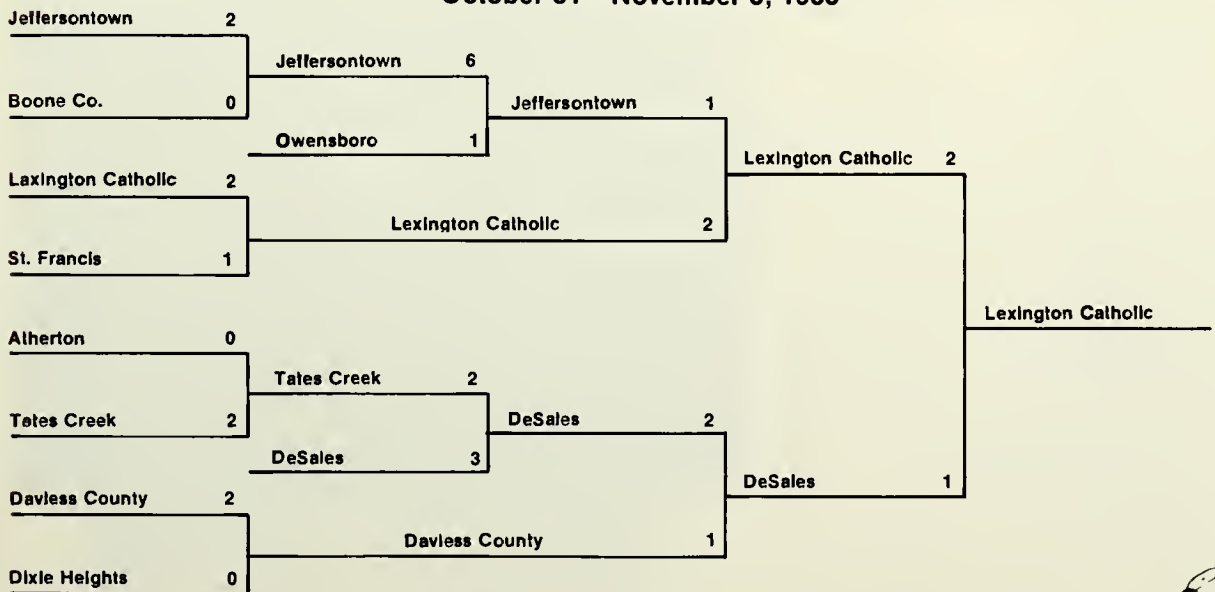

1983-84 NATIONAL FEDERATION WRESTLING RULE INTERPRETATIONS PART 1



SITUATION #1: Wrestler A has wrestler B at the edge of the mat in a pinning situation and the referee has commenced his count when wrestler B bridges and intentionally goes out of the wrestling area. A 3-point near-fall has not yet been earned by wrestler A when wrestler B goes out-of-bounds intentionally. Would wrestler A receive penalty points for the technical violation of going out of the wrestling area in addition to near-fall points earned?

RULING: When a contestant goes out of the wrestling area, as a means of avoiding wrestling, it is a technical violation except in a situation where near-fall points have been earned. In this situation, wrestler A has already earned two near-fall points, therefore he receives no penalty points for the technical violation when wrestler B goes out-of-bounds intentionally.

SITUATION #2: Wrestler A attempts a figure 4 body scissor around wrestler B, but in his attempt he only gets his foot up to approximately mid-calf. The figure 4 scissor is never completed by wrestler A's foot reaching the back of the knee. Would this be considered a technical violation?

RULING: You do not have a figure 4 scissor until the foot is directly behind the knee. Therefore, in this situation you would have only a body scissor and a body scissor is not a technical violation.

SITUATION #3: Wrestler A is attempting to pin his opponent with a figure 4 head scissor but in attempting to apply the scissor, his foot only comes up to his mid-calf and the figure 4 head scissor is never completed. Would this be considered a violation?

RULING: The figure 4 scissor around the head is a legal hold but in order to be legal the foot must be behind the knee. If it is placed at mid-calf as described in the above situation, it would be a straight head scissor which is illegal.

SITUATION #4: A contestant is scheduled to wrestle in a multiple dual against his first opponent at 7:30 p.m. and his second match is scheduled for 8:15 p.m. Is there a mandatory rest time between matches for multiple duals similar to tournament competition?

RULING: There has been a one hour mandatory rest requirement between matches in a tournament for some time. That regulation now applies to multiple dual meets as well as tournaments. No contestant shall wrestle in two consecutive matches with less than a one hour rest between each match.

SITUATION #5: A contestant appears on the mat with his left elbow taped in such a manner that it basically will not move from a 90 degree angle. Is it permissible to compete when the elbow is taped in such a manner?

RULING: Some taping is allowable but if it substantially restricts the normal movement of a joint, it is prohibited. If the elbow is taped in such a manner as to restrict it to only a 90 degree angle, then you would be substantially restricting the movement and an individual would not be allowed to compete.

SITUATION #6: The coach from school A weighs in two contestants for the 98-pound class and one contestant for the 105-pound class. At the completion of the 98-pound match, the coach decides to use his 98-pound contestant at the 105-pound class instead of the individual that he weighed in for 105 pounds. Would it be permissible for the 98-pound contestant to wrestle at the 105-pound class?

RULING: A wrestler who weighs in for one weight class may be shifted to a higher weight class provided it is not more than one weight class above that for which his actual stripped weight qualifies him. There is no minimum weight for a 98-pound contestant but if a 98-pound contestant wishes to wrestle in the 105-pound weight class, he must weigh a minimum of 90 pounds. This minimum weight must be recorded at the weigh-in and submitted to the official scorer if the 98-pound contestant is to wrestle in the 105-pound weight class.

SITUATION #7: Two bordering states have added a 175-pound weight class. When these two states compete against one another, is it permissible to count the 175-pound contest?

RULING: Competition between two or more states shall be conducted in the 12 weight classes listed in the National Federation Rule Book unless there is a mutual agreement between the states involved. If the two state association can agree to the additional weight classes then it is permissible to count these weight classes for either dual meet or tournament competition. The purpose of the interstate competition rule is to make certain that no state can take advantage of another one simply because they may or may not have additional weight classes. There is no intent of the interstate competition rule to restrict competition where state associations can mutually agree.

SITUATION #8: In the neutral starting position, one contestant has his left foot in front of the red starting line and his right foot behind the red starting line. Is this a legal starting position?

RULING: The neutral starting position now requires that both wrestlers stand opposite each other with their lead foot on the green or red area of the starting lines and the other foot even with or behind the lead foot. In this situation, the wrestler on the red starting area does not have a foot on the starting line,

therefore this would be a technical violation for failure to assume the correct starting position.

COMMENTS: In the new neutral starting position, the two contestants are not to make contact with one another until the referee gives the signal to begin wrestling. Any contact prior to the referee giving this signal, would be a technical violation.

SITUATION #9: The coach of school B approaches the scorers table for the following reasons: (a) He feels the visual scoreboard is incorrect and wants to make certain that the official scorer has the correct score down for the two contestants; (b) he feels the official has misapplied a rule and wishes to call it to his attention for possible adjustments.

RULING: In (a), it is permissible for a coach to check with the official scorer if he feels a scoring error has been made. In (b), it is permissible for a coach to check with the official if he feels that a rule has been misapplied. However, in his conversation with the official, if no error has been made the coach will be penalized for misconduct. The penalty for misconduct of the coach is the deduction of one team point. The second penalty calls for removal from the premises for the duration of the dual meet or tournament session. If an error was made the official will correct it and resume wrestling as soon as possible.

SITUATION #10: The coach of Team A questions a judgment decision by the referee as to whether or not there was a reversal at the conclusion of the first period. Is there a penalty assessed for a coach questioning judgment?

RULING: Any time a coach questions the judgment of referee, he shall be penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct according to the penalty chart. The first penalty is deduction of one team point and if it should occur again, the coach shall be removed from the premises for the duration of the dual meet or tournament session.

SITUATION #11: With wrestler A in the advantage position, he grasps the far leg and brings the heel to the buttocks in attempting to break down his opponent. The heel is held in continuous contact to the buttocks for approximately 10 seconds before he is able to break his opponent down to the mat. Once the defensive wrestler is broken down, the offensive wrestler continues to hold the heel to the buttocks. When should the wrestler in the advantage position be called for stalling?

RULING: Holding the heel to the buttocks unless your opponent is broken down on the mat is not in itself a violation. However, once the individual is broken down on the mat, the five second count should begin immediately. If the heel is held to the buttocks for more than five seconds, the wrestler in the advantage position shall be called for stalling.

SITUATION #12: A contestant is penalized in the following sequence. He is first penalized for an illegal hold, the second infraction is for a false start, the third infraction is for locked hands, the fourth infraction is for assuming an illegal starting position and the fifth infraction is for unnecessary roughness. How many points has his opponent earned?

RULING: His opponent would receive one point for the first illegal hold, one point for the locked hands, one point for assuming the incorrect starting position, and two points for the unnecessary roughness penalty. The penalty for a false start or assuming an incorrect starting position does not count towards disqualification. The first penalty for either of these two infractions is a warning and every penalty thereafter is one point only. His opponent has earned a total of 5 points.

SITUATION #13: In the finals of the 185-pound match in the league tournament two contestants are both disqualified for stalling. What points would be earned by these two contestants?

RULING: When this occurs and both wrestlers are disqualified from competition according to the penalty chart, there will be no tournament points awarded to either contestant for first or second place. Each contestant would however receive the points that they had earned prior to the championship match, but the second place points awarded them when they won their semi-finals match, would be taken away. They can receive no points for first or second place in the league tournament.

SITUATION #14: When the offensive wrestler assumes his position on the defensive wrestler, he drops on him applying excessive weight to the defensive wrestler.

RULING: When the offensive wrestler assumes his position, he obviously must make some contact with the defensive wrestler, but he is not to apply excessive weight on the defensive wrestler in the starting position. The offensive wrestler is required to have at least one knee on the mat on the near side and the other leg may either have the knee or foot on the mat. This should bear the majority of the offensive wrestler's weight. If excessive weight is applied by the offensive wrestler in the starting position, he should be called for improper starting position.

1983-84 NATIONAL FEDERATION BASKETBALL RULE INTERPRETATIONS PART 1



PUBLICATION CORRECTION

1983-84 Basketball Rules Simplified & Illustrated — Page 76 - Top. Delete entire narration. Insert: "The defense has fully complied and is playing aggressive defense in (1). Number 3 retreats and is no longer playing legitimate defense in (2). No action by the opponents caused him to retreat and remain there. A technical foul is properly charged to the defensive team."

SITUATION #1: B1 established a legal position in A1's path before A1 becomes airborne. A1 jumps and releases the ball on a try for goal. Before returning to the floor, airborne shooter A1 charges into B1. (a) After the foul on A1, B2 goaltends; or (b) before the foul on A1, B2 commits basket interference.

RULING: In (a), the ball becomes dead and the try ends immediately when the player control foul on A1 occurs. The action of B2 is ignored as goaltending cannot occur after the try has ended. The ball is awarded to Team B for a throw-in out-of-bounds closest to where the foul occurred. In (b), both the violation and the foul are penalized. The basket interference by B2 causes the ball to become dead immediately. The violation is penalized by awarding the 2 points. The player control foul on A1 is also charged. Team B is awarded the ball for a throw-in anywhere along the end line. A defensive goaltending or basket interference violation committed prior to a player control foul, does not contradict the general statement that when a player control foul occurs that player cannot score. In the case of a defensive violation, it is the violation which results in awarding the score. (4-7-1; 4-13-7 Note; 4-13-8, 6-7-4, 7-5-3; 9-12)

SITUATION #2: Team A has used 1 of its time-outs in the 3rd quarter. In the 4th quarter, A1 is injured and Team A's coach is beckoned onto the court. (a) After 40 seconds; or (b) 1:40, the coach declares A1 is able to play and will stay in the game.

RULING: In (a), 1 time-out is charged to Team A. In (b), 2 time-outs are charged to Team A. Team A has now taken a 3rd time-out in the 2nd half and must be penalized with a 2-shot technical foul. The prohibition against not permitting "successive" time-outs by the same team does not apply in a situation involving an injured player. The decision to have the player remain in the game must be honored regardless of the number of time-outs which must be charged to that team. This interpretation results in a "multiple" time-out possibility, but is necessary in order to allow the coach to keep the player in the game. (5-8-2; 5-9; 5-11 and 10-1-6)

SITUATION #3: Team A has been in control of the ball for 7 seconds in its backcourt. A1 throws a pass which hits the floor in A's frontcourt at 9 seconds. A2 gains possession of the ball at 11 seconds. Is this a 10-second violation?

RULING: No. The 10-second count ends immediately when the ball touches the floor in the frontcourt. (4-8-5a; 9-8)

SITUATION #4: A1's throw-in is in the cylinder above Team B's basket when it is touched by (a) B1; or (b) A2.

RULING: Basket interference in both (a) and (b). In (a), the violation causes the ball to become dead. The ball is awarded to Team A for a throw-in at the free throw line extended. In (b), Team B is awarded 2 points. Team A is awarded the ball for a throw-in along the end line as after a scored goal. The ball is handed to a player of Team A and that player or a teammate shall make the throw-in. (7-5-5; 9-12-2 and Penalty)

SITUATION #5: B1 fouls A1. Team A is in the bonus, but the official erroneously awards the ball to Team A for a throw-in. A1's throw-in is intercepted by B1 who scores a goal. Immediately following the goal, a time-out is requested by (a) A1; or (b) B1. During the time-out, one of the coaches or the scorer advises the referee that an error was made when A1 was not given a one-and-one as a result of B1's foul.

RULING: The error is immediately corrected by awarding A1 a one-and-one attempt with no players along the lane. Since an error was rectified, the time-out is not charged to (a) Team A or (b) Team B. Both teams must respond and be ready to play as soon as A1 completes the one-and-one attempt. Even though the original request for time was not to question a correctable error situation, the time-out is not charged when an error is rectified. No advantage can be gained and in the interest of correcting the error, the time-out is not charged. (2-10-1; 5-8-4; 5-9 Exp. 3)

SITUATION #6: B1 has established a legal guarding position in the path of dribbler A1. A1 attempts to dribble around B1. B1 moves to maintain his or her position. Contact occurs with A1's shoulder on B1's chest, but B1 does not have both feet on the floor at that instant.

RULING: Player control charging foul on A1. After assuming a legal guarding position, B1 is allowed to maintain that position. Obviously, B1 cannot move to maintain and also keep both feet on the floor. The fact that the contact occurred on B1's chest indicates B1 had maintained a legal position. (10-6)

SITUATION #7: Team A requests and is granted a 3rd charged time-out during the 2nd quarter. The scorer fails to notify an official regarding the excess time-

out. The scorer discovers this after the ball becomes alive following the time-out, but still within the correctable error limits. Should Team B be awarded 2 free throws under the provisions of the correctable error rule regarding failure to award a merited free throw?

RULING: No. This is not a correctable error as the technical foul was not charged at the time it occurred. The infraction had to be detected and charged before the ball became alive following the time-out. The free throws were never merited as the foul was not properly charged. (2-10-2; 10-1-6)

SITUATION #8: Team A has used its 2 allowable time-outs in the 2nd half. The game is tied at the end of regulation and also at the end of the first overtime period. Team A did not use a time-out in the overtime period. How many time-outs without penalty are available for Team A during the 2nd overtime?

RULING: Two. Any unused time-outs from any previous overtime period may be used in the next or any additional overtime period. (5-11)

SITUATION #9: Is the request for an excess time-out always granted?

RULING: No. If the request is a successive one by the same team, it should not be granted. The request is not successive if the clock has run between the requests or the other team was granted a time-out between the requests. (5-11)

SITUATION #10: A1 strikes B1 during action under the basket. The official disqualifies A1. As A1 is leaving the court, B1 violently contacts him or her. How is this unfortunate incident administered?

RULING: Both A1 and B1 are disqualified and banished from the vicinity of the bench. B1's substitute must attempt the 2 free throws for A1's flagrant personal foul. Any players of Team A or an incoming substitute may attempt the 2 free throws for B1's flagrant technical foul. Team A is awarded the ball at the division line for a throw-in following the last free throw attempt. This is a false double foul situation. (4-13-3; 4-13-9, 8-7)

SITUATION #11: A1 has the ball for a throw-in at the end line near the opponent's basket. The throw-in is caught by A2 who is in the air after taking off from A's frontcourt. After securing possession, A2 lands in A's backcourt.

RULING: A violation. The ball has been returned to backcourt illegally. A2's status while in the air is frontcourt, since this is where he or she last touched before becoming airborne. (4-21; 9-9)

SITUATION #12: Time for a period expires while A1's try is in flight. The ball is on the ring when (a) B1 taps it off; or (b) A2 taps it in the basket.

RULING: In (a), it is basket interference and 2 points are awarded. In (b), there is no goal. The ball became dead when A2 touched it. (6-7-8a; 9-12)

SITUATION #13: Does holding or moving a hand(s) in front of a player who (a) has; or (b) does not have, the ball constitute an unsportsmanlike act?

RULING: No in (a) and yes in (b). In (a), opponents of the player with the ball may legally use their hands in this manner in an effort to distract the player with the ball. However, in (b), it is an unsportsmanlike act for an opponent to take a position and hold or wave his or her hands in front of the face of a player without the ball. The opponent's vision may not be purposely obscured to prevent him or her from receiving a pass, etc. (10-3-9c)

SITUATION #14: If a team desires a time-out before the toss to start the game, should it be granted?

RULING: No. The game must be started with the ball becoming alive, or with a violation or foul prior to this, before a time-out request is honored. (5-11; 6-1-1)

SITUATION #15: While A1 is driving for a try, the trail official is cursed by the coach of Team B. What is the proper procedure?

RULING: The official should withhold his or her whistle until A1's try ends. If the whistle is sounded immediately, it would stop the drive and potential score. If the coach's foul is flagrant, he or she must go to the locker room or leave the building. (10-4-3)

SITUATION #16: An official erred by not awarding a free throw near the end of the 1st half of play. The error is detected during the intermission.

RULING: If the limits on correction have not expired, the error will be corrected just prior to starting the 2nd half of play. (2-10)

SITUATION #17: A1 ends the dribble in Team A's frontcourt. B1 slaps the ball out of A1's hands. The ball bounces off A1's leg and rolls into the backcourt. A1 returns to the backcourt and picks up the ball.

RULING: Violation by A1. Even though the slap by B1 probably caused the ball to go into A's backcourt, A1 violated by being the last to touch the ball in frontcourt and the first to touch it in the backcourt. (9-9)

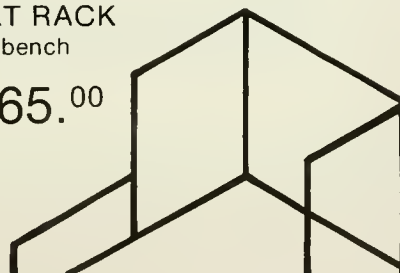
