Football Clinics

Each principal of a K.H.S.A.A. member school will be supplied during the forthcoming school year with a card which will say: "Kentucky High School Athletic Association — This will introduce (name of principal), (name of school)." The card will be signed by the Commissioner. Most additional additional and the signed by the Commissioner. ministrators of Association member schools admit to their home contests fellow administrators as a matter of school policy. However, many times these visitors hesitate to identify themselves to the ticket takers. The card mentioned will assist in this identification.

The identification cards are not to be considered as regular season passes to home games of member schools of the K.H.S.A.A. The determining factor in the cards being accepted as passes is the policy of the individual school.

The identification card may be used for admission to all events at the state level except the State Basketball Tournament, A different plan for issuing these passes, along with passes to the district and regional basketball tournaments, is provided in basketball tournament regulations.

Football Examination

Part II of the National Federation Football Examination for officials will be given in Kentucky on Monday, September 18. An official who has been registered for at least one year prior to the current season is eligible to take the examination and work for a higher rating. Officials who hold the Approved rating in football are required to make a minimum percentage grade of 80 in order to maintain this rating from year to

year. After an official has received the Certified rating, he continues to receive this rating each year provided that he attends the clinic for that year and has worked in at least six first team high school football games during the previous year.

Minutes of Board Meeting

The Board of Control of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association met at the K.H.S.A.A. office, Lexington, on Thursday morning, June 8, 1972. The meeting was called to order by President Morton Combs at 9:30, with all Board members and Commissioner Theo. A. Sanford present. The invocation was given by James T. Dotson.

Roy L. Winchester moved, seconded by Tom Mills, that the reading of the minutes of the April 13th meeting be waived since members of the Board had received copies of these minutes. The

motion was carried unanimously.

Chairman Richard Vincent of the Budget Committee presented the recommended 1972-73 budget on behalf of his committee. After a general discussion of numerous items in the budget, Richard Vincent moved, seconded by William C. Doan, that the 1972-73 budget as presented be adopted, the estimated receipts being \$250,850.00 and the estimated disbursements being \$250,400.00. The

motion was carried unanimously.

Chairman James T. Dotson of the Retirement
Committee stated that his committee wished to
present two recommendations to the Board of
Control. They were as follows:

1. The Retirement Committee recommends that the trustees of the K.H.S.A.A. Retirement Trust Fund be directed to put into effect as of July 1, 1972, the pension plan agreement signed by members of the Board of Control on June 5, 1970, as said agreement bears on the retirement of Commissioner Theo. A. Sanford. The Committee further recommends that the formula in determing the amount of the retirement allowance, as provided in the agreement, be based on 35

years of credited service,

2. The Retirement Committee recommends that President Morton Combs and Secretary Theo. A. Sanford be authorized to sign the Louis Stout retirement contract, representing the Board of Control. The contract is based on an endowment-at-65 insurance policy, taken out on the life of Louis Stout and dated December 15, 1971, said contract being similar to the contracts of Assistant

Commissioners J. B. Mansfield and Billy V. Wise. James T. Dotson moved, seconded by J. C. Cantrell, that the Board of Control put into effect the two recommendations presented by his committee. The motion was carried unanimously.

Upon recommendation of the Commissioner, William C. Doan moved, seconded by Arthur R. Hawkins, that the Board of Control adopt the following resolution: "Be it resolved that Joe B. Mansfield, Secretary-Treasurer of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association on and after July 1, 1972, be authorized to negotiate short term loans for the Association on behalf of the Board of Control acting in its own capacity or as trustees of Association property, for the purpose of under-writing the cost of current budget items prior to receiving anticipated budget receipts in any one fiscal year, pledging whatever collateral is required by the lending institution." The motion was carried unanimously.

Upon recommendation of the Commissioner, James T. Dotson moved, seconded by W. P. Wheeler, that the Board of Control adopt the following resolution: "RESOLVED 1) that Joe B. Mansfield, to be Secretary-Treasurer of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association on and after July 1, 1972, shall have authority to deposit and

invest the funds of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, including checking accounts, savings accounts, and retirement funds, with the First Security National Bank and Trust Company, the Central Bank and Trust Company, the Bank of Commerce, and the Second National Bank and Trust Company, all of Lexington; the First Federal Savings and Loan Association and the Lexington Federal Savings and Loan Association, both of Lexington; and other depositories of K.H.S.A.A. funds selected by the Secretary-Treasurer in the future, with the approval of the Board of Control; 2) that Joe B. Mansfield is hereby authorized to sign on behalf of the K.H.S.A.A. any and all checks and other instruments and/or orders for the payment and/or withdrawal of any and all monies, credits, items and property at any time held by said banks and loan associations mentioned above; 3) that all foregoing authority invested in said officer shall continue until a certified copy of a resolution of this Board of Control, revoking said authority, is filed with the said banks and or loan associations mentioned above. The motion was carried unanimously.

The Board of Control directed the Commissioner to ask the principals of Section 6 to submit names for a replacement on the Board for Tom Mills who will become a member of the K.H.S.A.A.

administrative staff on July 1.

James T. Dotson moved, seconded by W. P. Wheeler, that the policy of hanging framed pictures of past Board presidents in the Board room be continued, and that a framed picture of the retiring Commissioner be included in this group. The motion was carried unanimously.

William C. Doan moved, seconded by Roy L. Winchester, that the 1972-73 salaries of J. B. Mansfield, Billy V. Wise, and Louis Stout be set respectively at \$20,000.00, \$15,225.00, and \$13,250.00.

The motion was carried unanimously.

The Commissioner proposed several changes tournament and meet regulations, some of which have been made necessary because of the federal court order. The changes were as follows:

1. Substitute the following for Baseball Rule VI: "Umpires for the tournaments shall be as-

signed by the Commission. Only registered officials shall be used."

2. From Basketball Rule IV-A, delete the following from the third sentence: "secure officials"

upon nomination of the principals of the schools that will be represented in the tournament."

3. From Basketball Rule IV-B, delete the following from the second sentence: "secure officials" upon nomination of the school representatives.

4. Delete the first and fourth paragraphs from Basketball Rule V-A and substitute the following: "Officials for the tournaments shall be assigned by the Commission."

5. Substitute the following for the second sentence of Football Rule II-A: "Each region may

be divided into districts.

be divided into districts."

6. Change the title of Track Rule XIII to read "Trophies and Awards," and substitute "awards" for "medals" in the first paragraph. Substitute "awards" for "medals" in the second paragraph.

7. Substitute "finalists" for "semi-finalists" in Wrestling Rule VI.

J. C. Cantrell moved, seconded by Frank B. Simpson, that the tournament and meet regulations changes recommended by the Commissioner

tions changes recommended by the Commissioner

be made. The motion was carried unanimously.

Arthur R. Hawkins moved, seconded by Roy L. Winchester, that all bills of the Association for the period beginning April 1, 1972, and ending May 31, 1972, be allowed. The motion was carried unanimously.

After a prayer by J. C. Cantrell, the meeting

was adjourned.

Zeb Blankenship

Zeb Blankenship, Principal of the Jessamine County High School, has been elected to membership on the K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control, representing Section 6, to fill out the unexpired term of Tom Mills who is now an Assistant Commis-

sioner of the Association.

Mr. Blankenship is a native of Elkhorn City Kentucky, where he was graduated from high school in 1945. He was a member of the then Cumberland High School basketball team which represented the 15th Region in the State High School Basketball Tournament in 1943, 1944, and 1945. He was named to the All-Tournament Team in 1945 and later played for the Kentucky All-Star Team which was coached by Ed Diddle of Western. He received a scholarship to the University of Kentucky, where after the Freshman season he was called into service in the U.S. Army.

Upon discharge from the Army Mr. Blankenship attended the University of Louisville and Pikeville College. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1952 and received his Masters Degree from U. K. in 1953. He received the Standard Leadership Certificate in 1969 from

New Film — Football Today
Football Today is a new 16mm, 28 minute sound, color film. Dramatic visual effects and exciting play action aid the viewer in gaining a better understanding of the rules and a deeper appreciation for football as played today at the Interscholastic level. Thru the use of stop-action, instant replay, and slow-motion photography, players, coaches, officials and spectators will see through the eyes of the official what he looks for

in determining the many judgment decisions required to keep this rugged man-to-man contact sport safe, exciting and fair to both teams.

Two prints of the film have been secured by the K.H.S.A.A. Member schools may secure the film by writing the Film Library, College of Education, University of Kentucky. At least two dates on which you can use the film should be given due to the heavy demand for the film at the start of the season.

Heat Illness In Early Football

During the past ten years there have been forty-six deaths from "heat-stroke" occurring in American football players, mostly in high school. This ranks number two as the largest cause of death from football injuries, second only to injuries to the head.

As coaches, if you and your team physician allowed your players to play football without head gears and they died of head injuries, both of you would be held accountable. Medicolegally today, these deaths from heat stroke have been termed "preventable." You, your high school principal, superintendent of schools, and school board have all been held liable.

What can we do to prevent this tragedy? Most of these deaths have occurred during the first few days of early football practice and most have occurred to interior linemen; those people who show a great weight loss each day during

early practice.

On the basis of work in the armed services during the past three years, and following the dictates of Dr. Robert Murphy, team physician for Woody Hayes' Ohio State football team who addressed us at the recent Seminar on Sports Medicine at Eastern Kentucky University, I would like to point out some simple measures to prevent heat illness and to provide you with the most sure-fire method of knowing what can be done on the practice field each day, at each of your practices during early football.

Prevention of Heat Illness in Early Season Practice

- 1. Acclimatize your players both to heat and exercise. Do this for several weeks prior to the beginning of your regular practice.
- 2. Condition them to practice for at least three weeks prior to the beginning of "full" practice. They should begin with 20-30 minutes, and gradually increase this before putting on pads.
- 3. Clothe them properly. Be certain that the clothing is loose, light weight, preferably "net" with short sleeves.
- Provide fluids before practice, during practice, after practice; as much as they will drink. This can be cold, even ice. I know that this is contrary to everything that all of us have been taught, but this is certainly the most significant thing that we in sports medicine have learned in the last ten years.

5. Weigh players before and after practice. Encourage fluids to those who lose much weight.

6. The coaching staff must cooperate with the team physician. They must give full support to the entire program. The basis of this program should be the daily use (especially in August and September) of a "sling psychrometer" to determine the wet bulb temperature reading and what precautions should be taken during practice. Wet Bulb Temperature, Under 60°F-Field Precautions, No precautions necessary; 61°-66°F, Watch all squad members especially those who lose a lot of weight (interior linemen!); 67°-72°F, Water must be given on field at 10-15 minute intervals; 73°-77°F, Alter practice schedule to a lighter routine. Observe all above precautions; 78°F or higher, Practice postponed, or conducted in shorts for only a short time.

If you follow these simple precautions, you can prevent a catastrophe not only to your foot-

ball team but to your school.






