— IN MEMORIAM —



Theodore A. "Ted" Sanford

As it must to all men, death came to Ted Sanford in the early morning hours of June 27, 1979. It was not exactly easy, few deaths are, but it was a kind cessation of suffering for Ted following four consecutive months in the Intensive Care Unit of the Saint Joseph Hospital in Lexington.

Ted has gone where all good men go. He was a human being with all the weaknesses and frailties that human flesh is heir to, but he was a great human being, a great administrator, a great person and, above all, a Christian gentleman. Those who knew him best, and they are legion, are unanimous in this belief.

A few headlines of news stories reporting his passing bear mention:

A MAN WHO MADE PEOPLE HIS HOBBY,
TED SANFORD DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS.

SANFORD, DEAD AT 77, DEVOTED HIS
LIFE TO KENTUCKY'S YOUTH.

SANFORD OVERSAW NEARLY 40 YEARS
OF TREMENDOUS GROWTH IN KHSAA.

SANFORD, DEAD AT 77, LED KHSAA TO
PROMINENCE AND PROSPERITY.

All of the foregoing statements are true. All of them bear mute testimony to the achievements of a great man who lived as full and rich and meaningful a life as it is possible for man to live.

Most of the hundreds of thousands of Kentuckians who knew him during his hey-day knew him primarily for his work in athletics. As part-time Secretary/Treasurer of the KHSAA from 1937 to 1947 and then as full-time Commissioner from 1947 until his retirement in 1972, Ted's name and Kentucky High School athletics were synonymous.

During these years of fantastic growth in the scope and quality of Kentucky's high school athletic program, no

man contributed more than Ted Sanford.

Mike Johnson, writing in the Lexington Herald said, "Under Sanford and Joe Billy Mansfield, who became Sanford's first assistant commissioner in 1949 and eventual successor, the KHSAA prospered financially and expanded tremendously on the playing fields. The Boys' State High School Basketball Tournament was Sanford's pride and joy as he watched it grow into one of the premier events of its kind in the country."

From the keen pen of Earl Cox, astute columnist of the Courier-Journal, came these words, "During Sanford's early years the KHSAA struggled, taking in less than \$10,000 per year on the State Basketball Tournament. Receipts from this year's tournament amounted to about \$450,000. The KHSAA under Sanford was a national leader in number of sports offered and it didn't take the feminist movement to open the door to female athletes. For many years before, girls had their own championships in track, cross-country, golf, tennis, swimming, fencing and gymnastics. And girls' basketball tournaments were revived five years ago after having been dropped in 1932."

Rick Bailey, Lexington Leader Sports Editor, friend and admirer of Ted said, "The list of his accomplishments, shared with his assistant, Joe Billy Mansfield, was impressive. Several minor sports were added and football was divided into classes with a play-off system to determine the state champion." The growth and development of the program necessitated additional assistant commissioners to handle the increased work load. Quality growth all the way.

Sanford had the help and support of quality people as association presidents, board members and staff and he would be the first to agree, but it was Ted who was the 'glue man' all the way.

Despite the time-consuming and pressure-packed job that he handled so deftly through the years, he found time to spend 44 years in volunteer service with the Red Cross, served on the boards of the United Community Fund, the Salvation Army, Kentucky Lung Association, Boy Scouts, Rotary Club and Kentucky YMCA.

He received honorary degrees from Kentucky Wesleyan (where he also served on the Board) and Murray after earning his undergraduate degree at Centre with one of the best academic records in the history of that quality institution. He later earned his Master's Degree from U. of K. and in 1975 was elected to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame.

Probably more important than any or all of the above honors is that he so contributed of his time and talent to the First United Methodist Church of Lexington that his long-time pastor, Billy Ray Jennings in eulogizing Ted at his funeral said, "He was the best and most dedicated church man with whom it has been my privilege to work during my ministry."

Ted probably would have ranked that accolade at the very top of the list had he known it was being said — but then — who is there to say that he did not know? I have a feeling that perhaps he did!

And Billy Ray could well have added that the community and area in which he lived and worked was a better place by virtue of his having passed that way. And this, in the last analysis, is the measure of the real worth of a man.

There is no way a tribute to Ted Sanford can be written without mention of Nelle, his wife, close companion and confidante for fifty-four years. Ted was Secretary of the KHSAA from 1937 to 1947 and Nelle was secretary to the

Minutes of the Board Meeting

The Board of Control of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association met at the K.H.S.A.A. office on Saturday, May 19, 1979. The meeting was called to order by President Jack Burkich at 10:00 A.M. with Board members Zeb Blankenship, Pete Grigsby, Joseph McPherson, J. D. Minnehan, Norman Passmore, Denzil J. Ramsey, Glendon Ravenscraft, Barney Thweatt; Commissioner Tom Mills and Assistant Commissioner Louis Stout present. Conley Manning and Darrell Wells were present representing respectively the State Department of Education and the State School Boards Association. The invocation was given by J. D. Minnehan.

Joseph McPherson moved, seconded by Norman Passmore, that the minutes of the April 20th meeting be approved. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Mills gave a report on the results of the recent survey completed by the principals of member schools on classification in basketball. He reported that of those principals responding, 135 were opposed to changing the present playoff system while 106 favored classifying the schools based upon their enrollment. Following a discussion on the results of the survey, President Jack Burkich referred the matter to the Basketball Committee for further study and recommendations.

The results of the recent survey taken on the assignment of district and regional basketball officials indicated that 141 schools favored the assigning of officials to work District Tournaments within the region of the local association to which they belong while 86 schools opposed this. One hundred and twenty-six schools favored the assigning of officials to work regional tournaments within the region of the local association to which they belong with 99 schools opposed. President Burkich requested that the Basketball Committee consider the results of this survey and make recommendations to the full Board at a future meeting.

After a discussion on the sponsoring of a state tournament in volleyball, Zeb Blankenship made the motion, seconded by J. D. Minnehan, that based upon the results of the recent survey taken among member schools, the K.H.S.A.A. sponsor a state tournament in volleyball in the Fall of the 1979-80 school year. The motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Mills reported to the Board that he had received forty applications for the position of Assistant Commissioner. After a discussion on the applications, Norman Passmore moved, seconded by Denzil J. Ramsey, that the Board accept the recommendation made by Mr. Mills to hire Brigid L. DeVries for the position of Assistant Commissioner for one year at an annual salary of \$17,120.00. The motion passed unanimously.

J. D. Minnehan made the motion that the \$75,000.00 catastrophe injury insurance plan be renewed for the 1979-80 school year with Doug Ruedlinger, Inc., at an annual rate of \$14,000.00. Norman Passmore seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Mr. Mills read the correspondence from Supt. Edward Wright of Franklin county concerning the scheduling of baseball games. After a discussion, it was the opinion of the members of the Board that under the present provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws, they do not have the authority to limit the number of baseball games scheduled or played during the regular season by a member school. The number of games scheduled in all sports, with the exception of basketball, is left entirely with the local school administration. Mr. Mills suggested that a proposal for a change in this regulation may be submitted to the Delegate Assembly for consideration or directly to the member schools in the form of a referendum.

The next meeting will be held at Kenlake State Park, Aurora, Kentucky, on July 26-29, 1979.

Barney Thweatt made a motion, seconded by Pete Grigsby, that the bills of the Association for the period beginning April 1, 1979, and ending April 30, 1979, be allowed. The motion passed unanimously.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

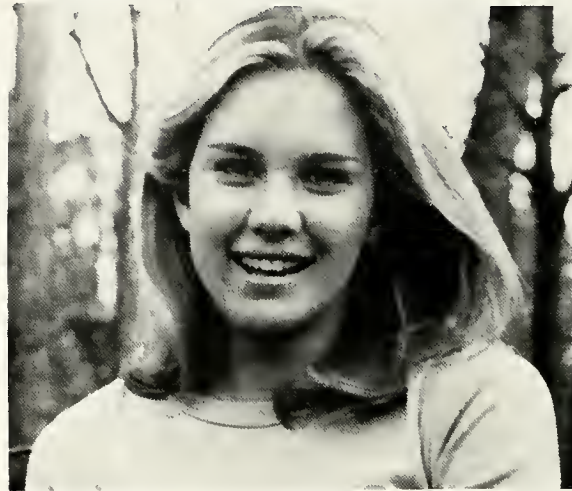

**BASKETBALL RULES CHANGES
FOR THE 1979-80 SEASON**

- 2-11: In the second sentence of 2-11 replace the words "the referee" with "an official".
- 4-11(h): The definition of a player control foul is revised. It is defined as follows: A player control foul is a common foul committed by a player while he/she is in control.
- 5-11: In the first sentence delete the words "two halves or".
- 8-7: After the last free throw following a false double foul (4-11c), the ball shall be put in play as if the penalty for the last foul of the false double foul were the only one administered.
- 10-A-1(a): A team shall be prohibited from using a megaphone or any mechanical sounding device at court side for coaching purposes.
- 10-A-2(d): It is a technical foul on a team when it delays the game by preventing the ball from being made promptly alive.

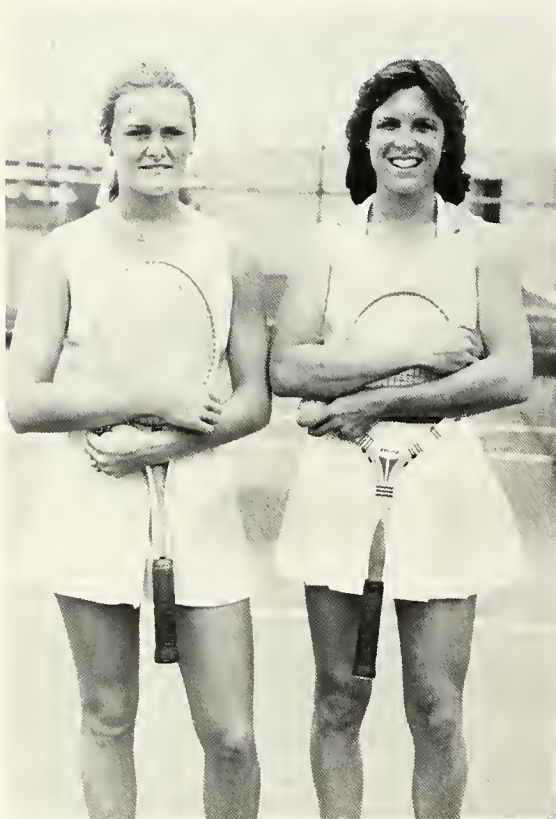

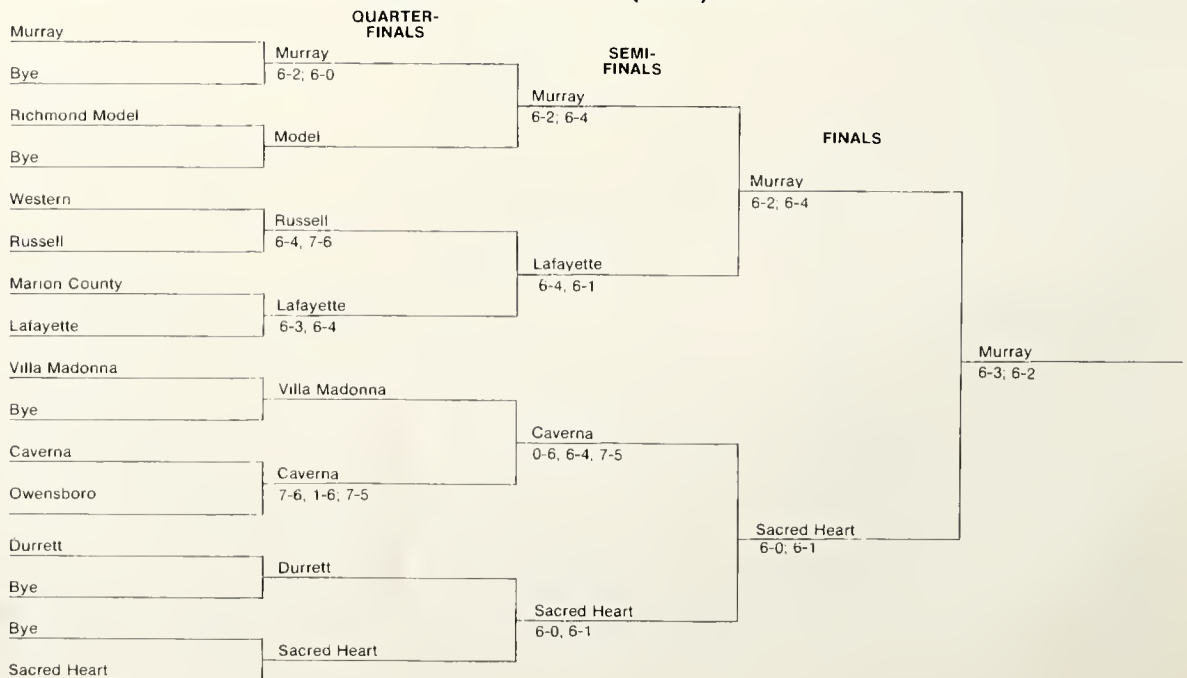

CAN ATHLETIC INJURIES AND COST OF ATHLETIC INSURANCE BE REDUCED?

HERE ARE SOME SUGGESTIONS THAT WILL HELP:

1. Secure a team physician. Your local Medical Society can advise on this.
2. Require players to be physically fit and well conditioned before engaging in contact.
3. Do not allow a player with an injury to participate until he has medical approval to do so.
4. Make sure equipment is adequate, in good condition, and that it is properly worn.
5. Consider carefully the length of practice sessions. The latter part of lengthy sessions produces the most injuries.
6. Require injuries to be reported to you promptly and refer those needing attention to the physician at once.
7. Get your players interested in injury prevention and fitness. Any player is more valuable without casts and crutches.
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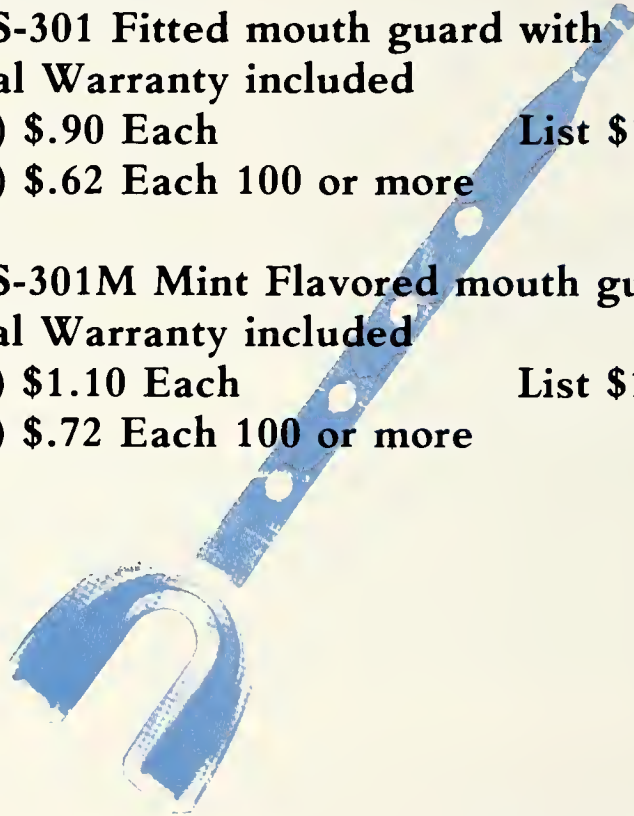
