, fairness, and efficacy of the death penalty through a balanced coverage of all sides of the debate.

Generally, a minor consists of the same discipline-based courses that are found in a major. Assuming the just stated premise is valid, it then becomes illogical or at least inconsistent to treat a course differently depending on whether it is serving as a "major" course or a "minor" course. What if a student decided to expand a minor into a major? Would you want a course in the minor that is allowed to be doubled counted as GE then is disallowed as a double-counted course in the major? That type of inconsistency will not pleased students nor accrediting bodies simply because a policy is not being consistently administered.

The College of Education does "double dip" as you put it. We use gen ed courses as part of the courses accepted for students in Middle grades and Elementary education with emphasis areas in English, math science and social studies and we also do this for our secondary teachers in these areas. With other requirements for content we have from the state accreditation and NCATE authorities, to change and not double dip would mean we would have to extend our degrees and this would not make us competitive with other institutions in Kentucky. Janna, Onda, Gary, Laurie Sissel, and I have been having this conversation. According to Laurie Sissel (who actually programs CARES):

Janna and Gary,

For as long as I have been here, students have been allowed to double dip on gen. ed. and a minor **unless** the minor was a specified required minor for the major. An agriculture or horticulture major with a required minor in business could not use ECO 230 and 231 in both gen. ed. and the minor because the minor was required. However, if a business student had a history minor, he could use HIS 202 and 203 in both the minor and gen. ed.

My question to Onda earlier was if this "double dipping" is allowed, does CARES automatically let or make it happen (without an exception form).

Julie Price and I actually played around in Banner this morning to see if CARES automatically allows the use of a gen ed course in a minor and in the gen ed block IF THE MAJOR DOES NOT REQUIRE A MINOR.

We created a dummy student who is an Accounting major with a minor in Communication Studies. The Accounting major requires CMS 210 in Block IC, and the minor also requires CMS210.

CARES DID AUTOMATICALLY ALLOW THE GEN ED COURSE TO BE USED IN THE MINOR AND BLOCK IC.

Since this automatically happened, I do not see how the issue could be handled differently between colleges.

The discussion of "double-dipping" (DD) of general education (GE) courses with requirements of the minor must be considered from multiple and, in some cases, competing perspectives. Among these are:

- Curricular the interplay among general education, major, supporting course and minor courses in the academic development of students
- Retention expediency in pursuit of individual students' academic goals
- Fairness equitable treatment of students in different academic programs
- Efficiency ease with which students, faculty and administrators may comprehend academic policies and express those policies via technology such as CARES reports.

Curricular

A review of policies at benchmark institutions found only a very limited discussion of minors and their relationship to GE. Only a couple of institutions marginally restricted the number of credits that could apply to both GE and the minor. <u>None found in this review completely prohibit the use of GE courses to fulfill minor requirements</u>.

When looking to the relationship of GE to major/supporting courses in an attempt to identify underlying philosophies, UNC, Greensboro states, "To the extent possible, learning in the General Education Core should provide foundations and alternative perspectives for the more specialized knowledge gained in the major, while learning in the major should build upon and extend the work that is done in general education courses." However, in practice that institution has no restrictions on DD either in major or minor courses. A number of institutions specify that GE course work may not be applied to the first major, but allow unlimited GE "double-dipping" in a second major. In such cases it could be assumed that courses in a minor would be treated similarly.

The summary conclusion is that the application of GE credits toward minor requirements does not erode the philosophy of GE. That said, there are some institutions that differentiate between *disciplinary* and *interdisciplinary* minors. It is conceivable that an interdisciplinary minor could be completely constructed of general education courses. In such a case, would it be acceptable from a curricular point of view to allow such an option? If not, the University might consider language that would limit the number of GE courses that could be incorporated into a minor.

Retention

Everyone appreciates when their efforts have value-added results. Just as many of our students and their families appreciate that EKU does not charge tuition beyond the first 12 hours ("take 15 hours and get 20% free"), students are also grateful when their academic efforts serve multiple purposes. In fact, DD might encourage more students to add a minor. The result might ultimately be added breadth experiences, rather than limiting same. When viewed strictly from a retention viewpoint there appears to be no down side to DD.

Fairness

Some majors require minors. Since the minor is a requirement of the major, should the minor fall under the same GE guidelines that are applied to supporting courses in a major? To my knowledge, at the present time no majors that require minors have GE category exclusions, so the spirit of GE appears to remain intact even if minors re-use GE credits. Will it always be the case that majors which require minors will not have GE exclusions? What if a minor is developed as described in the last paragraph under the curricular area, above?

Efficiency

Based on feedback from Laurie Sissel, the current programming of CARES does not restrict the "double-dipping" of GE and minor courses. She could best speak to the amount of programming that would be involved if the University decides to limit "double-dipping" of GE and minor courses.

Since some EKU college offices already apply GE credits to minors the question is whether this is the norm. If so, a change would require some retraining and revision of procedures.

Efficiency also relates to the ease with which policies can be communicated to and understood by students and advisors. Policies of institutions that allow DD, but limit the number of credits that can be "dipped" seem cumbersome to monitor. From an advising and retention point of view this is not the optimal choice.

Finally, I've been trying to think of a term other than "double-dipping" that accurately conveys that action. The term does have a pejorative ring. How about "course recycling?" ©

The Women Studies Board met at its regularly scheduled meeting on October 2, 2007 at which time it entertained a proposal to change the name of the Women Studies program to Women and Gender Studies. After a lengthy discussion including national trends, program focus, faculty interest, student demographics, and CPE mandates for 20/20, the Board unanimously approved changing the name of the certificate program to Women and Gender Studies.

As the founding director of women studies at the University of Akron in 1984-1990, and as a former executive board member of the National Women's Studies Association, as well as founding member and vice chair of the State of Ohio Women's Commission, I am well qualified to provide an explanation and justification of this decision.

We believe this new name better defines our focus and is more inclusive of both the interests and needs of our students and the interests and expertise of our faculty. No more is the addition of the term gender an attempt to placate those who opposed women's equality, but rather a manifestation of society acknowledging and recognizing the worth of all its people. Women Studies programs across the country are changing their program names to include this concept of partnership and community across sex and gender identities.

EKU strives to prepare our students for the work place, the global economy, and the geo-political world. This program of study contributes significantly to achieving this goal. EKU wants to recruit, retain and graduate students. This program of study contributes significantly to achieving these goals. EKU wants to attract and retain excellent faculty and staff. This program contributes significantly to achieving these goals. We hope you concur and support the change of name from Women Studies to Women and Gender Studies.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course serves as an introduction to the black literary voice, stressing the connections between minority and mainstream voices in American literature. Students will examine trends and themes in these texts to better understand the issues of being a minority in a larger white culture in America both before and after manumission.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

This course will generally foster a dialogue between the class and the professor with occasional workshops and brief lectures. I believe in an exchange of ideas; this necessitates your reading and reflecting on the daily assignment before you arrive in class. All texts are to be completed before the first day of discussion. I reserve the right to give unannounced reading quizzes (though I warn you from the outset that reading quizzes will occur often). Students will write two (2) different papers, will present an oral project on the first day of a particular work, will take a midterm examination and will write a cumulative final examination. Students are expected to attend each class period. Attendance will be taken.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Students will identify and examine the history, roles, contributions and/or experiences of African-American people through a close study of literature (poetry, stories, folktales, novels, drama) written by and about African Americans.

Students will demonstrate an understanding of the historical and cultural issues that have shaped the interactions of African-American people with other ethnic and cultural populations in the United States.

Students will identify and analyze racial, cultural and historical assumptions and biases in the United States and recognize and question their consequences at personal, social, and cultural levels.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Demonstrate an initial understanding of texts read in view of the African-American experience.
- 2. Identify and analyze various ideas and literary movements in African-American literature.
- 3. Effectively communicate through oral and written means critical and analytical ideas about African-American literature.
- 4. Identify how citizens and non-citizens of different races and ethnicities in the United States relate through thought and culture to each other
- 5. Demonstrate skills of productive collaboration with peers.
- 6. Show mastery of the academic conventions of attribution and the effective ethical use of sources.
- 7. Demonstrate appropriate use of information technology.

Successful class participation is comprised of the following:

- constructive contribution to class discussion
- constructive contribution to group exercises
- regular attendance
- punctuality
- positive attitude in the classroom (this can not be emphasized enough)

DAILY QUIZZES: I will often give a reading quiz on the material required for that day. If you have read that material carefully, you should have little problem completing the quiz. These quizzes can NOT be made up. If you can demonstrate that you are exempt from that class due to a valid *university* excuse, then I will not count that quiz (see "Excused Absences" below).

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION: I expect each student to attend every class. Missing class will impact your final grade in a number of ways. You will lose attendance/participation points from the "Participation/Attendance" portion of your grade; you will not be allowed to make-up the daily reading quiz or writing portion of that class period lowering the "Daily quizzes" portion of your final grade; and you will probably be less prepared for the tests and the final exam. Equally importantly, participation literally means doing just that. Coming to class and simply sitting in a chair does not aid in an interaction of ideas. The ideal classroom is one in which everyone shares individual ideas which the group then evaluates allowing everyone present to re-imagine his or her own concept on that topic. Coming to class is good, but not enough. I have allocated 15% of the final grade for "Participation/Attendance" – do not believe that simply being present is enough while attendance is crucial, I will also assess you actual participation in the verbal ideas expressed in the classroom on a daily basis.

EXCUSED ABSENCES: These are determined by the university rather than by the instructor. When you present an official letter from some recognized academic area of the administration telling me that you are to be excused since you are representing the university in some formal capacity, you are then considered excused without penalty. Doctor's notes, mother's notes, work notes, etc. are not the same. They do not constitute in themselves a valid absence. Don't Miss Class!! I follow the Department of English and Theatre guidelines. Missing more than 10% of the total number of classes will result in automatic failure.

PAPERS: You have two papers to write in this course. I expect originality, outside sources, and a synthesis of ideas and information (your own and those of critic). We will discuss plagiarism (in all its forms – summary, paraphrase and quote) which is not only unacceptable but unforgivable. Do not steal another's ideas whether in text or on line. If you do and are caught, the result is failure in the course and possible expulsion from the university. I will turn any plagiarism problems over to the appropriate areas of the University.

ORAL PROJECT: The list of Oral Project dates and topics has been posted on my office door. Each group of two is responsible for a presentation of 20 minutes. There are no make-up dates. I expect you to arrive at the beginning of class and begin your presentation. Notice how much the presentation is worth – 15%. I expect these to be informative, professional, smoothly delivered and carefully prepared. DO NOT rely on plot summary; biography should be used ONLY if it directly and meaningfully addresses the work of literature itself. I welcome meeting you in my office to discuss the project, but NOT the day before you plan to deliver. This does not allow you enough time to re-prepare should we find problems with what you plan to do.

TESTS AND FINAL EXAM: Tests #1 and 2 cover only the material leading up to them (that is, Test #1 covers only May 22-May 31 while Test #2 covers only June 5 – June 12). The final exam is comprehensive and covers the entire course from the very first day until the last day.

PAPER REQUIREMENTS:

Each student will write three (3) critical essays (3-4 pages). The essays will be turned in at the beginning of the class on the day on which they are due. Late papers will **NOT** be accepted unless prior arrangements have been made. In the event that it is necessary for you to miss class when the paper is due (because of illness or an emergency), you are required to send your paper to class by one of your classmates. I do not accept emailed papers. Proofreading is an essential skill for the effective writer. One advantage of a word processor is the "spell check." Please use the spell check as another tool to create the best possible paper.

ATTENDANCE:

I follow the policy dictated by the Department of English and Theatre at Eastern Kentucky University. You cannot miss more than 10% of the total number of class meetings. If you do, you automatically fail the course. DO NOT ASSUME that you are therefore allowed to miss a certain number of class days. I take attendance regularly. Absences will markedly affect the class participation portion of your final grade. Unlike larger lecture classes, our course is composed of fewer students. Each missing member on a particular day narrows the range of responses to that particular topic of discussion covered.

Paper #1 –

In a 4-5 page researched paper please discuss the gender differences between how Jacobs and Douglass approach the problems of writing a slave narrative. That is, how does each author present his/her own gender and opposite genders? How does each author deal with concepts of marriage? How does each author deal with concepts of sexuality? How does each author deal with concepts of family? Why do you think that each author makes the assumptions that he/she does? (You need to use at least four sources, at least two of which have to be off-line [print]).

Paper #2 -

Looking at the two chapters "Cora Lee" and "The Two" of *The Women of Brewster Place* discuss the problems of race and sexuality in the broader understanding of American mores. What is Naylor suggesting about the human need to seek companionship? Does poverty affect this drive? Why does society feel the need to disrupt monogamous lesbianism while condoning – at least to some extent – repeated heterosexual liaisons with different partners out of wedlock? (You need to use at least four sources, at least two of which have to be off-line [print]).

COURSE PURPOSE: The purpose of GSD 225 Leadership Dynamics is to utilize service learning as a pedagogical tool, fostering civic engagement through an examination of leadership dynamics, ultimately with the goal of supporting Eastern Kentucky University's Quality Enhancement Plan of developing informed, critical and creative thinkers who communicate effectively.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: During the NOVA GSD 225 Leadership Dynamics course you will:

- Examine basic concepts and theories associated with leadership
- Actively participate in a service-learning experience
- Engage in reflective self-appraisal of your own leadership potential
- Develop an understanding of the complexities of team work
- Demonstrate the ability to politically advocate for a selected cause

SERVICE LEARNING: This semester you will be working with a team to engage in service learning. Service learning is an academic experiential educational method in which students participate in an organized service activity that meets identified community needs and reflects on the service activity in such a way as to:

- Gain further understanding of course content,
- Develop critical thinking skills, and
- Develop an enhanced sense of civic responsibility.

This process of learning is highly experiential in nature and requires a substantial amount of teamwork. Throughout the semester, your team will be working to research and provide service for an identified community need, while learning how to politically advocate for a related issue. You will engage in service <u>no less than 5 hours</u> outside of class. Ample class time will be provided for team meetings. More will be said of this exciting portion of our class as the semester unfolds.

Service-Learning differs from community service activities in that:

- Service-learning strives to achieve a balance between service and learning objectives in service-learning partners must negotiate the differences in their needs and expectations.
- Service-learning places an emphasis on addressing community concerns.
- In service-learning, there is the integral involvement of community partners.
- Service-learning emphasizes reciprocal learning In service-learning, traditional definitions of "faculty," "teacher" and "learner" are intentionally blurred. We all learn from each other.
- Service-learning emphasizes reflective practice In service-learning, reflection facilitates the connection between practice and theory and fosters critical thinking.
- Service-learning places an emphasis on developing citizenship skills.

REFLECTIONS:

An integral part of service learning involves reflecting upon what has been learned in class, what has been done for the community, and what these two actions have done to help you grow and develop your own leadership skills. Several times throughout the semester you will be reflecting about these experiences, and making connections among leadership, service, teamwork, oral and written communication, and conflict resolution (to name a few). Ultimately, this class and the reflections you create are designed to increase your critical and creative thinking skills while assisting your oral and written communication competence through service and reflective practices.

POLITICAL ADVOCACY: Another important way you will engage yourself in developing your leadership skills is through advocating for a cause. As the semester progresses, we will have guest speakers share with us how to become more politically engaged, and how doing so creates a sense of citizenry in our society. You will be required to produce a letter to an individual in government advocating for your cause. More will be said of this important piece to our puzzle later.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Everyone has the potential to be a leader. As such, leaders make a point to be present, to be engaged, <u>and</u> to be prepared. Since participation is essential to your leadership development and sense of civic responsibility, you are required to make <u>every</u> class. **Missing 3 or more classes (unexcused or excused) at midterm results in a failing grade for GSD 225. Finally, missing 5 or more classes throughout the semester without a <u>University-approved</u> excuse will result in a failing grade for GSD 225.**

As a teammate and developing leader, you have a responsibility to your team to be at each class session, at each out-of-class meeting, and at each service learning event. If you miss, it is your responsibility to make contact with your team to find out what you missed and what you need to do to remain up-to-date with your assigned responsibilities.

A single section of a course or the entire course can be eligible for this designation. If the department wishes for the "S" to appear after the course number, the normal procedure for a curriculum change must be followed. The Curriculum Change Form must be approved by the department, college, council on academic affairs, and any other relevant committee.
