

ANNOUNCING. . . . 1st Annual Mid America Classic

Since the announcement that the state basketball tournament champions from Kentucky and Indiana would meet in a one day doubleheader, it's been called "The Natural". The two neighboring states whose love for basketball at the high school level is well documented, will have their champions oppose each other in games to be held at Lexington's Rupp Arena on April 5, 1986. The girls champions will meet at approximately 1:15 p.m. with the boys champs colliding immediately afterwards.





Kentucky and Indiana are two of the few states whose high school basketball competition is not classified. That is to say, that the enrollment of a school has no effect upon who they compete against. Both states have a long standing tradition of competitive excellence in high school basketball, both have produced a great many college and professional players, and both have built their state tournaments to be truly the greatest shows on earth.

The two have now joined forces to help benefit all high school students. Proceeds from the games will help high school athletic participants in both states as all funds will go towards the catastrophic and liability insurance program, a policy which is designed to help offset medical expenses of a participant who suffers a severe injury while playing in, or traveling to or from, a high school athletic contest. This plan, which has a \$3,500 deductive clause, is in excess of other insurance, but has provisions to provide for unlimited lifetime medical benefits per injury.

The cost of this plan has been steadily rising. The expense costs each state nearly \$100,000.00 to insure all participants in all sports sanctioned by the state high school athletic associations. This policy is a benefit to all participants, one which the K.H.S.A. A. and the I.H.S.A.A. are dedicated to maintaining.

Tickets for the doubleheader are priced at \$7.00 for lower arena reserved seats, and \$5.00 for upper arena reserved seats and are available either by mail, or at the offices of either the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, 560 E. K.H.S.A.A. TRACK AND FIELD COMMITTEE MEETING

The K.H.S.A.A. Track and Field Committee met at the Association office in Lexington on January 21, 1986. The meeting was called to order by Brigid L. DeVries, Assistant Commissioner at 1:30 p.m.

Members present were: John Gettler, Bob Miller, Jean Wright, Bro. Borgia, Bill Patton, Charles Rutler, Reba Woodall, Susan Fetter. Larry Wingfield, Robert Stacey, Marty Mayer, Tony Rowe and Will Pagan.

Mr. Charles Ruter gave a short report concerning the Mason-Dixon Games, stating that there were about 2,000 athletes from 90 schools scheduled to participate. There was also discussion on a possible change of date, location and format of the games. It was suggested that the Committee for the Mason-Dixon Games look into the possibility of having a similar type of games for high schools only.

The first agenda item was the new alignment recently approved by the Board of Control which would be in effect for at least two years. Ms. DeVries explained that the purpose of the re-alignment was to better balance the regions. She also stated that the KHSAA office and the All-Sports Committee had compiled the new re-alignment from input from the participating track schools.

The next item for discussion included Region and Sectional Meets and sites. Some minor changes were made on the information sent to the schools. It was announced that the KHSAA would not absorb any deficits for regional and sectional meets. The dates for the meets

are as follows: Regional Meets: May 16 & 17, 1986

Sectional Meets: May 24, 1986 State Meet: May 31, 1986

It was emphasized that all track meets be scheduled so as not to interfere with regular school time.

The Committee screened the State Track Meet Information Sheet and discussed some revisions in the field events time schedule. Marty Mayer submitted a proposal for a different state meet format for the Committee to review

Ms. DeVries announced that the Board of Control approved in their last meeting a restructure of the Track Committee. It was suggested that the core of the Committee be made up of one representative per two basketball regions to get equal representation throughout the state. These members would serve for a four-year term. The K.H.S.A.A. would also select an additional four to six at-large members. This procedure will be in effect for the 1986-87 school year.

The Track Clinic dates and sites are as follows: February 20, 1986 — St Xavier High School - Louisville March 24, 1986 — Tates Creek High School - Lexington April 1, 1986 — Daviess County High School - Owensboro All clinics are scheduled for 7:00 p.m.

There was a brief discussion regarding the 1985-86 National Federation Track Rules changes. It was decided that for the Regional, Sectional and State Meets, competitors in the throwing events and the long and triple jumps will be allowed 3 trials in the preliminaries followed by 3 additional trials in the finals. In other meets, if the participating coaches agree, all competitors are allowed four trials. Rules 6-2-1 & 7-5-8

It was suggested that the All-Sports Committee survey the schools with regards to the addition of the 4 x 800 meter relay. This item will be brought up at the March meeting of the Board of Control.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

FOOTBALL RULE CHANGES ANNOUNCED FOR '86 SEASON



KANSAS CITY, MO. (January 15, 1986) — No major rules changes were made by the National Federation Football Rules Committee in its January 8-9 meeting in Reno, Nevada, as the committee determined that the condition of high school football rules has never been better.

The committee, composed of one representative from 48 of the state member associations and representatives of the National Federation Interscholastic Coaches Association (NFICA) and National Federation Interscholastic Officials Association (NFIOA), approved nine minor changes for the 1986 high school football season and identified four areas that need special attention in the coming season.

"This was the fewest changes in the football rules in the 20 years I have been associated with the committee," said Dick Schindler, Assistant director of the National Federation and liaison to the Football Rules Committee. "This reflects on the good condition of the game. The committee considered many proposals but did not make any changes that are going to affect the game significantly.

"Most of the changes made this year were clarifications of the rules for benefit of officials and coaches. The committee determined that no radical changes were needed, and none were made."

One of the clarifications made by the committee involves Rule 2-10-2c and emphasizes that defensive players cannot clip an opponent within the free-blocking zone. The free-blocking zone is a rectangular zone extending laterally four yards on either side of the spot of the snap and three yards behind each scrimmage line.

The committee also revised the definition of batting to include a ball in player possession. Henceforth, a team will be penalized 15 yards if one of its players bats (intentionally slapping a ball with the arm or hand) forward a ball in possession of one of its own team's players.

Beginning next season, each player's helmet must have a visible exterior warning label regarding the risk of injury. Although most schools complied previously, the label now will be required. The label is part of the National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment (NOCSAE) standard and indicates that players have been instructed and understand the risks involved in the game of football.

In other rules changes, the committee noted that a team must begin the game with 11 players but can continue with fewer if no substitutes are available to replace injured or disqualified players. In revising Rule 1-2-3b, game administrators are now allowed to place a four-inch wide broken restraining line around the entire field two or more yards from the sidelines and end lines for control of individuals outside the team boxes.

Other revisions made by the Football Rules Committee:

- * A new thigh guard padding specification takes effect in 1990.
- * Nonplayers cannot use insulting or vulgar language or gestures.
- * Two articles were added to Rule 9-6 (Illegal Participation) and mainly consisted of providing coverage for acts not clearly identified previously.

Points of emphasis for 1986 adopted by the committee were ball adjustment by the snapper, team-box restrictions, teammates aiding the runner and illegal helmet contract.

Points of emphasis are determined by the committee each year in an effort to improve compliance and enforcement in those areas.

"The committee felt that rules in these four areas are not being interpreted properly or not enforced uniformly in all situations," Schindler said. "The illegal helmet contract has been an annual point of concern and cannot be emphasized enough."

Approximately 15,000 National Federation member high schools offer football, involving about one million participants. Following are the complete rules changes for 1986:

RULES CHANGES

RULE SUMMARY OF CHANGE 1-1-2 A team must begin the game with 11 players but may continue with fewer than 11. 1-2-3b Allows game administration to place a four-inch wide broken restraining line around the entire field two or more yards from the sidelines and end lines. 1-5-1a The helment of each player shall have a visible exterior warning label regarding the risk of injury. 1-5-1g (Note) New thigh guard padding specifications goes into effect in 1990 2-10-2c (Note) Clarifies that defensive players may not clip within the free-blocking zone. 2-11-3b & 9-7-3 Batting definition revised to include a ball in player possession batted forward by a player of that team. Penalty is 15 yards. 9-6-5 It is illegal participation if a player is lying on the ground to deceive the opponents at or immediately before the snap or free kick. 9-6-6 It is illegal participation to have 12 or more players participating at the snap or free kick. 9-8-1a It is unsportsmanlike conduct for a nonplayer to use insulting or vulgar language or gestures.

EDITORIAL CHANGES ADOPTED

THE FOLLOWING IS THE SIGNIFICANT ACTION TAKEN BY THE EDITORIAL COMMITTEE: Much rewriting and format changes have been authorized.

- In 1-3-4 identified that the yardage chain shall join 2 rods that are exactly 10-yards a part. In 5-3-3 changed "outside" to inside to reflect this change. In the diagram changed to drawing of the rods and chain to show the change.
- 2. Deleted 2nd sentence in 1-4-3 as it is covered in 7-2-lb.
- 3. In 1-5-3h changed first two wards to "removable cleats" as this section pertains only to removable cleats. In 1-5-3h Note reworded the last sentence to "has no cutting edge".
- Authorized editor to write a casebook play to explain that an illegal blocking technique by a offensive lineman
 attempting a legal clip within the free-blocking zone is penalized as illegal use of hands and is not clipping
- The last sentence in 2-20-2 was deleted and added to 6-2-7 since the expansion is prohibited only as it appears to touching of a kick in the end zone.
- Added "e" in 2-30-5 to clarify that succeeding spot on kickoffs is the 40-yard line for nonplayer and unsportsmanlike fouls.
- In 3-3-3 an addition was made to clarify that nonplayers and unsportsmanlike fouls are not considered in the coverage for extending a period with an untimed down.
- 8. In 7-2-6 the words "Team A" were added before "lineman" to clarify a legal snap involves the Team A lineman.
- 9 Added the words "in or behind the neutral zone" to the forward pass summary chart item 1d. This clarifies that to be an illegal pass the touching by the ineligible must occur in or behind the neutral zone.
- In 9-6-2 added "influence the play" to clarify that a replaced player or substitute could be called for illegal participation by influencing the play.
- 11 Added "or free kick" to 10-4-4a as a foul which occurs simultaneously when a free kick is penalized from the previous spot.
- 12. Added a sentence to Fundamental #31 to show that an ineligible could go downfield after the pass is in flight

-------HELMET WARNING LABELS ------

The 1986 National Federation Baseball/Softball Rules and Football Rules require that each helmet has an exterior warning label, regarding the risk of injury.

The manufacturers and reconditioners have consistently indicated that they would furnish free labels to schools upon request. Most football helmets should already have the warning labels but it is possible a significant number of batting helmets do not.

I would suggest you inform your schools of the requirement and ask them to contact their local dealers and suppliers, or the company that manufactured the product, if they need a supply of labels. You may wish to contact the manufacturers and get a supply sent directly to your association for distribution to your member schools upon request.

The National Federation is presently working to obtain a supply of labels, so we can send them to State Associations that can't find them anywhere else. If we are able to get these labels we anticipate they will reach our office around the first of March.

Following some minor changes made in the State Tournament information sheets there was a discussion of possible format changes in the State Tournament format. Some of the possible changes in the coming years that were discussed: (1) making sufficient changes in the girls' tournament that would make it on a par with the boys tournament and (2) changing the format of the boys' and girls' tournament that would allow the boys to play their tournament and then have the girls' play the following two days.

Some of the concerns brought up during the miscellaneous business were: (1) the need to change golf from a spring sport to a fall sport (2) objection to not having a required rules clinic for coaches and officials (3) concern for the scheduling of only two days for regional and state tournaments in case of inclement weather and

long travel times (4) discussion of the possibility of requesting a waiver of the six hour academic school day from the State Department of Education so that play could begin earlier in the day during regional play. Bill Frost brought up the fact that in the past there has been some dissatisfaction during the Girls' State Tournament in Elizabethtown because there were not enough carts available to facilitate the media and officials because the course was renting them to spectators. It was decided that the course would be requested to hold 7 carts for the members of the press covering the tournament and for tournament officials to use. The course will be compensated for the use of these carts.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

PROPOSAL 48 - NEW NCAA REGULATION PASSES

Effective immediately, incoming students to an NCAA member institution who wish to immediately participate in intercollegiate athletics at the Division I level must have maintained a 2.0 grade point average in a core curriculum including at least three years English, two years math, two years social science, and two years of physical or natural science; as well as having attained a 700 combined score on the SAT verbal and math sections or a 15 composite score on the ACT; and be a high school graduate.

When the full body of the NCAA Convention passed the rule at its January meeting, it passed the by-law, as amended to phase in the requirements over a two year period. The amendment stated that eligibility may be attained for incoming athletes after August 1, 1986 and prior to August 1, 1987 by one of five possible combinations --

The By-Law, which follows By-Law 5-1-(j), on pages 92 & 93 of the NCAA Handbook, also allowed for an exception which states, "An exception may be granted by the NCAA Eligibility Committee for a student who left high school after completion of his junior year or during his senior year to enter a member institution under an early admissions program open to students solely on the basis of outstanding academic performance and promise, and provided that for the last four semesters completed in high school, the student maintained an accumulative grade point average of 3.5 (based on a maximum of 4.0) and ranked in the top 20 percent of the students class, and that the student met all of the requirements of a qualifier except for graduation from high school."

NOTICE TO BASEBALL/SOFTBALL OFFICIALS

One big change for this year's playing rules is the requirement that in addition to the batter, all runners, on deck batters, and all players in the coaches box must wear a NOCSAE approved helmet, and the helmet must have the appropriate warning label affixed to the outside in a visible location. No coach should allow helmets to be used that are not NOCSAE approved. This is not optional, this is mandatory. The warning labels may be requested from sporting goods stores in your area, of from the manufacturer from who you purchased your helmets.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL KHSAA OFFICIALS

Effective with this year, 1986, officials in baseball, basketball, football, soccer, softball, track, volleyball, and wrestling will be required to re-register between May 1, 1986 and June 30, 1986. New officials will still be permitted to register until the current deadlines. Registration forms will be mailed during April to all currently registered officials. If your address is not correct or you have had trouble receiveing mailings, magazines, etc. from this office, you should contact Ms. Pruitt immediately to have her double check your address. Officials not re-registering during the May-June period will be assessed a \$25.00 late charge in addition to the normal fees required. There will be no waivers from this policy or fee.

If you do not receive your re-registration form prior to June 1, you should contact this office immediately. Non-receipt of information will not be an acceptable reason for waiver of the late fee.

The new registration schedule is due in part to a new reciprocal agreement between the states adjacent to Kentucky in an effort to allow the ratings, years service, and other items, to transfer from one state to another.

The procedure to register in multiple states is as follows -- Register with the High School Athletic Association in your state of residence. Pay the normal fee required for registrants in your home state. You then must pay a \$10.00 multiple state registration fee. This fee entitles you to officiate contests in all states participating in the multiple state agreement. You will be required to pay no other additional fees for registration, other than those that may be assessed by a local officials association as dues. Ratings, years of service, and all other pertinent information will be forwarded to all participatin states upon receipt of the \$10.00 fee. If you have any questions, please contact K.H.S.A.A. NOTE TO ALL ADMINISTRATORS


Many of you have responded to our SOS in releasing teaching personnel to assist with the many tasks necessary to keep this organization functioning effectively.

SITUATION #1: B1 appears at bat wearing a helmet that does not bear an exterior warning label, and is detected by the umpire. **RULING:** The umpire will require the batter to secure a legal helmet. 1-1-5

exterior warning label, but the helmet does not have the NOCSAE stamp. Since the coach verified to the umpire-in-chief during the pre-game coaches/umpires conference that his players were dressed in compliance with the rules, this shall include batting

RULING: The helmet is legal only if the coach has verification that the helmet was manufactured after July 22, 1982, and that it meets NOCSAE standards. 1-1-5

RULING: Umpires are not required to inspect helmets. However, if an umpire detects a helmet without an exterior warning label, that player shall obtain a legal helmet. 1-1-5

SITUATION #4: As B1 steps into the batter's box, the umpire notices that B1's helmet does not bear an exterior warning label. RULING: The umpire shall order the player to obtain a legal helmet, and then the umpire shall warn the player to obtain a legal memiet, and then the umpire shall warn the player's coach that the next player to violate the rule shall be ejected. 1-1-5 STUATION #5: Prior to the game, or during the game, the coach notices that the warning label on one of his team's batting helmets has come off and is not to be found.

RULING: The coach may affix the proper warning label to the helmet's exterior, which would then be in compliance with the rule.

SITUATION #6: The coach goes to a sporting goods store to obtain exterior warning labels for his team's helmets. However, the sporting goods dealer does not have any exterior warning labels available, or does not know what he should do to obtain any.

available, or does not know what he should do to obtain any. RULING: If exterior warning labels are not available through local dealers and suppliers, the coach should contact the manufacturer. If he is still unable to obtain a supply of labels, he should contact his state association and let them know of the problem. In an emergency situation, in order for helmest to meet the rule requirements, so that they can be used in a game, a coach may wish to have exterior labels prepared by using the suggested NOCSAE warning statement DO NOT USE THIS HELMET IF THE SHELL IS CRACKED OR DEFORMED OR IF INTERIOR PADDING IS DETERIORATED. SEVERE HEAD OR NECK INJURY, INCLUDING PARALYSIS OR DEATH, MAY OCCUR TO YOU DESPITE USING THIS HELMET. NO HELMET CAN PREVENT
