## Indianapolis to Host National Athletic Directors Conference December 12 - 15, 1982

More than 1,800 athletic administrators, spouses and exhibitors are expected to converge on Indianapolis, Indiana, on December 12-15, 1982, when the National Federation hosts its Thirteenth Annual National Conference of High School Directors of Athletics at the Indiana Convention Center.

The conference has also been designated as the site for the Annual Meeting of the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association.

This year's conference features some truly outstanding speakers at five general sessions, four seminars and three conference and meal functions. In addition to the general sessions and seminars, conference attendees will have their choice of 14 different topics offered during workshops sessions on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Included will be workshops on Assistance for the New Athletic Director, The Use of Computers, Cable TV, Office Management, Coaching Athletic Relationships, Participation Fees, Public and News Media Relations, Staff Evaluation Techniques, Confronting Cutbacks in Staff and Programs, and Coping with Administrative Stress. There will also be the popular round table discussion groups and workshops for special interest groups such as private schools, junior high schools and large city district administrators.

The keynote address at the opening session, "Why Are We Here?" will be given by *Gerry Faust*, football coach at the University of Notre Dame.

*Ty Boyd* of Charlotte, North Carolina, nationally known speaker on motivation and seminar leader of Interpersonal Effectiveness, will deliver a general session presentation on "How to Survive in a Competitive World," as well as serve as master of ceremonies at the conference banquet.

*Robert Kanaby*, Executive Director of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Association, is sure to challenge meeting attendees with a sterling address on "Now That We're Here -- What Do We Do?"

Other general speakers include *Dr. Herb True*, noted psychologist and humorist, whose closing general session presentation, "Take Charge of Yourself," will include a powerful message about the qualities of a successful leader.

*Joe Newton* of Elmhurst, Illinois, one of the most successful high school coaches in the country and accomplished platform speaker, will illustrate how a person can discover the reservoir of ability they may never have thought they had in his general session presentation on "Motivation -- The Name of the Game."

The Sports Promotion and Marketing Seminar will feature *Everett Duval*, Director of Athletics at Ashland High School in Ashland, Ohio, and *Ralph Harris*, Director of Bands at St. Francis High School in Traverse City, Michigan. Everett's presentation, "Beat the Athletic Cost Squeeze -- Promote," will offer new and unique marketing techniques for high

school athletics. Mr. Harris will present "Successful Fund Raising Techniques That Can Work for You." This seminar alone would be worth the trip to Indianapolis.

Every conference that has included a Legal Seminar has found this informative session extremely worthwhile. This year promises to be no different as *Stephen Burns*, the attorney for the Indiana High School Athletic Association, and *Dr. Samuel Adams* of Washington State University join together to provide a very meaningful seminar on Monday evening. Other seminars include one on Sports Medicine, featuring *Dr. John McCarroll* and his unique sports medicine clinic, and one on Facility Planning.

The traditional conference tour will be offered on both Sunday and Monday afternoons and will include the world famous Indianapolis Motor Speedway, the Motor Speedway Museum and a visit to the spectacular facilities recently constructed for the 1982 National Sports Festival.

### Conference Registration

Registration forms and hotel room reservation cards will be sent to all NIAAA members, as well as athletic administrators who attended one or more of the National Conferences during the past five years. In addition, approximately 16,000 conference fliers and advance registration forms are being distributed by state high school associations and/or state athletic director associations. To reserve a room at one of the five participating hotels, it is necessary to use the special conference room reservation form that is included with the conference registration flier. Conference registration and room reservation forms, as well as exhibit information, may also be secured by writing the National Federation office at P.O. Box 20626, Kansas City, Missouri 64195, or by telephoning (816) 464-5400.

The conference activity fee is \$60.00 and includes all conference meal functions, social events and conference tour transportation. All current (1982-83) NIAAA members who register prior to December 1st may take a \$10.00 discount off their conference activity fee.

The spouses's registration fee is \$10.00 and includes all conference activities except the Monday luncheon and Tuesday banquet. These tickets may be purchased separately for \$10.00 and \$20.00 respectively.

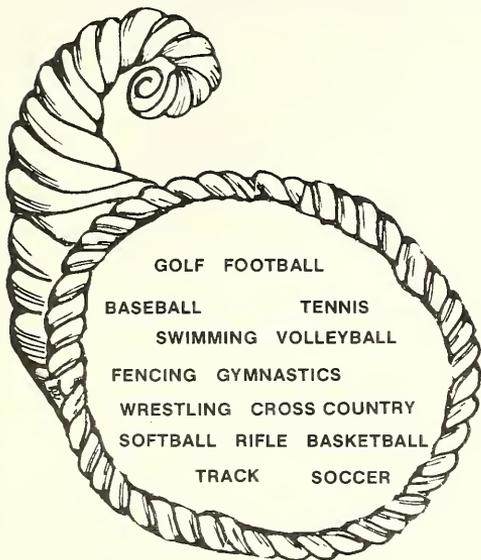

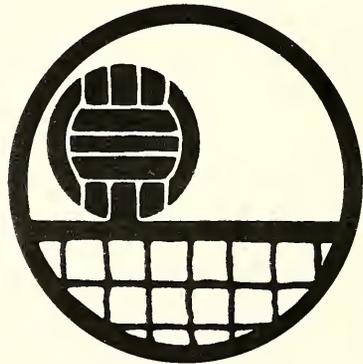

## 1982-83 NATIONAL FEDERATION BASKETBALL EARLY SEASON QUESTIONS INSTALLMENT 1

### PUBLICATION CORRECTIONS

**Case Book, 4.13.9 — 4th line — change Team "A" to "B" and "B1" to "A1".**

**9.0.0.B — 9th line — change "marked" to "unmarked".**

**Meeting Folder, Page 2 — Under Screening Teammates — para. 1, 7th line — change "not" to "now".**

**SITUATION #1:** Prior to any warning for lack of action, Team B is behind in the score and B1 is playing defense on A1 and A2 in Team A's midcourt. B1 is able to establish a closely guarded situation repeatedly, but is unable to force a violation. Can B1 keep this up indefinitely or is it a lack of action situation?

**RULING:** There is no lack of action until the signal is given by the trail official. There is no lack of action when B1 can reestablish a closely guarded situation within 5 seconds after the count stops. Prior to the warning, the defense is not required to have more than one player in the midcourt regardless of the number of offensive players there. However, as soon as lack of action exists, the official will signal toward the defense and begin the 5-second count which leads to the warning. If the warning is given in this situation, Team B must then respond by sending B2 into the midcourt as Team A has 2 players there. (10-2-3)

**SITUATION #2:** The visiting team has brought a TV monitor into their dressing room and at halftime are replaying the tape of a previous game.

**RULING:** Legal. The rule prohibits gaining information via replay tapes, etc., from the game in progress. The rule does not prevent the viewing of any previous games. (10-1-1)

**SITUATION #3:** The defense has previously been warned for lack of action. Thereafter, in the same period, B1 and B2 are pressing A1 and A2 in A's backcourt. Team A is able to get the ball across the line in time. B1 and B2 continue to play aggressive defense on A1 and A2 as they pass and dribble the ball in the midcourt. After about 10 seconds of this type of action, B1 and B2 drop back into a zone defense in the forecourt. Is this a technical foul on Team B for not being continuously aggressive after a warning?

**RULING:** No. To this point, there has been no lack of action in this specific situation. However, if Team A keeps the ball in the midcourt and Team B is responsible, the official will recognize a lack of action situation exists. The designated signal will be given to indicate that Team B must now respond to the situation and comply with the requirements. There is no lack of action unless the official has recognized and indicated it by signaling toward the responsible team. Following the signal, the responsible team must then comply. There is nothing to comply with or respond to until the official has used the signal which indicates a lack of action situation exists. (10-2-3)

**SITUATION #4:** Near the end of the game, the captain of Team A informs the officials that they wish to have a time-out immediately if they score a basket in their next possession. Team A is behind 63-60. A1 inbound the ball and A2 scores a field goal. The ball goes through the basket with 6 seconds showing on the clock. (a) The official immediately signals for the clock to stop and the timer stops it with 5 seconds remaining, or (b) A1 requests time and the official signals with 5 seconds left. The timer stops the clock with 4 seconds remaining, or (c) B1 has the ball for the throw-in with 4 seconds remaining when A1 requests a time-out which is denied by the official and time runs out.

**RULING:** The official should not call a time-out as in (a) unless requested by a player. The rules do not allow the official to stop the clock for a time-out unless it is properly requested. The official has erred by stopping the clock without a proper request for time by a player. The official should acknowledge the error and give the ball to Team B for a throw-in anywhere along the end line. If a player of A does request a time-out prior to the start of the throw-in, it should be granted. In (b), the procedure is proper and no error in timing has been made. In (c), the game is over. Once the throw-in begins it is too late for the opponents to call time. The fact that Team A alerted the official about a time-out has no bearing on this ruling. (2-12, 5-8-3)

**COMMENT:** The captain may alert the officials that they will be requesting a time-out at some specific point later on. However, it should be made clear to him or her that the player must make the request at the proper time and gain the attention of the official. The time-out is not automatic simply because the captain talked to the officials about what they plan to do. Alerting the officials about a future time-out is a technique which should be discouraged as it often puts the officials in a position where they are criticized if any time runs off the clock after the situation occurs.

**SITUATION #5:** Are all technical fouls considered to be "bench" technicals if committed by anyone other than the 5 players?

**RULING:** No. The purpose of penalizing "bench" fouls with 2 shots is to discourage poor and unsportsmanlike conduct by all personnel occupying the bench. This does not mean that if a technical is charged to a nonplayer it will always be a 2-shot foul. A specific penalty of 1 shot is prescribed for such infractions as wearing an identical number, an illegal number, or illegal shirt. A 1-shot penalty is also prescribed for entering the court without reporting or without being beckoned by an official. These infractions are all committed by nonplayers, but are not penalized under the "bench" rule. The automatic 2-shot penalty for violating the "bench" rule applies when there is poor and unsportsmanlike conduct by any bench personnel. (10-6-3, 4.5, 10-8-1, 3, 10-10 Pen)

**SITUATION #6:** Team B is warned for lack of action. A1 and A2 are controlling the ball in the midcourt. B1 and B2 respond after the warning. B1 aggressively pursues dribbler A1 while B2 assumes a legitimate defensive position between A1 and A2. The closely guarded count on A1 is at 3 when the dribble is ended. B1 immediately leaves A1 and retreats to the forecourt to prevent a pass from A1 to A3.

**RULING:** A technical foul is immediately charged to Team B. B1 must continuously and aggressively pursue the ball in this situation. This would include when A1 ended the dribble and held the ball. (10-2-3)

**SITUATION #7:** Team A is warned for lack of action. However, A1 continues to hold the ball in the midcourt for 3 seconds and then fumbles. A2 recovers the ball in the midcourt. The official reaches a count of 5 seconds.

**RULING:** A technical foul is charged to Team A. The trail official would have continued the lack of action count (while using the designated signal) after the fumble as the ball was still in control of Team A in their midcourt. (10-2-3)

**SITUATION #8:** Team A is warned for lack of action. The trail official uses the designated signal and begins to count lack of action following the warning. A1 dribbles the ball for 2 seconds and then fumbles it. A2 recovers in the forecourt.

**RULING:** As soon as Team A advanced the ball to the forecourt, the lack of action count must stop. When lack of action exists and there is no defensive pressure in the midcourt and the offense is responsible, they must move the ball into the forecourt to stop the count. The same guidelines are used to determine when the ball reaches the forecourt as are used in determining advancement from back to frontcourt. (10-2-3)

**SITUATION #9:** A1 is at the free throw line for the first of 2 attempts. A2 and A3 are occupying appropriate lane spaces. A4 and A5 both come to the sidelines in front of their bench. The coach of Team A is instructing them while A1 makes the first attempt. The team manager hands A4 and A5: (a) a squeeze bottle of liquid, or (b) a towel, or (c) a stick of chewing gum.

**RULING:** Legal as long as both players stay on the court and such activity is completed so it will not interfere with play following A1's second attempt. (10-6-8)

**SITUATION #10:** In the 2nd quarter of play: (a) A1 is detected wearing jewelry; or (b) incoming substitute A6 is wearing an illegal headband.

**RULING:** In (a), A1 must remove the jewelry immediately or leave the game. In (b), A6 must remove the illegal headband or return to the bench. Players may not participate with illegal equipment, however, when detected, there is no other penalty except removal of the equipment or leave the game. (3-5)

**SITUATION #11:** If the scorer erroneously records a missed free throw as being successful, is this a correctable error and what are the time limits for correcting it if it is correctable?

**RULING:** The error is correctable until the final score has been approved. This is not an official's error as covered in rule 2-10, but is an error in record keeping. Record keeping errors can be corrected with approval of the referee until the final score has been approved. (2-3, 2-11)

**SITUATION #12:** B1 fouls A1. Team A is not in the bonus, but the official erroneously awards A1 a one-and-one. A1 makes the first attempt but misses the bonus. B1 controls the rebound and dribbles into Team B's frontcourt and is fouled by A2. Immediately following the foul, the coach of Team B properly asks for a conference to discuss a correctable error. The coach of Team B points out that Team A was not in the bonus and that A1 should not have received the free throws.

**RULING:** The error of awarding A1 an unintended one-and-one attempt is correctable. The referee will cancel the one point scored for the successful free throw by A1. However, the foul by A2 which occurred after the unintended free throw attempt cannot be cancelled. A2's foul must be penalized and the game will continue from the point at which it was interrupted to make the correction. If Team B is in the bonus, B1 will be awarded a one-and-one attempt and the game will continue from that point. If Team B is not in the bonus, the game will continue with a throw-in by Team B from an out-of-bounds spot closest to where A2's foul occurred. (2-10, 7-5-3)

**SITUATION #13:** B1 holds A1 after the bonus provision is in effect inadvertently A1 is not given the opportunity to attempt a one-and-one. Team A is awarded the ball out-of-bounds and A1 receives the throw-in. Team A controls the ball inbound, and A2 eventually asks for and receives a time-out. During the time-out, the referee either recognizes his or her own error or it is called to the referee's attention that A1 should have been awarded a one-and-one free throw opportunity.

**RULING:** A1 is awarded the one-and-one with no players lining up along the free throw line and play is resumed at the point of interruption, which is the spot out-of-bounds nearest to where the ball was when time-out was granted. (2-10)

### PUBLICATION CORRECTIONS

**Case Book, Page 34** — In the first line change "3 minutes" to "2 minutes".

**Page 55** — In 8.2.2 Situation E change the word "illegal" to "legal" in the first line.

**Wrestling Examination I, Question 85** — Change the word "of" to "by".

**SITUATION #1:** If you have given your opponent(s) 48 hours of notification, you will be given a one-pound allowance when: (a) you are involved with consecutive days of dual meet competition; (b) you are involved with consecutive days of dual meet to tournament competition; (c) you are involved with consecutive days of tournament competition followed by a dual meet.

**RULING:** In (a) and (b) there is a one-pound allowance for all involved teams the second day of dual meet competition or of tournament competition conducted on consecutive days. In (c) you have a tournament followed by a dual meet. In this situation there is no allowance for a one-pound increase over the normal weight allowance.

**SITUATION #2:** The offensive wrestler turns his opponent on his back and then applies a figure-4 scissors around the body in an attempt to pin his opponent. Is this situation considered as a technical violation?

**RULING:** The figure-4 scissors is a technical violation when applied by the offensive wrestler around the body or both legs. The fact that the offensive wrestler has the defensive wrestler in a pinning situation is immaterial. It is still a technical violation, and the match needs to be stopped immediately. If the violation occurs prior to the offensive wrestler having the defensive wrestler in a near fall situation, then no points could be earned. If the offensive wrestler has the defensive wrestler in a near fall position prior to applying the figure-4 scissors, then back points could be scored.

**SITUATION #3:** The offensive wrestler pins his opponent down to the mat, grabs the legs and posts the heel of the defensive wrestler's foot to his buttocks. He holds this situation in excess of 5 seconds.

**RULING:** This is a stalling situation. If this is the first stalling call against the offensive wrestler, then he shall be warned on the first offense. If it is the second offense, he shall be penalized according to the Penalty Chart.

**SITUATION #4:** The coach for Team A wants his 105-pound wrestler to be able to compete in the 105- to 112-pound class and the 112-pound class. During the weigh-in, however, the wrestler's weight is verified only to be equal to or less than 105 pounds. Is it permissible for him to compete in either the 105-pound weight class or the 112-pound weight class?

**RULING:** This wrestler could not compete at 112 pounds. In order for an individual to compete at the 112-pound level as well as the 105-pound level, his weight must be verified to be in excess of 98 pounds and equal to or less than 105 pounds.

**SITUATION #5:** After December 25 what is the minimum weight that a contestant must weigh in order to wrestle at both 165 pounds and at 185 pounds?

**RULING:** In order for a contestant to be eligible to wrestle both at 165 and 185 after December 25, he must exceed the 155-pound weight class. After December 25 he must weigh in excess of 157 pounds, as this is the minimum weight for a contestant to wrestle at the 155-pound weight class because of the 2-pound growth allowance allowed after December 25.

**SITUATION #6:** Wrestler A lifts his opponent and returns him to the mat with unnecessary force. (a) This occurs at or before the buzzer sounds to end the period. (b) This occurs after the buzzer sounds.

**RULING:** In (a) this would be categorized as an illegal stall. Wrestler B would receive one penalty point and would be allowed 2 minutes recovery time if he were injured. In (b) Wrestler A could be either penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct or flagrant misconduct because of action that took place after a period had concluded.

**SITUATION #7:** Is it necessary for the defensive wrestler to assume a legal starting position that will also allow the offensive wrestler to assume a legal starting position?

**RULING:** The defensive wrestler must assume a position which requires that he be stationary on his hands and knees so that both knees are on the mat behind and parallel to the rear starting line and that the heels of both hands are on the mat in front of the forward starting line. The elbows shall not touch the mat. This position must also allow the offensive wrestler to be able to assume a legal starting position.

**SITUATION #8:** During the third period with the wrestlers in a neutral position, it is the opinion of the referee that both wrestlers are stalling. Is it permissible for the referee to make a double call for stalling?

**RULING:** At any time when the official recognizes stalling occurring, it is permissible to either warn or penalize one or both wrestlers at the same time.

**SITUATION #9:** Wrestler A is injured when Wrestler B applies an illegal chicken wing. At the conclusion of the 2-minute recovery time, the coach of Wrestler A approaches the referee and requests that his wrestler be granted 2-minutes injury time.

**RULING:** It is not permissible for a contestant to take injury time immediately following a recovery time. If a contestant is injured by use of an illegal hold to the extent he is unable to continue wrestling following a maximum of 2 minutes recovery time, then the match shall be defaulted and the injured wrestler would be declared the winner. Injury time and recovery time cannot be taken back to back.

**SITUATION #10:** In one of the semifinals matches in the 155-pound weight class, a regular match ends in a tie with a score of 2-2 with Wrestler A scoring 2 points for a takedown and Wrestler B scoring 2 points for a reversal. In the overtime match, both wrestlers score a one-point escape, and the overtime

concludes with a score of 1-1. Which wrestler is declared the winner according to the Penalty Chart?

**RULING:** When you apply the overtime criteria 1 thru 9 to the overtime match, it does not declare a winner. Criteria number states that the wrestler with the greater number of escapes shall be declared the winner, and in this situation, both contestants have one escape. Therefore, we go to criterion number 10, which states that you apply criteria 1 thru 9 to the regular match. In applying the criteria to the regular match, Wrestler A would be declared the winner because he had earned the greater number of takedowns.

**SITUATION #11:** The defensive wrestler has assumed the starting position, and the referee indicates to the offensive wrestler to assume position. In doing so, the offensive wrestler, with his left hand, grasps the left elbow of the defensive wrestler. By definition, this means that the left side of the defensive wrestler is the near side. After placing his right hand in the proper position, the offensive wrestler places his right knee on the mat on the near side with his left knee not on the mat. Is this a legal starting position for the defensive wrestler?

**RULING:** The offensive wrestler must have at least one knee on the mat on the near side of his opponent. He may have either the left or right knee on the mat, regardless of whether he is on the left or right side of the defensive wrestler. The rule does not require the left knee to be on the mat when you are on the left side of the defensive wrestler, or the right knee to be on the mat when you are on the right side of the defensive wrestler. The rule simply requires one knee on the mat on the near side.

**SITUATION #12:** When the tournament host sends out information concerning a tournament, he indicates that the order of competition will start with the unlimited weight class, followed by the 98-pound competitors, and finish up with the 185-pound weight class.

**RULING:** It is permissible to vary the order of competition in tournaments. When there is a variation, however, this information would be included in the original packet that goes to all schools so that they will know well in advance of this varying weight orders. If the order is varied in a dual meet, it must be mutually agreed upon at the time of weigh-in.

**SITUATION #13:** During the first round of a tournament, the coach of Team A questions a decision made by the referee on his 98-pound wrestler. Later on in the first round of the tournament, the coach of Team A questions a decision on his 185-pound wrestler.

**RULING:** The rules state that judgment decisions by the referee shall not be questioned. If a coach questions a judgment decision, he shall be so advised, and if it occurs again, he shall be penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct according to the Penalty Chart. Any time a judgment decision is questioned by a coach in tournament competition, it needs to be noted with the head scorer so that a progressive account can be made of each session. If it were to occur 3 times during the tournament session, the following penalties would be assessed: On the first occurrence, the coach would be advised; on the second occurrence, there would be a one-point team deduction; and on the third occurrence the coach would be removed from the premises for the duration of the tournament session.

**SITUATION #14:** During a dual meet, the contestant for School A in the 119-pound weight class does not have an opponent to wrestle from Team B. The coach of Team A sends his wrestler to the mat to receive a forfeit. Immediately following the referee's signaling a forfeit for the 119-pound class, the coach of School A approaches the scorers' table and asks that the forfeit be deleted and that he be able to move his 119-pound contestant up to the 126-pound weight class.

**RULING:** A contestant is not allowed to accept a forfeit in one weight class and complete in another weight class.

**SITUATION #15:** Wrestler A has Wrestler B in a pinning situation at the edge of the mat. He has his right hand on the mat and his left hand on the mat. As soon as Wrestler B's shoulder goes above the out-of-bounds line, as soon as Wrestler A notices that his opponent is partially out-of-bounds, he pulls him back into the inbounds area and holds him in the same pinning combination for a period of 5 seconds prior to the ending of the period.

**RULING:** Wrestler A would be awarded a 3-point near-fall. Even though the referee was counting on 2 different occurrences, the offensive wrestler had the defensive wrestler in the same pinning situation for a total of 3 seconds at which fall can be scored. He would, however, score the near-fall that earned the greater number of points.

**SITUATION #16:** Wrestler A reports to the weigh-in with a prosthesis commencing from below the elbow. He has with him a permission letter from the state association authorizing the wearing of this artificial limb. (a) He weighs in wearing the artificial limb and then later decides to wrestle without it. (b) He weighs in without the artificial limb and then decides to begin the match decides that he will wear it during competition.

**RULING:** In (a) it would be legal to remove the artificial limb and wrestle without it. When an individual wrestles with a portion of the arm missing, the referee must make certain allowances for the starting position. As long as the wrestler with the amputated arm is attempting to establish legal positioning, there would be no violation. In (b) the wrestler could not compete wearing the artificial limb. If you are going to wear an artificial limb during competition, it is required that you weigh in wearing it. The contestant would either have to compete without the artificial limb or not compete.

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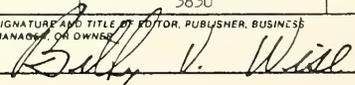
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
