

Letter From The Commissioner

To The District Tournament Manager:

Will you please refer to your K.H.S.A.A. booklet which gives rules and regulations governing basketball tournaments. You should familiarize yourself with these rules, found on pages 31-39. Your special attention is called to the second paragraph of Tournament Rule VI-A-3, relative to the enrollment of your district coaches in the Kentucky High School Coaches Association.

The forms for your various reports are selfexplanatory. The report of games should be mailed to the manager of the regional tournament not later than Monday, March 8. Send your financial report, your checked eligibility lists, and the second copy of the report of games to the Commissioner as soon after the tournament as possible. For your convenience, the following check list is given:

Invite member schools to your tournament AT ONCE, reminding each school to send each other member school in the district a COMPLETE preliminary list of players on or before February 1, and to send you THREE copies of a final list one week prior to the district tournament. See Rule VIII.

2. Announce the time of drawings in your

letter. See Rule IX. 3. At your meeting, conduct the drawings and select the officials. The state plan for division of tournament receipts is recommended. If any other plan is used, a majority vote of the partici-

a that is the analytic of the particle pating schools must be obtained. 4. Your attention is called especially to the last two paragraphs of Tournament Rule V-A, and to Tournament Rule V-C.

5. The following procedure has been estab-ished by the Board of Control in the selection of tournament officials under authority given in Tournament Rule V-A: (a) Each school represented at the meeting may submit the names of one or more officials. There shall be a minimum of eight names on the list of officials to be voted on. NO NAME SHALL BE MARKED OFF THE LIST. (b) Each school representative shall rank eight officials in the order of his preference, the first choice being assigned eight points, the second seven points, etc. (c) The tournament manager shall communicate at once with the highest ranking official or officials in the order of their rank. If the official who is selected can not be reached within one hour of the time of his selection, or if he is not available, the tournament manager shall attempt to employ the next official or officials on the list in the order of their selection. If the tournament manager attempts to contact the official by telephone and there is no answer, the manager should check with the operator for a possible change in the official's number. (d) If two officials are tied on points, the highest ranking offi-cial shall be determined by flipping a coin. (e) If none of the officials on the list is available, the tournament manager shall have the sole responsibility of securing an official or officials for the tournament.

6. Tournament Rule XV says: "The Board of Control is authorized to select, standardize, and purchase trophies for all district and regional tournaments and the cost of these trophies shall be borne by the respective districts and regions." The Board has contracted with Riherd's Sport Shop, Glasgow, Kentucky, to supply all of the of-ficial K.H.S.A.A. district first place and second place basketball trophies for the 1971 tournaments, each trophy complete with the Association seal and engraving. Your trophies will be shipped to you prior to March 1.

7. It is the responsibility of the tournament manager to secure adequate police protection.

8. THE BOARD OF CONTROL HAS RULED THAT NOT MORE THAN TWEVE PLAYERS MAY BE IN UNIFORM FOR ANY ONE TOUR-

NAMENT GAME, AND THAT OTHER SQUAD MEMBERS SHALL NOT BE ALLOWED TO PAR-TICIPATE IN WARM-UP EXERCISES, THIS BEING IMPLIED IN TOURNAMENT RULE XI.

9. Please ask your officials to designate the goals prior to the warmup time for each game.

10. You will receive three copies of a final cligibility list from each school. Have one of these checked by the coach of each competing team, before his team plays, for the twelve players he will use in each game. Use only one list for checking players on each team since the other two copies may be needed by the regional and state tour-nament managers. Send the Commissioner all of these checked copies with your other reports. Send the two unchecked copies of eligibility lists of the winner and runner-up to the manager of your regional tournament, along with one copy of your report of games, not later than March 8.

11. It has been ruled that the 2:00 o'clock mentioned in Tournament Rule IV-B may be considered Eastern Standard time or 1:00 P.M. CEN-TRAL STANDARD TIME. This information con-cerning the starting time of the regional meeting

should be given to your winner and runner-up. 12. Send Secretary Ohr of the Kentucky Coaches Association the list of district coaches to be enrolled in his organization and remittance for these, and send the Commissioner the various reports mentioned above as soon as possible.

13. Tournament Rule VI-A-3 provides that the district representative to the annual meeting may be allowed for expenses an amount not to exceed \$75.00. Since this is a maximum and not necessarily a fixed amount, the delegate should be asked to submit an estimate of the cost of his lodging, transportation, and meals because of his representing the district at the annual meeting.

Ted Sanford, Commissioner K.H.S.A.A. Attention!!!

The Board of Control has the authority to set the fees for district tournament officials. The following regulations for 1971 have been set by the Board: "The officials shall receive a fee of \$25.00 per game and a transportation allowance of 10c per mile for all necessary travel. In the event it is necessary for the official to remain overnight at the tournament site, he **shall** be paid an addi-tional \$20.00 per day for loding and meals."

Behind the ramp Joe Bill and Ted, J. D. and dozens more.



Major Activity of the 1971

Football Rules Committee

Anaheim, California, January 2-3, 1971

NOTE: This is a brief summary of the more important modifications to the football rules authorized by the National Alliance Rules Committee during its 1971 meeting.

QUESTIONNAIRES for the purpose of determining the acceptance of the committee's action in 1970 and for securing an evaluation of proposed changes were mailed to coaches and officials through state association offices, the National Junior College Athletic Association, and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics. Approximately 19,000 forms were distributed, and nearly 8,500 were returned and tabulated. The complete minutes contain a summary of the vote on each of the listed items, and a tabulation of the significant comments which were requested on the back of the questionnaire. The returns indicated a very high degree of satisfaction with the changes which had been made for the 1970 season. Providing that a charged time-out may be extended by an official's time-out for the continuance of a coach-official conference, or when a safety factor is involved, was favored by 96% of the respondents, as was defining a catch as securing posses-sion of a loose ball in flight by a player who is in-bounds. Specifying the location of the line-to-gain equipment was approved by a ratio of over 9 to 1. Classifying intentionally kicking or throwing the ball from the playing field following any score as unsportsmanlike conduct, was favored by 86% of the respondents. Eighty-five per cent favored exempting a player who inadvertently contacts a goal post placed on an end line from illegal participation. Two revisions receiving the smallest per-centage of acceptance, that being 80%, were requiring a replaced player to leave the field on the side of his team box and removing the loss of down from the penalty for an ineligible being illegally downfield during a forward pass which crosses the line. All the remaining changes were accepted by more than a 10 to 1 margin.

CRACKBACK BLOCKING, contributing to injuries, was mentioned as a major problem by almost one-third of the respondents and was most frequently mentioned as a major problem. Approximately one-fourth indicated that the use of striking blows by defensive linemen was a major concern. Closely related, and mentioned by slightly less than onefourth of the respondents, was illegal use of the forearm in blocking. Illegal acts against potential offensive pass receivers, by the defense, was a problem indicated by 1,770 respondents, while 1,625 indicated that metal-tipped cleats were a major cause of injury. In spite of the fact that one of the Points of Special Emphasis in 1970 dealt with team boxes and explained their purpose, 1,616 respondents noted that coaches and players being out of the team boxes needed attention. Other items mentioned as problems were: injuries resulting from butt blocking (908); and players lagging when moving into position for a kick-off following a try (783). The National Alliance Football Code already contains ample provisions to eliminate these problem areas if the rules are properly applied. The fact that respondents indicated that these were problems is an indication that games have not been well administered. It is the responsibility of those who train and supervise officials to provide adequate instruction, supervision, and evaluation which will insure the development of a greater degree of competency in officials.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

THE NATIONAL FEDERATION office receives a number of suggestions for improving or revising the National Alliance Football Code every year. The majority of suggestions, naturally, are received during the football season. Each proposal, along with recommendations from voting delegates and advisory members and the items from Parts II and III of the National Alliance football ques-tionnaire, is categorized and assigned to one of five standing subcommittees for study and consideration. Before any matter of rules revision may be brought before the National Alliance Football Rules Committee, it must have been con-sidered in one of the subcommittee meetings and approved for presentation to the committee of the whole, or be considered by virtue of being included as an item on the questionnaire. Preceding the opening session of the Football Rules Committee meeting, each subcommittee met to consider items on its agenda. Subcommittee meetings were scheduled so that the delegates were privileged to at-tend two different sessions. During the first general session, reports from the standing subcommittees were presented to the committee of the whole and provided a wealth of material upon which to base consideration during the voting session. Dur-ing this same session, the editor (committee secretary) reviewed the questionnaire items and the coniments as submitted. Each voting degelate was reminded to submit any other items and/or minority reports to the chairman if they were to be considered without unanimous consent. A complete copy of each of the reports from the Equip-ment, Injury Data, Game Administration, Research and Statistical, and Safety subcommittees is to be included in the complete minutes.

NOTE: The wording in the following statements is preliminary in nature and may or may not appear exactly in this manner in the 1971 Rules Book. The Editorial Committee has the responsibility of revising wording as necessary to correlate changes with other sections in the Code. Every effort is made to clearly and concisely represent committee action.

1-2-7: The top edge of the crossbar shall be 10' above the ground measured from the base of each upright to the top of the crossbar at the inter-



Minutes of Board Meeting

The Board of Control of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association met at Stouffer's Inn, Louisville, on Saturday morning, January 23, 1971. The meeting was called to order by President Don Davis at 8:30, with all Board members, Commissioner Theo. A. Sanford, and Assistant Commissioners J. B. Mansfield and Billy V. Wise present. The invocation was given by W. H. Crowdus.

James T. Dotson moved, seconded by Roy L. Winchester, that the reading of the minutes of the December 19th meeting be waived since the members of the Board had received copies of these minutes. The motion was carried unanimously.

The Commissioner recommended that the fol-

lowing regulations concerning the fees for district and regional basketball tournament officials be adopted: The district tournament official shall receive a fee of \$25.00 per game, the regional tour-nament official a fee of \$30.00 per game. The transportation allowance shall be 10 cents per mile for all necessary travel. In the event that it is necessary for the official to remain overnight at the tournament site, he shall be paid an additional \$20.00 per day for lodging and meals. Richard Vin-cent moved, seconded by J. C. Cantrell, that the regulations recommended by the Commissioner be adopted. The motion was carried unanimously.

Chairman Tom Mills of the Building Com-mittee presented to the Board a rendering of the proposed new K.H.S.A.A. office building, plans and specifications for which are currently being prepared by the architectual firm of Marye and Bond. W. H. Crowdus moved, seconded by James T. Dotson, that the Building Committee be given the power to act with respect to approving plans and specifications for the new K.H.S.A.A. building, with the understanding that no contractor's bid would be accepted without the approval of the Board of Control. The motion was carried unanimously,

There was a discussion of possible new proposals to be submitted by the Board at the forth-coming 1971 Delegate Assembly. No action was taken on these proposals at this time.

The Commissioner brought to the attention of the Board all of the correspondence in connection with the Larry Grisham transfer case, this boy being currently enrolled in the Frederick Fraize High School. He had ruled Larry Grisham ineligible for athletic competition under his interpretation of the Association's Transfer Rule. It was the opinion of the Board that the Commissioner had ruled correctly in the case, and the Board was unanimous in its decision not to re-store the eligibility of Larry Grisham under Article IV, Section 3-d-7, of the Constitution.

The Commissioner presented to the Board the request of Prin. Arthur J. Lloyd and Coach Jackie Jewell of the Wayne County High School, asking that in football the school be placed back in Class AA because of scheduling trouble. Tom Mills moved, seconded by James T. Dotson, that the request of the Wayne County representatives be granted. The motion was carried was carried unanimously.

The Commissioner presented to the Board a letter and supporting material which he had re-ceived from Donald B. Mills of the Richmond Jaycees, suggesting certain changes in the football playoff system. The Board took no action on the suggestions made.

suggestions made. During the December meeting of the Board, the Commissioner had presened a request of Brother Charles Blavat, Principal of the Bishop David High School, that for the purpose of play-ing varsity football the Bishop David High School be moved "FROM THE CITY CLASS AAA LEAGUE TO THE COUNTY REGION, WEST DISTRICT, CLASS AAA LEAGUE." The Board deferred action until a later meeting Attention deferred action until a later meeting. Attention was not called to the request of the Brother Blavat, The Board declined at this time to change the football region of the Bishop David High School.

James T. Dotson moved, seconded by J. C. Cantrell, that all bills of the Association for the period beginning December 1, 1970, and ending December 31, 1970, be allowed. The motion was carried unanimously.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

New Golf Film

The National Golf Foundation has produced a new film entitled COURTESY ON THE COURSE, A print of the film, a 16 mm, 17-minute sound film in color, has been secured by the K.H.S.A.A. and placed on loan with the Film Library, College of Education, University of Kentucky.

COURTESY ON THE COURSE illustrates and explains the ethics, courtesies, and customs of golf. The production of this film fills a longstanding need and will be of great assistance in teaching golf, both at the interscholastic and the physical education service course levels of the game.

COURTESY ON THE COURSE conveys a two-fold definition of golf etiquette through a positive presentation of procedures reflecting consideration of other players and concern for the golf course itself. In some situations it has been somewhat difficult to secure the use of a golf course because certain squads have misused them. The film content includes arrival and before-tee preparation; order of play; positioning and con-duct; alertness to the ball in flight; "Fore!"; rightof-way on adjacent fairway: measures to speed play: divot replacement; sand bunker procedures; positioning of equipment: play-through procedure: violations that hinder play; green etiquette; ball mark repair positioning; flagstick handling; recording of scores.

Basketball Questions

These interpretations of the rules of the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada do not set aside or modify any rule. The rulings are made by the National Federation of State High School Associations in response to situations presented.

22. Play: A coach, bench manager, player, squad member, substitute, or other team bench personnel is charged with his 3rd technical foul; or (b) Al flagrantly fouls B1.

Ruling: In (a) the person charged with his 3rd technical foul is removed, by rule, from the vicinity of the court. This applies whether the offender is a coach, a player, a squad member, a substitute, a team manager, or other bench personnel. The official has no option and may not set aside the provision which requires removal from the vicinity of the court. In (b) the flagrant personal foul disqualifies A from further participation in the contest, but in ordinary circumstances, the offender would not be required to leave the vicinity of the court. However, in an unusual situation, an official has the authority to require that a person who has committed a flagrant technical foul must leave the vicinity of the court. Such banishment is necessary, when permitting a disqualified player to remain at courtside would tend to incite the crowd, to incite the opponents, or to subject the officials, opponents, or others administering the game, to unsportsmanlike harassment. In such circumstances, the official should require the player who has committed a flagrant foul to leave the vicinity of the court. It must be emphasized that an official does have this authority, when the circumstances resulting from any flagrant foul warrant the banishment.

23. Play: A3 is attempting to make a throwin. He holds the ball through the plane of the end line. B3 grabs the ball and dribbles away for a lay-up and scores a field goal.

Ruling: A3 violates when he holds the ball through the plane of the end line on a throw-in, the violation prevents the ball from becoming alive. B3 has grabbed a dead ball. The ball will be awarded to team B for a throw-in at the spot of the violation.

24. Play: At the end of a dribble, Al passes to A2 and Al charges into B1: (a) simultaneously while making the pass; or (b) while the ball is clearly in flight; or (c) after the ball is touched by A2 and is rolling on the floor.

Ruling: Al is charged with a foul in (a), (b), and (c). In (a), there is doubt as to whether Al had control at the time he charged. This is interpreted to be a player control foul. No free throw is awarded and the ball is put in play by team B from out of bounds at the spot nearest the foul. It is not a player control foul in (b) and (c) and BI is awarded the proper number of free throws.

25. Play: Team A has used its 5 permissible charged time-outs. During the 4th quarter, Al is injured seriously enough that he cannot be removed from the floor during the 1 and $\frac{1}{2}$ minute period allowed for substitution.

Ruling: Team A is charged with a 6th timeout, and a technical foul is assessed even though the time-out is required by the injury. In the case of the injured player, only 1 time-out is charged, even though it takes several minutes to have him removed from the court and replaced.

26. Play: B3 breaks the plane of the free throw lane line with his foot during the free throw attempt of A3. The attempted free throw of A3 misses the rim.

Ruling: Double violation. Play is resumed by a jump ball between any two opponents at the nearer free throw line.

27. Play:The offensive man is standing still. May a defensive man move up close behind him, regardless of where the offensive man is standing?

Ruling: Yes. The defensive man (guard) may be as close as he desires to the offensive man, short of contact. Any member of the team with the ball (offensive man) can expect to be closely guarded, free throw situations excepted.

28. Play: B1 secures possession of a rebound from A's basket. B1 is in the front court of A (in other words, the back court of B). B1 attempts a long pass down the court to his teammate, B2. A2, standing in his front court close to the division line, leaps high in the air and intercepts a pass of B1 and then returns to the court, in the back court of team A with the ball in his control.

Ruling: A2 has caused the ball to go from the front court to the back court, and, therefore, has committed a floor violation. The ball is awarded to a nearby opponent for a throw-in at the out of bounds spot nearest the violation.

29. Play: Al strikes A2 during a live ball.

Ruling: Even though this were to occur when the ball is alive, it is not a personal foul because opponents are not involved. Whether the officials would ignore the fact or whether Al would be charged with unsportsmanlike conduct would depend upon the circumstances. Ordinarily unsportsmanlike actions are directed against an official or an opponent. Since opponents are not involved, it is quite likely the striking would be ignored, except in unusual circumstances where the spectators would be incited or the incident would provoke a delay of the game.

Comment: Unsportsmanlike tactics, in general, involve relationships between opponents, between the players and officials, between the spectators and officials, between the players and spectators, and between the coaches and spectators, and coaches and officials. In most situations, it does not apply to the relationship of a player to his teammates, nor to the coach and members of his team. However, these standards are not without exception. For example, profanity on the part of a participant, coach, or member of the squad is considered to be an unsportsmanlike act, whether or not the profanity is directed at any individual or merely is a means of "letting off steam."

30. Play: Player Bl takes a position 10 feet behind his stationary opponent, Al. Player Al then closes this gap by backing to within a few inces of player Bl. (Player Bl did not move, but merely held his position.) Contact results when Al makes normal body movement.

Ruling: Since player B1 did not move he is entitled to his spot on the floor. If there is more than incidental contact, A1 has committed a foul.

31. Play: Dribbler A1 is moving parallel with an end line. B1 attempts to force him out of bounds by making slight contact as he moves with him.

Ruling: Personal foul by Bl.

32. Play: Al is in the act of rising from the floro and has started his arm motion for a try when Bl pushes him. Al follows through with his arm motion and stuffs the ball forcefully through the basket.

Ruling: No basket. Al is assessed a technical foul. Al is awarded 2 free throws and team B is awarded 1 free throw. Ball is then put in play by a jump at center. 33. Play: While the ball is alive and the clock is running: (a) the coach of team A stands up to attract the attention of player Al who is on the court and the coach then gives Al directions; or (b) following an unusually fine effort by A2, in which A2 scores, or secures control of the ball from B1, the coach, along with the rest of the bench personnel, spontaneously rises from the bench and cheers. The coach and squad immediately and without leaving the bench area return to their seats.

Ruling: In (a) it is a technical foul on the coach. In(b) the spontaneous reaction of rising because of an outstanding play by a member of his team, after which the coach immediately returned to the seat on the bench, is not in conflict with the spirit and intention of the rule, and the spontaneous reaction in the specified situation is ignored.

34. Play: The ball has been placed at the disposal of Al for the purpose of attempting a free throw. Al then walks out of the free throw circle boundary at the side or rear, without breaking the plane of the free throw line, in either case. Al confers with a teammate, after which he returns to the free throw circle.

Ruling: Violation.

35. Play: Al is in the act of trying for a field goal. Bl pushes Al after the ball has left the hand of Al and the attempt is successful. Is Al awarded the 1 and 1 bonus throw even though the foul was neither intentional nor flagrant?

Ruling: If the bonus rule was in effect, Al would be awarded a bonus try if his first free throw attempt was successful.

36. Play: While Al is dribbling he: (a) accidentally strikes the ball with his leg and then continues the dribble; or (b) muffs the ball as he attempts to catch it and then recovers it; or (c) permits the ball to bounce several times before touching it again. A2 commits a personal foul during (a), (b), or (c).

Ruling: Since in each of these situations there is a possibility of reasonable doubt as to whether there is player control, the foul must be ruled as a player control foul.

section, or at each end of the crossbar perpendicular to the ground when a single pedestal post is used. The crossbar shall be 23'4" long, and the distance between the outside edges of the uprights above the crossbar shall not exceed 24'.

1-2-8: The horizontal crossbar and the uprights above the crossbar shall be free from any decorative material.

2-1-2: A ball in player possession is a ball held or controlled by a player after it has been handed or snapped to him, or which he has caught or recovered.

2-3-1: A catch is the act of establishing player possession of a live ball in flight. A catch of an opponent's fumble or pass is an interception. Securing possession of a live ball after it strikes the ground is a recovery. If a player attempts a catch, interception, or recovery while he is in the air, the ball must be in his possession when he first returns to the ground inbounds.

2-3-2: A fair catch is a catch, beyond K's line between the goal lines, of any kick by a receiver under conditions in which the receiver forfeits his right to advance the ball in return for protection against being blocked or tackled by an opponent.

2-3-5: A simultaneous catch or recovery is a catch or recovery in which there is joint control of a live ball by opposing players inbounds.

2-28: Spearing is deliberately and maliciously driving the helmet into a runner who is down, or who is held so that he is going down, or who is held so that his forward progress is stopped.

3-1-2: A period or periods may be shortened in any emergency by agreement of the opposing captains and the referee. By mutual agreement of the apposing captains and the referee, any remaining period or periods may be shortened at any time.

3-1-4: When weather conditions are construed to be hazardous to life or limb of the participants, the crew of officials is authorized to suspend the game.

4-2-2g: (The ball becomes dead and the down is ended:) g. Following a valid fair catch signal when the kick is caught or recovered between the goal lines by any receiver beyond K's line (unless the kick has been touched by one of the kickers beyond the line):

9-1-3: A player on defense may use unlocked hand, hands, or arms to ward off an opponent who is blocking or attempting to block him, or push or pull him out of the way in an actual attempt to get at the runner or a loose ball. In no other case shall he grasp, hold, pull, or push an opponent other than a runner. No defensive player may add momentum to the charge of a teammate who is on the line of scrimmage by pushing (shoving) him. When a player on defense uses a hand or arm, the hand must be in advance of the elbow at the time of contact.

9-3-1i: (Examples of unsportsmanlike conduct are:) i. Whenever the ball becomes dead in the possession of a player for him to intentionally kick it, spike it into the ground, or throw it high in the air, or from the field of play, or fail to place the ball on the ground, or fail to return it to a nearby official immediately.

9-6-1b: (Unsportsmanlike conduct includes acts or conduct such as:) b. Holding conferences between a coach or coaches and a player or players unless during a charged time-out or the intermission between periods, the conference is on the field within 5 yards of the sideline and directly in front of the team box when one coach from each



team may confer with one of his players; or

10-2-4: When a dead ball foul follows a down during which there was a double foul, the penalty for the dead ball foul will be separately administered.

SIGNALS:

The Committee accepted a procedure for designating a dead ball foul. This will not necessitate the development of a new signal but rather will be a combination of signals currently in use. In order to designate a dead ball foul, the referee will use the dead ball signal preceding and following his signal to indicate the type of foul. Thus, if clipping occurs during a dead ball period, the referee will give Signal A, followed by Signal 6, followed by Signal A.

CASE BOOK SITUATION:

Interpretations for several listed situations were reviewed and revised. These will be included in the 1971 edition of the Case Book. Since the Case Book is a supplement to the Rules Book, the information contained therein is officially adopted by the Committee.

1. QUARTERBACK: Play 230F will be revised to indicate that the action of the quarterback in lifting his heel to start a teammate in motion does not constitute a false start. 2. A DEAD BALL FOUL: Case Book Situa-

2. A DEAD BALL FOUL: Case Book Situation 300A will be revised to clarify procedure to be followed in administering the penalty for a dead ball foul which follows a down in which there was a double foul.

3. SPEARING: Several play situations will be developed to call attention to the new definition of spearing and applying it to specific circumstances.

POINTS OF SPECIAL EMPHASIS:

Each year, the National Alliance Rules Committee specifies certain areas which are to be given special attention by all those responsible for teaching football rules. The 1971 Committee was no exception. Two items have been specifically designated to be placed in this category for this year.

I. BUTT BLOCKING: A complete description of action termed and designated as butt blocking will be developed and examples explained in light of the possibility of injury which may occur. It is possible that a new term may be devised to describe this action and combine it with stick blocking, face blocking, etc.

2. ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS: The National Alliance Code clearly differentiates between legal and illegal use of the hands, both by offense and defense. Acts other than those which are legal are properly described as fouls, and penalties are provided. The machinery for eliminating certain types of illegal use of the hands is available for officials to use. The fact that it is not used to the extent that it should be is the fault of the officials. The purpose of Points of Emphasis will be to call attention to this in a positive way so that officials will act more quickly in penalizing illegal use of hands.

GENERAL:

Editorial changes in the Rules Book, Case Book, Handbook, and the Rules Simplified and Illustrated to correlate rules and sections were authorized by committee action. The Editorial Committee was directed to revise the present language in order to increase understanding without changing the intent of the rules sections wherever feasible.
