FOOTBALL RULE CHANGES ANNOUNCED FOR '84 SEASON



KANSAS CITY, MO. (January 13, 1984) — Several rule changes will be evident during the 1984 high school football season as a result of action taken by the National Federation Football Rules Committee. The interscholastic rules-making body approved a list of rule changes and modifications during a two-day session January 3-4, 1984, while meeting in conjunction with the National Federation's Annual Winter Meeting in Los Angeles, California.

A significant change was made by the rules committee to reduce the number of legal clips from the game. Legal clipping will only be allowed on initial blocks by players who are within the "free-blocking zone" and positioned on the line of scrimmage. The players being blocked must also be in the zone at the snap. This contact is permitted only for the initial line charge and may not continue after the position of the ball is established or the ball has left the zone. Previously, backfield players within the free-blocking zone (a rectangular area extending four yards laterally on either side of the spot of the snap and three yards behind each scrimmage line) could clip legally.

"This change may be the first step in significant reduction of clipping within the free-blocking zone," explained Dick Schindler, Assistant Director of the National Federation and liaison to the National Federation Football Rules Committee. "It represents a major safety move designed to reduce injuries by limiting the opportunity and extent of legal clipping. A number of studies indicate that a good portion of the injuries taking place are occurring in this area (free-blocking zone) since it is where clipping and blocking below the waist is allowed."

Many of the other changes and modifications made by the Football Rules Committee revolved around the issue of player safety in general, and sportsmanship in particular. Unsportsmanlike fouls will now be treated like non-player or dead ball fouls and will be penalized from the succeeding spot. The change reduces the chance of an unsportsmanlike foul going unpenalized since it is no longer a part of a double or multiple foul.

Roughing the passer will now result in an automatic first down, plus the previous penalty of 15 yards already specified by the rules. "As a safety concern, the expansion of the rule was enacted to further deter roughing the passer," explained Schindler. "Roughing the passer will automatically result in a first down, even in situations in which the yardage needed to be gained by the offensive team is more than 15 yards."

One of the changes among the most obvious to fans involves the opening game coin toss. National Federation rules will now allow the team winning the coin toss to defer its choice to the second half. "The rule has been successfully used in collegiate football," said Schindler. "In monitoring college games it became increasingly obvious that a majority of the team preferred to defer the choice. The result of winning the coin toss now offers more strategic options than in previous years."

Another major change made by the rules-making body was to the overtime when the National Federation "10-yard procedure" is used. The rules now call for the immediate termination of the offensive team's series as soon as the defense gains possession of the ball. "Play will now end as soon as possession changes, consequently the previous possibility of subsequent fumbles and penalties are now eliminated," explained Schindler. "It is no longer possible to score defensively in an overtime period except by safety."

The National Federation Football Rules Committee consists of a voting representative from 48 member associations. The committee governs gridiron play for all high schools and many junior high schools in 47 states and the District of Columbia.

Other rule changes affecting a projected total of approximately 15,000 high schools and over 900,000 student participants during the 1984 season include:

- Requiring hip pads to include a tailbone protector.
- Adding a specification limiting the height of platforms used to anchor cleats to 5/32".
- Adding computers to the list of prohibited equipment for coaching and/or communication during the game.
- Specifying illegal fair catch if signal is given after the kick has been caught or recovered.
- Prohibiting the placement of material or any device on the ground to improve the kicker's footing.

By recommendation of the Football Rules Committee, the 1984 National Federation Football Rules Book will be dedicated to the high school coaches and officials who have supported the Football Rules Committee and joined its efforts in helping to make the game safer for participants.

MEETING

The business meeting of the Delegate Assembly of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association will be held on Friday, April 20, 1984, at 11:00 a.m. at the K.H.S.A.A. office building, 560 East Cooper Drive, Lexington, Kentucky.

As provided in Article IX, Section 1, of the K.H.S.A.A. Constitution, the following proposals for changes in the rules of the Association, to be acted upon at the Annual Meeting, are hereby submitted to all members of the K.H.S.A.A. for their information. No proposals other than these may be considered at the Annual Meeting, except by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present.

PROPOSAL I

Principal J. Leland Clack, Caverna High School, proposes that item number 2 under Basketball - Boys & Girls in By-Law 27, Limitations of Seasons be changed to read "The first basketball game shall not take place prior to **the Monday following Thanksgiving** for football playing schools and November 15 for non-football playing schools."

PROPOSAL II

Principal Jerry Ainley, Calloway County High School, proposes that item number 3 under Football in By-Law 27, Limitation of Seasons be changed to read as follows: "A schools' football season ends at the conclusion of its last regular season game and/or its elimination from the championship play-off competition. **Members schools shall be allowed twenty (20) days of spring football practice from January 1 to March 30 each school year.**"

PROPOSAL III

Principal Jerry Ainley, Calloway County High School, proposes that the following be added to By-Law 38, Vote of Single Sex Schools. "**No member school shall be allowed to vote upon matters pertaining to any sport in which the member school did not participate in the previous school year.**"

PROPOSAL IV

Principal Chris Cameron, Trinity High School, proposes that By-Law 5, Section 5, Enrollment Elsewhere be changed to read as follows: "**A student who is enrolled or connected with one school may represent another school in a varsity contest if the following conditions exist and conditions are met:**

- 1. No corresponding sport is offered at the enrolled school.**
- 2. Application is made to the State Association requesting permission and assignment to designated school where the student would be eligible to participate.**

PROPOSAL V

Principal Barney Thweatt, Christian County High School, and Principal Harold Wood, Hopkinsville High School, propose that By-Law 5, Section 4, Preceding Quarter, Trimester or Semester Enrollment be changed to read as follows:

- To be eligible for athletic competition during the first semester of each school year, a student must

have been enrolled the preceding semester and must have passed during the preceding semester in at least four full credit high school studies or their equivalent in units of credit accepted for graduation.

- To be eligible for athletic competition which begins during the second semester, a student must have been enrolled during the first semester of that school year and must have received a passing grade in the first half of each of four full credit subjects or units of credit accepted for graduation at the halfway point of the school year.
- Grade school students must receive passing grades in at least four-fifths of their studies to be eligible and meet the enrollment requirement as specified in sections 1 and 2.

PROPOSAL VI

Principal Harold Wood, Hopkinsville High School, proposes that the following be added to By-Law 5, Preceding Semester: "Out of state transfer students must be making normal progress toward graduation based upon the academic requirements of the state being transferred from. However, said student must adhere to Association academic guidelines within one year of transfer."

PROPOSAL VII

The K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control proposes that By-Law 40, Awards be changed to read as follows:
AMATEUR/AWARDS

A student who represents a school in an interscholastic sport shall be an amateur in that sport. An amateur athlete is one who engages in athletic competition solely for the physical, mental, social and pleasure benefits derived therefrom. An athlete forfeits amateur status in a sport by:

- Competing for money or other monetary compensation (allowable travel, meals and lodging expenses may be accepted);
- receiving any award or prize of monetary value which has not been approved by his/her state association;
- capitalizing on athletic fame by receiving money or gifts of monetary value (scholarships to institutions of higher learning are specifically exempted);
- signing a professional playing contract in that sport.

Accepting a nominal, standard fee or salary for instructing, supervising or officiating in an organized youth sports program or recreation, playground or camp activities shall not jeopardize amateur status. "Organized youth sports programs" included both school and non-school programs.

Only awards of no intrinsic value may be accepted by a high school student athlete as a result of participation in interscholastic competition. All awards shall be made by the school or the Kentucky High School Athletic Association.

PROPOSAL VIII

The K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control proposed that By-Law 6, Transfer Rule be changed to read as follows:

Any student who represents a secondary school in a first team game after enrolling in grades 9 through 12 and who changes schools shall be ineligible for 36 school weeks. The Commissioner may waive the period of ineligibility in the event of any of the following circumstances:

- A student who transfers from one secondary school to another following a bona fide change of residence by his/her parents into the school

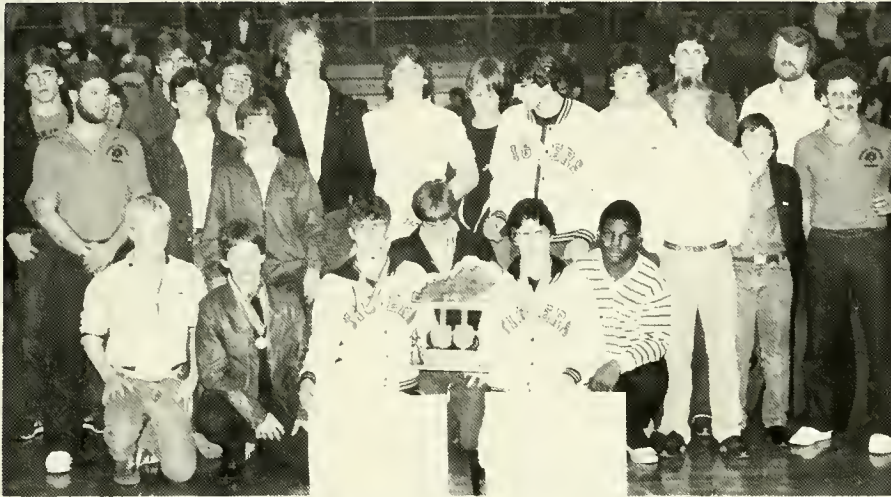

Football Helmet Warning Labels



In September 1982, the National Federation initiated a voluntary program to put "warning" labels on football helmets. Approximately one million free labels were distributed at that time. It was recommended that the labels be affixed to the outside rear portion of the helmet. It was also suggested that each school review and discuss the wording on the label with their football squads. In May 1983, 300,000 free labels were sent to the state associations. Additional labels were purchased by many states and also by individual schools.

The National Federation is hopeful that this voluntary program will grow and result in all helmets having the visible external labels for the 1984 season. To assist in this effort, the following helmet manufacturers have agreed to supply free labels to any school upon request.

KENTUCKY ATHLETIC TRAINERS SOCIETY

This is the first in what hopefully will be a long association between the Kentucky Athletic Trainers Society and the Kentucky High School Athletic Association.

This column will contain practical and timely information to assist you in the care of your athletes. The articles appearing in this column will be written by the Certified Athletic Trainers from across the state and edited for publication by Al Green, Athletic Trainer, University of Kentucky.

K.A.T.S. Corner would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Dr. Bobby Barton, Head Athletic Trainer, at Eastern Kentucky University on being reelected President of the National Athletic Trainers Association and voted "Trainer of the Year" by his peers.

Kentucky is a forerunner by being one of 10 states to have licensure of athletic trainers. It is therefore fitting that the first column inform you of the duties of the athletic trainer, history of K.A.T.S. and the State Statute of athletic training. A list of schools that have athletic training programs and classes is also included.

WHY IS AN ATHLETIC TRAINER IMPORTANT?

If the risks of athletic competition are to be justified, every effort must be made to protect the athlete against injury, and provide prompt and proper care for those inevitable injuries involved in athletics. Individuals participating on the secondary school level are more immature and underdeveloped than college athletes, and consequently it is extremely important that the mental and physical needs of these athletes not be neglected, as is so often the case. Almost all colleges and universities employ Certified Athletic Trainers. Many high schools are beginning to realize the need for professional supervision of their student athletes and are hiring certified trainers.

The athletic trainer will provide your faculty a highly skilled, professionally trained individual who is a medical technician working in conjunction with and under the supervision of local physicians. This close association and cooperation aid administration with the ever increasing problem of legal liability arising from neglect.

Most often the grounds for this legal action arise from having unqualified persons, such as coaches, or other untrained persons administering to the injured athlete. In some cases, having a certified trainer can result in a decreased cost on liability insurance premiums.

The athletic trainer also presents a more human approach to competitive athletics. In the process of carrying out the paramedical duties of the profession, the trainer builds a closer relationship with the athlete, very often closer than any other member of your faculty or school administration. Therefore, the trainer has an opportunity to promote better relations within your school and community, as well as with the parents of your athletes and the patrons of your athletic program.

Many administrators are not familiar with duties of an athletic trainer, thus failing to recognize the need. Most administrators feel that the coach can handle this phase of the sports program, not realizing that coaches are ill-prepared to handle the details involved in preventing and caring for athletic injuries.

HISTORY

In 1978, the Kentucky Legislature passed into law Kentucky Revised Statute 311.916. This law provides for athletic trainers to be certified by the state.

In 1982, the Kentucky Athletic Trainers Society was formed to work with the state in the certification process.

THE CERTIFIED ATHLETIC TRAINER

K.R.S. 311.900

"Athletic trainer" means a person with specific qualifications who upon the advice and consent of his team physician, carries out the practice of prevention or physical rehabilitation, or both, of injuries incurred by participating athletes at his educational institution, or other bona fide athletic organization. In carrying out these functions the athletic trainer is authorized to use whatever physical modalities as are deemed necessary by a team physician.

WAY TO BECOME CERTIFIED

K.R.S. 311.916 Applicant qualifications non-resident applicants; reciprocal licensing.

(1) An applicant for an athletic trainer certificate must possess one of the following qualifications:

(a) Have met the athletic training curriculum requirements of a college or university approved by the board and give proof of graduation; or

(b) Hold a certificate or a degree in physical therapy and have completed (1) a basic athletic training course; (2) a first aid and a cardio-pulmonary resuscitation course; (3) a nutrition course; and (4) have spent a minimum of six hundred (600) clock hours working under the direct supervision of an approved athletic trainer. The board may waive or alter the hour requirement if the applicant can demonstrate equivalent experience; or

(c) Have completed at least four years beyond the secondary school level while either an undergraduate or graduate student, as an apprentice athletic trainer at a college or university under the direct supervision of an athletic trainer approved by the board. Said four (4) years must be consecutive years of supervision, military duty excepted. An applicant for certification under this provision must show proof of graduation from an accredited college or university and successful completion of courses in athletic training, first aid, cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, nutrition, anatomy, physiology, and kinesiology.

(2) An out-of-state applicant must fulfill one of the above stated qualifications (1a, b, c). The Commonwealth of Kentucky may grant, without examination, a certificate to any qualified non-resident athletic trainer holding a license or certificate in another state if such other state recognizes certificates of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in the same manner. An out-of-state applicant from a state not having a licensure or certification act will be eligible to take the Kentucky Certification examination if certified by the National Athletic Trainers' Association and approved by the board.

ACTING AS ATHLETIC TRAINER WITHOUT CERTIFICATION PROHIBITED

K.R.S. 311.914

No person shall hold himself out as an athletic trainer or perform, for compensation, any of the activities of an athletic trainer as defined in K.R.S. 311.900 without first obtaining a certificate under K.R.S. 311.902 to 311.928; provided, however, that nothing in K.R.S. 311.902 to 311.928 shall be construed to prevent any person from serving as a student-trainer, assistant trainer, teacher-trainer, or any similar position if such service is not primarily for compensation and is carried out under the supervision of a physician.

attendance district where he/she wishes to participate, or through assignment by the Board of Education. A student who becomes emancipated shall be deemed not to have a bona fide change of residence absent proof that the change of residence was compelled by circumstances beyond his/her control.

Note: The Commissioner may not waive the period of ineligibility for a student even though there has been a bona fide change of residence, (1) if there is evidence of recruitment by anyone either connected or not connected with a member school, (2) if there is evidence that the transfer is for athletic advantage. A transfer for athletic advantage is defined as, but not limited to:

(a) seeking a superior athletic team; (b) seeking relief due to a conflict with the philosophy or action of an administrator, teacher or coach relating to sports; (c) seeking a team consistent with a student's athletic abilities; or (d) seeking a means to nullify punitive action by the previous school.

Administrative Responsibility - The Association must rely upon the voluntary compliance by its member schools in enforcing the eligibility standards as set forth in this rule. Therefore, the Principal in each member school has the affirmative obligation to report to the K.H.S.A.A. any violations of these standards. The fact that a school has disclosed that there has been an eligibility violation will not relieve the affected school of sanctions that may be imposed against it. However, the failure to disclose an eligibility violation may be grounds for imposing additional sanctions upon the offending school.

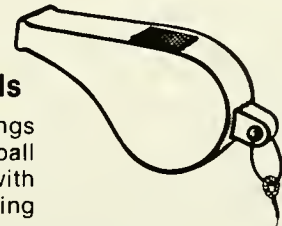

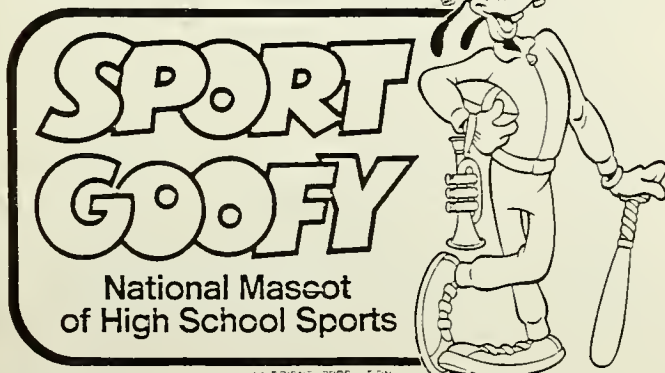
