





Minutes of Board Meeting

The Board of Control of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association met at Stouffer's Inn, Louisville, on January 24, 1974. The meeting was called to order at 9:30 A.M., by President W. P. Wheeler. Present were Board members Louie Martin, Jack, Fultz, Arthur Hawkins, Eldon Davidson, Fairce O. Woods, Frank Simpson, Cecil Reid, Ray Story; Commissioner J. B. Mansfield; Assistant Commissioners Tom Mills, Louis Stout and Billy Wise. Mr. Conley Manning was present representing the State Department of Education. The invocation was given by Arthur Hawkins.

Jack Fultz moved, seconded by Fairce O. Woods, that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived since members of the Board had received copies of these minutes. The motion carried unanimously.

motion carried unanimously. Upon the request of Principal James C. Coomer, Barren County High School, Commissioner J. B. Mansfield presented the eligibility case of Chris Bastien, a student who is ineligible under By-Law 6, Section 1, Transfer Rule. Mr. Coomer was present, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Bastien, to answer questions concerning the circumstances under which Chris transferred to Barren County High School. Following their presentation and questions from the Board, Mr. Coomer thanked the Board for considering the case and he and Mr. and Mrs. Bastien left the meeting. Fairce O. Woods moved that By-Law 6, Section 1, be waived and that Chris Bastien be declared eligible to participate in athletics at Barren High School. Louie Martin seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Prin. James Sears, Somerset High School, and Coach Ron Cain came before the Board requesting that they reconsider the probation which was levied against Somerset High School. This evolved out of an incident which happened in Danville on November 1, 1974. Mr. Sears explained the incident in question and presented letters from school officials and fans from both Danville and Somerset. He stated that he realized that the action on members of the Somerset team was wrong and that some type punishment was in order, but at the same time, he felt that equal punishment should be levied against Danville High School for the action of their team members in the situation. Coach Cain then presented his version of the incident. Following several questions from members of the Board, President Wheeler thanked Mr. Sears and Coach Cain for coming before the Board and assured them that their request would be considered.

Representatives from Danville High School, consisting of Prin. Don Turner, Ath. Dir. Tom Creamer and Coach Pat Dale came before the Board to explain their version of the incident which took place prior to their football game with Somerset High School on November 1, 1974. Following several questions by members of the Board, Mr. Wheeler thanked the group for coming and they departed. Louie Martin made the motion that the Board go on record as supporting the Commissioner in his decision to place Somerset High School on probation and that no action be taken against Danville High School. Jack Fultz seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

motion and it passed unanimously. Assistant Commissioner Tom Mills reported that the ticket sales for the 1975 Boys' State Basketball Tournament are running slightly ahead of the January sales of 1974. He also reported that arrangements have been completed for the first Girls' State Basketball Tournament to be held on the campus of Eastern Kentucky University from March 26 through the 29.

Assistant Commissioner Louis Stout reported that he had received the results of the baseball proposal which had been presented to member schools. He stated that he received 278 votes in favor of the proposal and only 8 against. The proposal states the number of regions be increased to 16 and that both the winner and runner-up in the district will advance to the regional. The winner of each regional will advance to the State Tournament. The first round of the state will be played at four sites with Regions 1 through 4 in the first, 5 through 8 in the second, etc. The four winners will meet in a blind draw tournament for the State Championship. Since plans have been completed for the 1974-75 season, Mr. Stout recommended that the proposal be adopted for the 1975-76 season. Ray Story made the motion that the recommendation of Mr. Stout be adopted. Louie Martin seconded the motion and all members voted aye.

Commissioner Mansfield reported to the Board that certain changes must be made in the football playoff rules and regulations since they had voted to change to the four class system. The changes were presented to the Board and upon a motion by Jack Fultz, a second by Frank Simpson, and an aye voted of all members, were adopted. (The changes appear elsewhere in this issue.) In addition to the changes in the playoff

In addition to the changes in the playoff method, the Board voted to adopt the following: a. The tie breaking rule for all season and playoff games as recommended in the National Federation Football Rules Book; b. The visiting team shall have their choice of end of field for pre-game warm-ups in all football contests; c. The jurisdiction of the game officials shall begin one hour prior to game time and end with the completion of the game.

Mr. Mansfield presented to the Board a proposed referendum which was submitted by the principals of the Big Eight Conference schools, pertaining to recommended changes in K.H.S.A.A. By-Law 27. They requested that the Board of Control authorize the Commissioner to submit these revisions to referendum ballot to all principals of member schools in accordance with Constitution Article IX, Section 3. Following a discussion of each item, Louie Martin moved, seconded by Frank Simpson, that the Commissioner submit the above mentioned referendum ballot to principals

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Governing Football Championships of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (Adopted by the Board of Control)

I. Classification

Sec. A. The Board of Control has divided the schools into four classes as follows:

1. Class AAAA shall consist of the schools in Jefferson County, except Kentucky Country Day and Beth Haven, and all other member schools with an enrollment of 1000 or more in grades 10-12.

2. Class AAA includes the schools with en-

rollments of 600 to 1000 in grades 10-12. 3. Class AA includes the schools with enrollments of 400 to 600 in grades 10-12.

4. Class A includes schools with enrollments of less than 400 in grades 10-12. Sec. B. The basis for determining the schools

of Classes A, AA and AAA will be the total enrollment in grades 10-12 of a co-educational school. The Board may make an upward enroll-ment adjustment for a school with less than a full high school course, and for schools enrolling

boys only. Sec. C. Sec. C. Classification is for a period of two years. Classification for 1975 and 1976 is based on the 1973-74 enrollment. A school on application of the principal to the Commissioner, may be permitted to move from a lower into a higher classification. Any school placed in a higher classification must remain in this classification until all schools are re-classified.

II. District, Regional and Division Championships Sec. A. Composition of Classes shall be as follows:

1. Class AAAA will be divided into two di-visions. The division winner's will play for the state championship.

2. Class AAA, AA and A will consist of four

regions each with two districts. Sec. B. Required number of district games shall be as follows:

1. To be eligible for a district championship teams may qualify by playing game(s) within the district as follows:

(a) One another if there are only two teams(b) Two games if there are 3 or 4 teams

(c) Three games if there are 5 through 7 teams

(d) Four games if there are 8 or more teams

2. Schools shall make every effort to schedule games with the teams in their district. How-ever, the Board of Control through the Commissioner may require teams to play or be ineligible for the championship.

3. If in the opinion of the Board it is not possible for a school to schedule the required number of games then out-of-district game(s) may be drawn (or selected) in the following order:

(a) School(s) in the same Class and Region

(b) School(s) in the same Class(c) School(s) in a higher Class

Sec. C. The championship of a district will be determined by the Dickinson Rating System, as adopted by the Board of Control. If two teams tie for the championship, there will be a play-off game on a date set by the Board of Control. If more than two teams tie, the two teams which will play to break the tie will be determined by the following plan: Each team will receive one point for each game won by a defeated opponent and one balk point for each game tind by 2 de and one-half point for each game tied by a defeated opponent. If a tie results after a team's highest points for any four games have been counted, an additional game will be counted until the tie is broken. Only games played with Kentucky teams shall be counted. If a tie results, it shall be broken by the Board of Control. Sec. D. If two teams play each other more

than once during a season, they must designate prior to the season which game will count in the standings.

III. Playoffs

Sec. A. In Class AAAA the winners of Dis-trict 1 and District 2 will play and the winners of District 3 and District 2 will play and the winners of weekend prior to Thanksgiving. The following weekend the winners will play for the regional championship. The regional winners will play the following weekend for the division championship. The division winners will play the following week for the state championship.

Sec. B. In Classes A, AA and AAA the dis-trict winners will play on Friday or Saturday two weeks prior to Thanksgiving. The following week-end the winners of Region 1 and Region 2 will play, and the winners of Region 3 and 4 will play. Winners of these games (semi-finals) will play for the championship of each class the following week.

Sec. C. If the score is tied at the end of any game it will be broken in the same manner as all season games. (This method is the one recommended in the National Federation Football Rules Book.)

Sec. D. In all classes, the site, date and starting time will be determined by the winners of the odd numbered districts and regions in the odd numbered years unless one of the regional winners did not host a first round game. If one of the regional winners did not host a first round game, they would have the option to name the site, date and starting time. In even numbered years the process will be reversed.

IV. Finances

Sec. A. The proceeds of the games, except the finals, will be used to defray the expenses of the visiting team, officials, trophies for the district and regional winners, and other necessary expenses.

The team transportation allowance shall be 50ϕ per mile round trip. If no agreement can be reached on lodging and meals expenses, actual expenses for these items, not to exceed the following maximum, shall be allowed: seven meals for 38 persons at \$1.50 per meal, and two nights lodging for 38 persons at \$3.00 each. Net profit or loss shall be shared by the competing schools.

Sec. B. A representative of the host school, designated by the principal, will manage the game. The principals or their representatives shall agree on all matters pertaining to the game; such as admission charges, expenses, and allocation of reserve seat tickets. Disagreement on any of these items shall be referred to the Commissioner, and his decision shall be final.

Sec. C. The proceeds of the final games in each class shall accrue to the K.H.S.A.A. after the necessary expenses have been paid. Actual expenses, not to exceed those given above, shall be paid. A team not requiring transportation, meals, or lodging shall receive a minimum of \$100.00 for miscellaneous expenses. Each team shall receive an amount in addition to the expenses already assumed. This amount will be set by the Board of Control each year,

Annual Meeting

Kentucky High School Coaches Association

April 18, 1974

President Irv Spencer called the meeting to order at 10 A.M. at the Kentucky Fairgrounds with 85 members in attendance.

Dave Cottrell gave the invocation. Coaches Dan Haley of Paducah Tilghman and Robert Barlow of Lexington Bryan Station were recognized as the "Coaches of The Year" in football and basketball and each was presented a regulation trophy by President Spencer and Bowman Davenport. Prior to the recognition of Haley and Barlow, Spencer presented to the group the Coach of the State Championship basketball team, Rob-

ert Graves of Louisville Central, Billy B. Smith, Taylor County Athletic Di-rector and Vice President of Kentucky High School Coaches Association presented Fred Overton, the new basketball Coach at Murray State University as the featured speaker. Overton stressed that the newest trend in athletics is the handling of people and to the attention of the coaches that "to improve yourself — you must be a positive thinker" and that "everyone has a right to express himself regardless of size".

In regular business session the dues were raised from (\$2) two dollars to (\$3) three dollars. Bowman Davenport (Grayson County) in speaking for the increase, cited that the increase might help overcome the loss financially incurred in the past three years at the All-Star games. Bob Miller, Campbell County, moved and Paul Young, St. Xavier, seconded the motion.

Bowman Davenport, retiring president was presented a plaque in honor of his leadership during 1973-1974 by President Spencer. Bob Miller, Campbell County, was elected

Sgt-at-Arms by acclamation. Joe Ohr, Estill County, was nominated by Paul Young and seconded by Bob Miller to the position of Secretary-Treasurer. He was elected by acclamation.

As the minutes of the annual meeting of the previous year had been published in the Athlete it was moved that the reading of the minutes be dispensed. Motion by Paul Young, seconded by George Kok.

The financial report of the K.H.S.C.A. and the All-Star account was presented by Joe Ohr and the audit was accepted by the group.

A committee was to be appointed by the pres-ident to study the possibility of honoring the Coaches of Kentucky who have served for a percoaches of Kentucky who have served for a per-iod of twenty-five years. This recognition to be in the form of a certificate or plaque. It was also discussed to recognize the Coaches of State Championship teams in all sports and the All-Regional coaches in football and basketball.

Meeting adjourned at 11:10 A.M.

boundary line; or (c) shoulders of B1 are on the mat out-of-bounds and A1 is chest-to-chest with his toes in bounds.

Ruling: Wrestling will continue in (a) and (b) so long as there is a possibility of A1 pulling his opponent back away from the boundary lines. In (a) no near-fall points may be earned while the shoulders of B1 are in the described position because one of the shoulders is over the boundary line and out-of-bounds. In (b) it cannot be a fall nor may near-fall points be earned because part of the scapulae area is over the boundary lines. In (c) the supporting points of both wrestlers are out-of-bounds. Supporting parts of B1 are his head and shoulders. When A1 is chest-to-chest with him, this becomes a supporting part for Al. In this situation, an out-of-bounds will be declared. Comment: When the defensive wrestler is on his back and the supporting points of either wrestler inbounds but a near-fall has not been earned, wrestling will continue as long as there is a pos-sibility of the offensive wrestler bringing his opponent back into the inbounds area. If there were little or no change of the offensive wrestler accomplishing this, and after a reasonable length of time has transpired, wrestling will be stopped and resumed from the starting position at the center of the mat. The foregoing three situations are in-tended to illustrate it is not possible for a wrestler to score while his opponent's shoulders are over the out-of-bounds area or touching out-of-bounds. While it is unnecessary to stop the match when a defensive man's head or shoulders are out-of-bounds, there can be no near-fall or fall awarded. 11. Situation: Wrestler A1 applies a false cradle so one of his arms is under the shoulder blade of B1. A1 tips B1 so one of the shoulders of B1 is touching the mat and the other is near the mat. **Ruling:** A1 may be awarded points for a near-fall even though it is not possible for him to pin B1 with this false cradle. Because one of the shoulders of B1 is in contact with the mat and the

other in an angle of less than 45° to the mat, re-gardless of the fact one of the arms of A1 is under that shoulder, A1 may gain near-fall points. Criteria for a near-fall have been met.

12 Situation: In assuming the starting position on the mat, the defensive wrestler B1 places his hands in front of the forward starting line and his knees behind but in contact with the rear starting line and; (a) his lower legs are parrallel and in line with the long axis of his body; or (b) his feet are touching behind him so his lower legs are at an angle from the point of contact to the knees on the mat. A1 in assuming his position to the left side of B1 in (a) places his left knee on the mat to the outside of the near lower leg of B1 and his right foot on the mat to the rear of the feet of B1. In (b) A1 on the left side of B1 places his left hand on the left elbow of B1, his left foot on the mat beside the lower leg of B1 and his right knee on the mat behind the feet of B1.

Ruling: The position of A1 in (a) is a legal starting position on the mat. In (b) the position of A1 is illegal because he does not have a knee on the mat at the near side of B1.

13. Situation: In the starting position on the mat, BI assumes his position with his knees on the mat, approximately shoulder width apart, his feet together behind him so his lower legs are at an angle to the plane of his sides. When he is stationary, the referee motions for A1 to take his position.

Ruling: Once the defensive wrestler is stationary on the mat in his starting position the referee shall indicate to the offensive wrestler he is to assume his starting position. He will do so without delay.

14. Situation: Following an out-of-bounds, the wrestlers return to the center of the mat to as-sume their starting positions. B1 is on all fours, his hands are in front of the starting line and his knees in contact with the rear starting line. A1 is to the left of B1, and B1 has tucked his lower left leg toward his right leg. When the referee signals, A1 moves to the right side of B1 to take his starting position. When A1 moves to the op-posite side, B1 adjusts his position so his right leg

posite side, B1 adjusts his position so his right leg is tucked under the left leg. **Ruling:** The referee will caution B1 if he has not previously done so by forming a "C" with the fingers and thumb of his right hand and pointing to B1 with his other hand. If B1 has previously been cautioned, his action in adjusting his position constitutes a false start and shall be penalized. 15 Situation: In assuming the starting position

15. Situation: In assuming the starting position on the mat: (a) B1 changes his position just as A1 is taking his offensive position; or (b) A1 con-tinues to adjust equipment after the referee in-dicates he should assume his final starting position

Ruling: In (a) and (b) following a verbal caution, the wrestler using delaying maneuvers will be penalized for delay of the match. This is a techni-cal violation which is not preceded by a caution.
