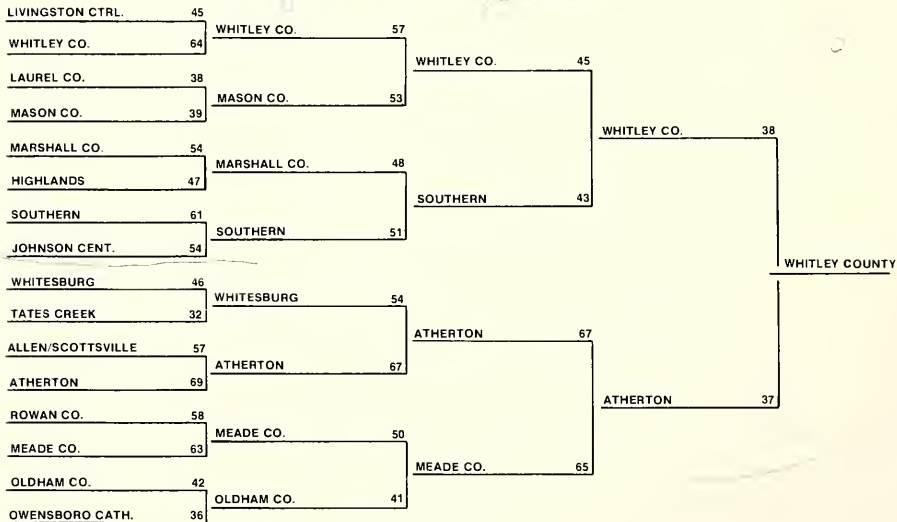

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1985 ANNUAL MEETING

The business meeting of the Delegate Assembly of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association will be held on Friday, April 19, 1985 at 11.00 a.m. at the K.H.S.A.A. office building, 560 East Cooper Drive, Lexington, Kentucky.

As provided in Article IX, Section 1, of the K.H.S.A.A. Constitution, the following proposals for changes in the rules of the Association, to be acted upon at the annual meeting, are hereby submitted to all members of the K.H.S.A.A. for their information. No proposals other than these may be considered at the Annual Meeting, except by a two-thirds vote of the delegates.

PROPOSAL I

Principal Thomas L. Hood of Dayton High School proposes that the following changes be made in Article IV of the Constitution of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association.

ARTICLE IV: ADMINISTRATION AND LEGISLATION

Section 1 - Officers (Be changed to read.)

The officers of the Association shall be a Commissioner and a Board of Control composed of **eighteen (18) members**, at least two (2) shall be black.

Section 2 - Procedures of Election & Board of Control (Shall be changed to read:)

B. Board of Control

1. Members of the Board of Control shall be elected for a period of four (4) years by a vote of the representatives of member schools in each region.
2. There shall be one (1) member from each of the sixteen (16) basketball regions.
3. In addition there shall be two (2) blacks elected (Federal Court Decree), one (1) shall be elected to represent Regions 1 through 8 and one (1) shall be elected to represent Regions 9 through 16.
4. All Board of Control members shall be full-time certified employees of their respective Boards of Education.
5. Notifications to the **Representatives** of each school in each **Region**, in which the member is to be elected, must be made by the Commissioner not later than January 1.
6. To be eligible for membership to the Board of Control, one must be a certified employee of an accredited K.H.S.A.A. member school or system in the region, he/she is to represent and must remain in that region during his/her term of office. Serving in a part time capacity or on leave of absence or on sick leave in any of these capacities will terminate the eligibility of the member and the remaining members of the Board shall fill the vacancy within sixty (60) days in the same manner as that prescribed for the regular election of the Board Members.
7. Nominations for membership on the Board of Control, signed by five (5) representatives, of their **region**, shall be in the hands of the Commissioner, for **regions** that elect during the year, not later than midnight January 31
8. Ballots for election shall be distributed by the Commissioner before February 15, and returned on or before March 1.

9. Results of the election shall be tabulated by the Commissioner, announced at the meeting of the Delegate Assembly, and published in the **April** issue of the "Athlete".
10. Terms of Board Members shall be staggered so that four (4) will be elected each year
11. At the Organization Meeting in July, the members of the Board of Control shall elect from their membership a President and Vice-President to serve for one (1) year. They shall not be eligible to serve for more than two (2) one-year terms in succession. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall designate a liaison person to meet with the Board of Control to participate in all discussion but to have no vote as a member of the Board of Control.

PROPOSAL II

Several principals in the Louisville-Jefferson County area propose that By-Law 4, Age be changed to read as follows: "A contestant becomes ineligible on the nineteenth birthday if the age of nineteen is attained prior to August 1. If a contestant's nineteenth birthday is attained on or after August 1, the contestant remains eligible for all sports the remainder of that school year.

PROPOSAL III

Principal Bill VanWinkle, Owensboro High School proposes that item number 2 under Basketball - Boys and Girls in By-Law 27, Limitation of Seasons be changed to read as follows: "The first basketball game for boys' teams shall not take place prior to the Monday following Thanksgiving and the first basketball game for girls shall not take place before November 1."

This also necessitates changing By-Law 43, Girl's Basketball Tournaments, by adding, "District tournaments shall be completed by the first Saturday in February, regional tournaments by the second Saturday in February and the state tournament by the third Saturday in February."

It also necessitates changing the Basketball Tournament Rules to delete "Girls' Basketball" in paragraph 1.

PROPOSAL IV

Principal Bill VanWinkle, Owensboro High School proposes that the following be added to By-Law 6, Summer Sports Program. "No member school shall have its basketball team attend any summer "Team Camp" as a unit and no more than three members from the same high school shall be assigned to the same team at any summer camp, summer basketball league, or summer tournaments."

PROPOSAL V

The K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control proposes that By-Law 5, Section e., be deleted. By-Law 5, Section e. reads as follows: "Out-of-state transfer students must be making normal progress toward graduation based upon the academic requirements of the state being transferred from. However, said student must adhere to Association academic guidelines within one year of transfer."

(This will eliminate the advantage of out-of-state student has over students attending member schools.)

PROPOSAL VI

The K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control proposes that By-Law 17, Practice of Sportsmanship be changed as follows: "The Commissioner and Board of Control shall have full

authority to suspend the coach, player or any member school whose representatives may be convicted on competent evidence of the violation of this obligation."

(This change would allow the K.H.S.A.A. to penalize the responsible individual instead of the entire school program.)

PROPOSAL VII

The K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control proposes that By-Law 21, Number of Basketball Games be changed to read as follows: "The number of basketball games played by a member school after December 31 and prior to the district tournament shall not exceed twenty. No member school shall play more than twenty-four. Any school which violates this rule shall not be eligible for district tournament competition. Any two county, conference or invitational tournament games played by a member school shall count as only one game for each tournament toward the total game limit of twenty-four.

PROPOSAL VIII

The K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control proposes that Section 5 of By-law 27, Limitation of Season under basketball be changed to read as follows: "The basketball season ends at all levels of play at the conclusion of the varsity team's last scheduled game, except that the varsity team may play through its elimination from K.H.S.A.A. tournament play. There shall be no further practice or play at any level during the remainder of that academic school year".

PROPOSAL IX

The K.H.S.A.A. Board of Control proposes that By-Law 27, Limitation of Seasons - Football - be changed to read as follows:

1. Organized practice in pads shall not begin prior to August 1.
2. The first game shall not take place prior to eleven (11) weekends before sub-district play-offs.

3. A maximum of ten (10) regular season games may be played. Pre-season bowl games shall count toward the ten-game regular season limitation.
4. The school's football season ends at all levels of play at the conclusion of the varsity team's last regular season game, except that the varsity team may play through its elimination from K.H.S.A.A. championship play-off competition. There shall be no further practice during the remainder of that academic school year.
5. No game, including regular season or play-off games, may be scheduled on a date that would require loss of school time for travel or play.
6. Every player must have five (5) days of practice without pads to become acclimated to heat conditions prior to August 1.
7. There shall be no more than two (2) practice games (scrimmages) at all levels (grades 9-12) prior to the opening game of the season with players other than members of the squad.

FOOTBALL RULE CHANGES ANNOUNCED FOR '85 SEASON



KANSAS CITY, MO. (January 18, 1985) — Several rule changes will be evident during the 1985 high school football season as a result of action taken recently by the National Federation Football Rules Committee. The interscholastic rules-making body approved a list of rule changes and modifications during a two-day session January 9-10, 1985, while meeting in conjunction with the National Federation's Annual Winter Meeting in Savannah, Georgia.

"Once again this year, the committee's attention focused primarily on the areas of player safety and game administration," said Dick Schindler, assistant director of the National Federation and liaison to the National Federation Football Rules Committee. "Overall, there were not any drastic rule changes made which will radically impact the way the game is being played. In most cases, the changes were primarily modifications of existing rules and were instituted for the sake of consistency and ease of coaching and officiating."

One of the changes among the most obvious to fans will be a rule pertaining to free kicks (kickoffs). The new rule specifies that free kicks out-of-bounds between the goal lines and untouched by a receiver will be a foul which carries a five-yard penalty if accepted. Previously, kicks going out-of-bounds beyond the receiving team's 40-yard line without being touched by the receiving team were spotted on the receiving team's 40-yard line. With the new rule, the receiving team has the option of taking the ball at the inbounds spot or having the ball re-kicked following a five-yard penalty.

"Basically, the rationale behind the change was two-fold," explained Schindler. "There has been concern from coaches and members of the rules committee alike that the previous rule severely penalized the kicking team. For instance, if the free kick went out-of-bounds on the two-yard line it was spotted on the receiving team's 40-yard line. This was the same procedure for a kick that went out-of-bounds anywhere from the one-yard line to the 40-yard line. Secondly, the new rule insures that the receiving team is allowed the opportunity for a returnable kick unless a touchback results. Although not a common practice, the old rule permitted teams to kick the ball out-of-bounds rather than defend against a particularly efficient return team or an outstanding returner."

Another of the most significant changes for '85 restricts the offensive player-in-motion from blocking below the waist in the free-blocking zone (a rectangular area extending four yards laterally on either side of the spot of the snap and three yards behind the scrimmage line). Previously, a player-in-motion in the free-blocking zone at the time of the snap could block an opponent below the waist.

"Safety was the sole reason for the rule change," pointed out Schindler. "The new rule is designed to curtail below-the-waist, blind-side blocks and situations in which a player could be at top speed when blocking an unsuspecting opponent. We feel the rule will assist in reducing the possibility of knee and other injuries which can occur when one player has a decisive edge in speed at the time of impact."

The national rules committee also addressed the often confusing issues of "motion" and "shifting," and took measures to standardize the procedures for game officials and coaches by revising the definition of "shift." A shift now includes any movement of one or more players to a new position. Previously, the movement of one player to a new position did not always constitute a shift, and the ball could be snapped immediately upon the player assuming a motionless position. A legal shift now requires that the player or players be motionless for a full second prior to the snap.

"The rule relieves the official from having to make an instant judgment as to whether the movement of one player does or does not constitute a shift by the offensive team, and consequently from having to determine if a one-second delay is required prior to snapping the football," said Schindler. "The rule does not restrict any offensive strategy and greatly alleviates what has often been a confusing situation for officials, coaches and players."

Going hand-in-hand with the shift modification was a change which now permits "motion" by a player parallel to the line of scrimmage. In the past, motion was required to be "clearly backward" by definition.

In addition to the free kick change, the enforcement of several other fouls were also modified at the national rules gathering. The committee changed the penalty for an ineligible receiver downfield to five yards and loss of down. Previously, the foul called for a 15-yard penalty. The penalty for all illegal use of hands and holding fouls were reduced to 10 yards. In the past, infractions for holding and illegal use of hands were 15 yards. Additionally, the re-entry of a disqualified player will become an illegal participation foul instead of an unsportsmanlike foul as previously specified. Consequently, the infraction is now a live ball foul and penalty yardage of 15 yards will be assessed as part of the play instead of from the succeeding spot as in the past.

In addition to the rules changes, four areas of emphasis were identified by the rules committee for 1985. Although no measures were taken by the committee to change rules in the emphasis areas, coaches and officials are urged to practice and enforce the rules as written. The "Points of Emphasis" include: (1) delays following the extra point attempt and prior to kickoff; (2) piling on and out-of-bounds contact; (3) re-emphasizing the legal blocking rules; (4) illegal helmet contact.

The National Federation Rules Committee consists of a voting representative from 48 member associations, a National Federation voting member, and representatives from the National Federation Interscholastic Coaches Association and National Federation Interscholastic Officials Association. The committee governs football competition for all high schools and many junior high schools in 47 states and the District of Columbia.

Following are the complete rules changes affecting a projected total of approximately 15,000 high schools and over 900,000 student-participants during the 1985 interscholastic season:

MINOR REVISIONS

- 2-2-2** Clarified that blocking below the waist applies only if an opponent has one or both feet on the ground.
- 2-14** Redefined hurdling.
- 3-1-3** Designated that the coaches rather than the captains be involved in decisions regarding the shortening of playing periods.
- 9-3-2f** Prohibits any player from positioning himself on the back or shoulders of a teammate or an opponent to gain an advantage.
- 9-6-3** Made the use of pretended substitutions to deceive an illegal participation foul.

1985 FOOTBALL RULES REVISIONS ADOPTED

- 1-3-1a** Deleted the requirement that the ball must have a rubber bladder.
- 1-5-1b** Adopted specifications for the face protector. The face protector shall be made of material designed to be non-breakable with rounded edges, and those constructed of metal shall have the surface covered with resilient material designed to prevent chipping and burrs or an abrasiveness which would endanger players.
- 1-5-3b,c** Clarified padding requirement on knee braces. Types of equipment or substances which shall always be declared illegal include: knee braces made of hard unyielding material unless hinges are both covered on both sides and all of its edges overlapped. Any other hard substance across the front of the leg must be covered with at least $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of closed-cell, slow recovery rubber or other material of the same minimum thickness and having similar physical properties.
- 1-5-3h2 NOTE** Clarified the cleat platform requirement and changed the date of implementation.
NOTE: Beginning with the 1987 season, the 5/32 inch raised platform must be wider than the base of the cleat and must extend across the width of the sole to within $\frac{1}{4}$ inch of or less of the outer edges of the sole. A single toe cleat does not require a raised platform that extends the width of the sole. The raised platform of the toe cleat is limited to 5/32 inches or less. The 5/32 inch platform is measured from the lowest part of the shoe's sole.
- 2-2-2** Added to the definition blocking below the waist applies only when the opponent has one or both feet on the ground.
- 2-10-1** Prohibits the player in motion from blocking below the waist by rewording the requirements so that an offensive player blocking below the waist in the free-blocking zone must be stationary at the snap.
- 2-14** Redefined hurdling as an attempt by a player to jump with one or both feet or knees foremost over a player who is still on his feet.
- 2-27** Redefined shift. A shift is the action of one or more offensive players, who after a huddle or after taking set positions, move to a new set position before the ensuing snap.
- 3-1-3** Designated that the coaches rather than the captains be involved in decisions regarding the shortening of playing periods.
- 4-2-2a** Rewritten to clarify the dead ball exception for the placekick holder.
- 6-1-9** A free kick out-of-bounds between the goal lines untouched by R is a foul. If the penalty is accepted, it is a 5-yard penalty from the previous spot.
- 7-2-4** Now permits player in motion to be moving parallel to the line of scrimmage.
- 7-5-7** Changed the penalty for an ineligible receiver downfield to 5 yards and loss of down.
- 9-2** Changed all illegal use of hand and holding penalties to 10 yards.
- 9-4-2e** Prohibits any player from positioning himself on the back or shoulders of a teammate or an opponent to gain an advantage.
- 9-6-3** Made the use of pretended substitutions to deceive an illegal participation foul.
- 9-6-4** Made reentry of a disqualified player an illegal participation foul.

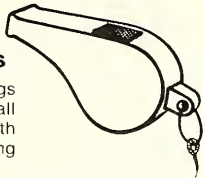

**National Federation of State High School Associations
RESOLUTION**

WHEREAS, the National Federation of State High School Associations consists of the fifty (50) individual state high school athletic and/or activities associations, the District of Columbia and Canadian Provinces who have united to secure the benefits of sharing and coordinating policies for administering high school athletic and fine arts programs; and,

WHEREAS, the National Federation recognizes the use of mood-altering chemicals as a significant health problem for many adolescents, resulting in negative effects on behavior, learning and the total development of each individual; and,

WHEREAS, the misuse and abuse of mood-altering chemicals for some adolescents affects extracurricular participation and development of related skills and others are affected by the misuse and abuse by team members, family or significant persons in their lives; and,

WHEREAS, the close contact in extracurricular activities of coaches and advisors provides them with a unique opportunity to observe, confront and assist young people; and,

WHEREAS, standards and rules for use of mood-altering chemicals can serve the following purposes.

- (1) to emphasize concerns for the health of students in areas of safety while participating in activities and the long-term physical and emotional effects of chemical use on their health;
- (2) to promote a sense of order and discipline among students;
- (3) to confirm and support existing state laws which restrict the use of such mood-altering chemicals;
- (4) to establish standards of conduct for those students who are leaders and standard-bearers among their peers;
- (5) to assist students who desire to resist peer pressure which directs them toward the use of mood-altering chemicals;
- (6) to assist students who should be referred for assistance or evaluation regarding their use of mood-altering chemicals; and,

WHEREAS, education and awareness training in adolescent chemical use problems can be provided for administrators, athletic directors, coaches, advisors, students and their families;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that it is the position of the National Federation of State High School Associations that a student participating in the athletic and fine arts activities program should not engage in the use of mood-altering chemicals.

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the National Federation encourage chemical awareness activities for students in the extracurricular activities of the fifty (50) state individual associations, the District of Columbia and the Canadian Provinces.

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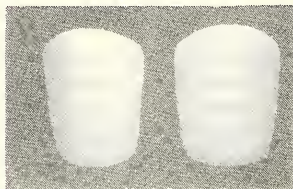
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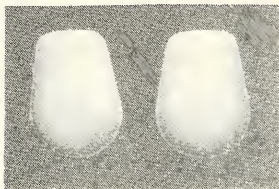
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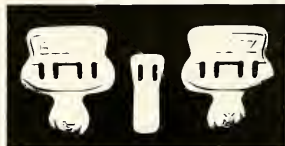
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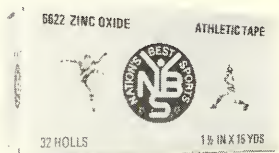
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
