Board Gets "Clean" Opinion From Audit

MINUTES

September 15, 1994

The Board of Control of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association met at the Association Office in Lexington, Kentucky, on Thursday, Sept. 15, 1994. The meeting was called to order at 9:05 a.m. by President Frank Cardwell. Board members present in addition to the President were Vice President Ozz Jackson, Tom Bryant, Tasso Harris, Cookie Henson, Claudia Hicks, Kathy Hopper, Bob Rogers, Stan Steidel, Darrell Treece and Frank Welch. Members absent were Bill Beasley, Ken Cox, Teresa Isaac, Grant Talbott and Wendell Thomas. Also present were Commissioner Louis Stout, Assistant Commissioners Larry Boucher and Brigid DeVries, Bus. Mgr. Julian Tackett, SID Brooks Downing, Ken Tippett, Anne Wesley Mays and State Dept. Representative Randy Kimbrough.

The Invocation was given by Frank Cardwell.

President Cardwell then called on Lisa VonHalle and Mike Sullivan from the CPA firm of Miller, Mayer, Sullivan and Stevens. The audit reports were mailed to the Board prior to the meeting. Mr. Sullivan expressed positive comments regarding the financial condition of the KHSAA. The "going concern" opinion noted in the 1992-93 audit was replaced with a "clean" opinion in the 1993-94 audit. He went over the audit report and fielded questions from Board members. Mr. Sullivan noted that even though revenue was down considerably from the projected budget figure for the 1994 Boys' Basketball Tournament, total expenses for the Association were held in check. Stan Steidel requested that the Association receive, in writing, a summary of the audit in the form of a Management Letter. Mr. Sullivan stated the firm would be happy to issue such. Ozz Jackson then made a motion that the 1993-94 Audit Report be accepted. Bob Rogers seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Wendell Thomas arrived at 9:20 a.m. and did not vote on the previous motion.

Commissioner Stout presented plans to the Board regarding the establishment of the KHSAA Foundation. This Foundation is being formed to develop the Hall of Fame Museum and decrease the indebtedness of the building. Mr. Downing then distributed a new pamphlet, "KHSAA -- A Partner in Educating Tomorrow's Leaders," which he and the Commissioner developed to highlight the Benefits, Programs, Services, Finances,

The next Board of Control meeting is Jan. 19-21, 1995 at the KHSAA offices.

Purpose and Rules of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association.

Following these presentations, Wendell Thomas made a motion that the Commissioner continue on with plans for the formation of the KHSAA Foundation. Frank Welch seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Commissioner Stout then introduced the new receptionist, Angela Faulkner, to the Board and officially welcomed her to the KHSAA family.

The next items on the Agenda were the appeals hearings. Wendell Thomas made a motion that the Board of Control vote on all eligibility appeals in Open Session. Tom Bryant seconded the motion. The motion failed. Cookie Henson then moved to reconsider the previous motion. Kathy Hopper seconded, motion passed 11-2. Tasso Harris made a motion that the vote be taken by roll call. Tom Bryant seconded the motion which passed 9-4.

Each appellant was allowed to present his/her case in Open or Closed Session and distribute to the Board any additional information which was not submitted previously and which the Board received prior to the hearings. The Board then went into Executive Session to discuss the case. Following return to Open Session, a roll call vote was taken on a motion to grant or deny the appeal. The President explained the Due Process Procedure to each appellant in the event the appeal was denied. Following is the disposition of each appeal:

1) Jennifer Ziegler, Campbell County HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Kathy Hopper made a motion to grant the appeal due to financial hardship. Wendell Thomas seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

2) Travis Petty, Ballard HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Claudia Hicks made a motion to deny the appeal due to lack of a bona fide change of residence. Darrell Treece seconded the motion which passed 9-3. 3) Rachel VanMeter, Oldham County HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Claudia Hicks made a motion to grant the appeal due to hardship. Kathy Hopper seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Ken Cox arrived at the meeting at 11:45 a.m.

Ms. Kimbrough recommended that the Board of Control seek an Attorney

General's Opinion regarding the status of the KHSAA as a public entity and therefore subject to the Open Meeting Law.

President Cardwell called for a lunch break at 12:12 to reconvene at 1 p.m.

The Board reconvened at 1:10 and continued with the appeals hearings.

4) Otello Claxton, Louisville, Bylaw 3, Age Rule

President Cardwell advised the Commissioner to notify the parties that no action was taken due to their failure to appear.

5) Istvan Lambriex, Ky. Country Day, Bylaw 6, Sec. 2, FES

Ozz Jackson made a motion to grant the appeal. Tom Bryant seconded the motion which failed by a vote of 8-5.

6) Jeremy Stone, North Bullitt HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Tasso Harris made a motion to grant the appeal. Frank Welch seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

7) Jammie Purvis, Bath County HS, Bylaw 3, Age Rule

Claudia Hicks made a motion to grant the appeal. Kathy Hopper seconded the motion which failed by a vote of 6 yesses and 8 nos.

8) Jonathan Sumner, Hazard HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Bob Rogers made a motion to grant the appeal. Tom Bryant seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

9) Tommy Garrenton, Apollo HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Bob Rogers made a motion to grant the appeal contingent upon receipt of medical information to verify his condition of health. Stan Steidel seconded the motion which passed 12-2.

10) Lajuane Chenault, Bryan Station HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Stan Steidel made a motion to grant the appeal based on the availability of special classes at Bryan Station HS. Tasso Harris seconded the motion which passed unanimously. Teresa Isaac disqualified herself from the hearing and did not vote.

11) Steve Kennedy, Dayton HS, Bylaw 3, Age Rule

Tom Bryant made a motion to grant the appeal. Ozz Jackson seconded the motion which passed 12-1. Stan Steidel disqualified himself from the hearing and did not vote.

12) Jennifer Anderson, Scott HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Tasso Harris made a motion to grant the appeal. Stan Steidel seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Darrell Treece left the meeting at 4:30 p.m.

13) Bo Parrish, Ballard HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Stan Steidel made a motion to grant the appeal. Frank Welch seconded the motion which passed 12-0. Ozz Jackson was absent from the hearing.

14) Philip Haussermann, L'ville Collegiate, Bylaw 6, Sec. 2, FES

Kathy Hopper made a motion to grant the appeal. Tom Bryant seconded the motion which passed 10-3.

15) Spencer Smith, Ballard HS, Bylaw 6, Transfer Rule

Cookie Henson made a motion to grant the appeal. Ozz Jackson seconded the motion which failed 10-3.

There being no further appeals to come before the Board, President Cardwell recessed the meeting until 9 a.m., Friday, Sept. 16. The meeting recessed at 6:30 p.m.

September 16, 1994

President Cardwell reconvened the Board of Control meeting on Friday, Sept. 16, 1994 at 9 a.m. All Board members were present. Also present were Commissioner Louis Stout, Assistant Commissioners Larry Boucher and Brigid DeVries, Bus. Mgr. Julian Tackett, SID Brooks Downing, Ken Tippett, Anne Wesley Mays and State Dept. Representative Randy Kimbrough.

The first item on the Agenda was the approval of the minutes of the July 21-22, 1994 Board of Control Meeting. Mr. Cardwell noted that Claudia Hicks' name should be included on the Executive Committee. Frank Welch made a motion, seconded by Bill Beasley, that the minutes of the meeting be approved as corrected. The motion passed unanimously.

Bill Beasley made a motion, seconded by Bob Rogers, that the minutes of the West Eligibility Committee Meeting on Aug. 31, 1994 be approved. The motion passed unanimously.

Frank Welch moved that all bills of the Association for the period July 1 - Aug. 31, 1994 be approved. Darrell Treece seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Mr. Tackett and Ms. Mays presented the Budget Report and Update through Aug. 31. They reported on the settlement of E.C. Matthews vs. KHSAA. Following their report, Ken Cox made a motion to accept the budget report and update. Wendell Thomas seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Asst. Comm. Boucher then gave an update on the Officials' Division, specifically a review of the procedures used for the ratings, observations, evaluations, discipline and recruitment of officials. Following a lengthy discussion of the pro-

posed policy changes for the Officials Division, Ken Cox made a motion, seconded by Teresa Isaac, that the recommended changes be approved as presented and distributed immediately. He added that details be worked out through communications across the State. The motion passed 15-1.

An explanation then followed by Mr. Tackett regarding the need to transfer \$6,809.00 to the Retirement Trust Fund at Montgomery & Traders Bank. This transfer is to be made annually for the previous year as detailed in the audit report to cover employees' accrued sick leave in the event of retirement. Grant Talbott made a motion to approve this request. Ozz Jackson seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Bill Beasley made a motion to approve the proposed Fan Jam '95 contract with All-Star, Inc. Tasso Harris seconded the motion which passed 15-1.

A lengthy discussion then ensued regarding Fast Pitch Softball. Commissioner Stout reported on the status of the Attorney General's Opinion. Many concerns were expressed about the Limitation of Seasons, minimum number of games, cost of clinics, participation by schools, etc. Mr. Boucher announced the results of the Fast Pitch/Slow Pitch Softball Survey which was mailed to all schools. The results are as follows: 185 schools will play fast pitch; 45 schools will also play slow pitch; 16 schools will not play softball; the remaining schools did not respond. Bob Rogers made a motion that the following requirement be added to Rules and Regulations Governing Softball Tournaments of the KHSAA: Number of Games - a minimum of ten (10) fast pitch softball games shall be played. Wendell Thomas seconded the motion. The motion failed by a vote of 8-8. Stan Steidel made a motion, seconded by Tasso Harris to accept the softball report as presented. The motion passed 15-1.

No action was taken following a discussion of the eligibility of students who were assigned to Lewis County High School after the closure of Tollesboro High School.

The next item on the Agenda was a discussion of several proposals to be considered as amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws for presentation at the Annual Meeting on February 9-10.

1) Bylaw 2. Responsibility for Eligibility - Addition of allowing the principal to appoint a designated representative in his/her absence to conduct the business of the interscholastic program in his/her school. This change could affect Bylaws 1, 12, 14, 15 and 18. Ken Cox made a motion to add Designated Representative to the suggested bylaws as listed in

the draft. Tom Bryant seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

2) Bylaw 25. Limitation of Seasons - President Cardwell asked the All-Sports Committee to look at this bylaw and make a recommendation to the Board.

The Board then heard a proposal submitted by Greenebaum, Doll & McDonald with regard to procuring a Hearing Officer to hear appeals as part of the Due Process Procedure and a fixed retainage amount for the legal expenses with the firm. Attorney Danny Reeves explained the procedure and answered questions regarding same. Commissioner Stout recommended that the Board accept the proposal of Greenebaum Doll & McDonald in its entirety.

President Cardwell called for a lunch break at 12:30 p.m. to reconvene at 1:30 p.m.

The meeting was reconvened at 1:30 p.m. with the absence of Claudia Hicks.

Ken Cox made a motion that the Commissioner's recommendation be supported. Following a discussion, Frank Cardwell seconded the motion. The motion failed 10-5. Bill Beasley then moved that the Board accept the Commissioner's recommendation of a Hearing Officer as part of the Due Process Procedure. Tom Bryant seconded the motion which passed 9-5. Bob Rogers made a motion, seconded by Tom Bryant, that the proposal of Greenebaum, Doll & McDonald be accepted. The motion passed 11-3. Teresa Isaac was absent from the voting. Darrell Treece made a motion that qualifications of a Hearing Office be established and a Job Description be approved by the Board. Bill Beasley seconded the motion which passed unanimously. Tasso Harris then moved to accept the Due Process Procedure as amended. Frank Welch seconded the motion which passed 13-1.

Following a discussion of amending Bylaw 7. Conduct, to include contest officials or other official school representatives, and to carry over penalties occurring in the last game of a season, Tasso Harris made a motion to accept Bylaw 7 with amendments and submit it to the Delegate Assembly as well as an amendment to Bylaw 38. Ken Cox seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Asst. Comm. DeVries advised the Board that plans were being finalized for the opening of the Novelty Shop at the KHSAA Headquarters. The purpose of the shop will be to sell leftover items from the state events.

Commissioner Stout announced the

formation of a Middle School Committee as recommended by the State Board of Education's Blue Ribbon Commission. Mr. Stout submitted the names of Homer Brown, Joe Carr, Larry Cheek, Juanta Cox, Danny Maxberry, Dan Sullivan and Jim Watkins. Wendell Thomas made a motion to accept the appointees presented by the Commissioner. Ozz Jackson seconded the motion, which passed. Other names submitted for inclusion on the Committee were John Blaney, Marvin Moore and Vaughn Macklin.

Other items of discussion with no action taken included Coaching Education to be conducted on Nov. 19 and coordinated by Jim Komara, the former Fayette County Athletic Director; the formation of an Insurance Committee; 1995-96 football realignment to be submitted to the Board in December; a new Sweet 16 ticket brochure and the formation of a Sweet 16 Club. A request was made regarding the Board's waiving By-law 25, 1 and 7, to allow baseball and softball teams to participate in out-of-state games during spring break prior to the start of the season. Grant Talbott made a motion, seconded by Tasso Harris to approve this request. The motion failed 10-3. Ms. DeVries discussed the Strategic Planning Workshop which was conducted for the Board of Control by David Bryant on Wednesday, Sept. 14. She distributed a strategic plan to be developed by the KHSAA.

Commissioner Stout asked the Board to consider a request from Peter Conway to bring an Australian basketball team to the West Hopkins area to play games in December and not count the games in the Limitation of Seasons. Steidel made a motion that due to the lateness and uncertainty of details, the request be denied. Harris seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Mr. Stout announced the results of appeals submitted to the State Board of Education: Fredrik Holst, upheld; Phillip Rose, upheld; Eugene Smith, upheld; Julie Skaggs, upheld; Kim Murphy, overruled; Ryan Tucker, overruled; Aaron Deglow, overruled.

The Board set the date for the next meeting to be held on Friday and Saturday, December 2-3 at the Executive Inn in Louisville during the State Football Playoffs.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Frank Welch made a motion to go into Executive Session. Bill Beasley seconded the motion which passed.

The regular meeting of the Board adjourned at 4:15 p.m.

Volleyball Assigner Needed For Lexington

VOLLEYBALL MINUTES

November 29, 1994

The Volleyball Committee met on Tuesday, Nov. 29, 1994, at the KHSAA office in Lexington. Executive Assistant, Brigid L. DeVries, called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. Members present included John Smith, Katie Wesseling, Luci Cecil, Kim Gunning, Ron Kordes, Ken Garvey, John Bancroft and Jim Watkins.

The first item on the agenda was the Officials' Division. It was felt that an Assigning Secretary for Central Kentucky was necessary, and if possible, in place for the 1995 season. Larry Boucher has approached the Local Policy Board on this issue already. There was a concern from the Louisville area regarding officials working scrimmages. Jim Watkins agreed to work with the officials' group to help with this situation.

John Smith recommended that a discussion and comparison of the different volleyball rules codes might be helpful during the mandatory high school clinics for coaches and officials. Ms. DeVries reported that work has begun on a Volleyball Officials' Training Film with footage taken of the officials during the

state volleyball tournament this year. Another goal in this area is to develop a Volleyball Manual which will include such things as officiating polices and procedures with an emphasis on training and development of new officials.

The next item was a discussion on the volleyball regional alignment. The new Eighth Region alignment that went into place this year was well accepted by the schools participating in volleyball. It was felt that with the exception of the Eighth, which is a little larger, no adjustment be made for the 1995 season. However, the committee felt that down the road, volleyball might expand to include district play when around 100 schools are participating.

The 1994 State Volleyball Tournament was the next item for discussion. Ms. DeVries thanked Luci Cecil and Katie Wesseling for all of their hard work in helping to coordinate details on this year's tournament in Northern Kentucky. The coaches really liked the new 16-team format and schedule. Coaches were also very complimentary of the facilities at Ryle High School and Gray Middle School. Suggestions for the 1995 tournament include a change in the selections of the All-Tournament Team... to be made by an independent committee. The State Volleyball Committee mem-

bers will check to see if this procedure is feasible and if they can secure enough people to agree to the committee recommendation. If this cannot be accomplished then the current procedure will be followed. It was also recommended that the All-Tournament Team be expanded to 15 and included in that number would be the most valuable player as the 15th player. Ms. DeVries will present this recommendation to the Board of Control.

Other suggestions included introducing each member of the winning and runner-up teams during the closing ceremonies at the end of the final match as they receive their medals. There was a discussion regarding the site for the 1995 Tournament which is scheduled to be in Louisville. Committee members suggested Bellarmine College or Seneca High School as possible sites. Jim Watkins, along with other Louisville committee members, will work on the state site.

Miscellaneous items included a report by Ron Kordes on his Delegate Assembly Proposal regarding the limitation of seasons. The proposal would increase the number of allowed tournaments from two to three. This proposal

Football Ad Hoc Committee Results

FOOTBALL MINUTES

October 19, 1994

The Board of Control/Football Coaches' Advisory Committee met at the Kentucky High School Athletic Association on Wednesday, October 19, 1994. All members of the Committee were present, as well as Board of Control Football Committee Chairman, Ozz Jackson and Business Affairs Director, Julian Tackett, the KHSAA Staff Liaison for football.

The first action of the committee was to acknowledge the presence of Mike McCoy, head football coach at Eastern High School, Louisville, who will fill the spot vacated by the former coach at Louisville Central.

First on the agenda was a presentation of the materials that were given to the members of the committee prior to the meeting, including a packet of information mailed to the member schools, a tentative draft of the proposed alignment and a summary of all changes requested by member schools since the alignment was distributed by the Board of Control.

The first response was from Steve Fromeyer, Head Football Coach Eminence High School, recommending an alternative for schools not competing for the district. The recommendation was to give these non-competing schools an extension of the season by one game and allow the two Class A teams with the best record to have a post season game. Mr. Fromeyer presented this suggestion and asked for the Committee's support.

The next non-member wishing to speak to the committee was Kathy Hopper, Principal at Waggener High School, who represented a group of four schools in Jefferson County who have formerly been classified as Class AAAA who now desire to participate in Class AAA. The enrollment of these schools qualified them for AAA status and the schools had chosen not to play AAAA with the remainder of Jefferson County. Ms. Hopper's purpose was to inform the committee the rationale of the decision of the four schools and express her wish that there be as little disruption as possible to incorporate these schools into the alignment. She also presented a proposal for those four schools to be classified with South Oldham, Oldham County, North Bullitt and Bullitt Central into a district. This request was signed by each of the other schools.

Following Ms. Hopper's presentation, Mr. Tackett went through each re-

quest that had been made from member schools for changes to the draft alignment and presented them to the Ad Hoc Committee for their reaction. It was the consensus of the group that they would hear all the proposed changes before taking action on any of the requests.

The next item of discussion centered around the enrollment figures used in classifying schools. Different from previous years, the Football Advisory Committee had recommended and the Board of Control had accepted the use of the top four grade enrollment numbers to classify schools for playing in football districts. The issue at hand was the counting of Special Education students. In prior years, 75% of the students reported as Special Education were factored into the school's total enrollment. This was primarily due to the fact that only the top three grades would be utilized. With all four grades being utilized, it was the consensus of the committee that all four grades (boys and girls, as well as all reported Special Education students) would be included in the total enrollment of every school prior to any classification decision. It had been suggested by representatives of the Department of Education to only count fifty percent of the Special Education to lessen the impact of the inconsistency in reporting special education students. A motion was made by Owen Hauck, seconded by Alvis Johnson, that all students (100% in the affected area be counted prior to classifying a school. The

motion passed 7-3. The committee then directed Mr. Tackett to report back the number of schools that would be affected by the inclusion of all Special Education students in terms of enrollment figures.

The next subject for discussion was concerning a school's ability to play in a higher classification. It was unanimous agreement of the committee that schools would be permitted, upon voluntary application, to play in a higher classification than its enrollment would place them. The motion was made by Alvis Johnson to recommend this to the full Board of Control, seconded by Owen Hauck and passed by a 10-0 margin.

While reviewing the requested changes by the member schools, there was some discussion on the request by Raceland High School to allow tournament play in football to be cross-bracketed within each region, thereby allowing for alternation of opponents. Following this lengthy discussion, Sam Harp moved, seconded by Gerald Poynter, that in all classes and in all regions the winners within the regional tournament would play within the current format. For the semifinal games in all classes, the Region 1 winner would play the Region 2 winner and Region 3 play Region 4. The motion to recommend this to the Board of Control passed 10-0.

Following a short break to allow for enrollment adjustments, and after consideration of all requested changes submitted by the schools, a class by class discussion was held. It was the feeling of the committee that the published

bounds of the classes needed to have slight adjustments to allow for the inclusion of 100% of special education students. The adjustments set the boundaries of Class A 0-570. During the discussion of Class A, Hancock County High School's request to move from Class A to Class AA was discussed by the committee. While all other requests to play in a higher class had been honored, the KHSAA staff had been hesitant Hancock County's request due to the fact that it would leave four teams in the Class A district. However, it was the unanimous consent of the committee that Hancock County's request be honored. Dudley Hilton made a motion to honor the request, George Lynch seconded. Motion passed 10-0. Hancock County will be placed in the appropriate district in Class AA. After further discussion of the Class A alignment and considering any necessary changes from requests for playing in a high classification, a motion by Alvis Johnson, seconded by Owen Hauk, that the draft alignment for Class A be approved as recommended by this committee and forward to the Board of Control Football Committee for adoption. Motion carried 10-0.

The next item for discussion of the Class AA alignment. Following discussion of the enrollment figures, the bounds for Class AA were recommended to be changed to allow schools who have between 571-860 total students be allowed to play in Class AA football. Following the distribution of the draft, Hart County High School had made a request to change districts within Class AA. After discussion of this request, it was the decision of the committee to recommend that Hart County be placed in Region 2, District 2 of Class AA. Justification for this recommendation was a balancing of the number of teams in each district to allow for competitive and scheduling fairness. The motion was made by Alvis Johnson, seconded by Owen Hauk and the motion passed 10-0. After other requests to move within Class AA were discussed, it was the motion of George Lynch, seconded by Sam Harp to accept the draft alignment for Class AA, including all schools who had requested to play up. Motion passed 10-0.

Discussion of Class AAA was next on the agenda. Following consideration, the bounds for Class AAA were set at 861-1220 students. There was discussion regarding many potential changes in alignment and with consideration and knowledge of the fact that Jessamine County will be opening a new school in 1996-97, the motion was made by Alvis Johnson, seconded by Sam Harp to accept and distribute the proposed Class

AAA alignment. Motion passed 9-1.

The last classification to be discussed was Class AAAAA which will include all schools with an enrollment of 1221 and above, as well as the 20 schools in Jefferson County who have requested to continue to play in Class AAAAA, a number of which would qualify for Class AAA or below. There was considerable discussion regarding Region 4 as it relates to the geographic placement of Scott County High School. Proposals have been submitted by Bryan Station, Lafayette and Bates Creek as to differing alternatives for alignment of the district. It was decided that US 60 could be used as the rough dividing line for the north and south and allow the five Lexington schools to compete in separate districts. The motion was made by Steve Fromeyer, seconded by George Lynch that the Lexington schools be divided by US 60 and that Boone County, Campbell County, George Rogers Clark, Bryan Station, Henry Clay and Scott County be placed in District 1 - Bates Creek, Lafayette, Paul Laurence Dunbar, Perry Central, North Laurel, Madison Central and Jessamine County be placed in District 2. This motion passed 10-0 with the notation from all committee members that geography was the only reason for this alignment. Following this amendment, a motion was made by George Lynch, seconded by Owen Hauk that the draft alignment, as amended, would be submitted to the Board of Control for their approval. Motion passed 10-0.

Mr. Tackett informed the committee members, echoed by Mr. Jackson, that the draft alignment will be submitted to the Football Advisory Committee of the Board of Control and the Ad Hoc Football Committee by fax as soon as available, but it is not to be released to the general public until Tuesday, October 25, 1994. A mailing to the member schools on October 21st will allow them to receive their notification of the alignment prior to its publication with any news media outlet.

Mr. Jackson thanked the committee members for their outstanding service and their time taken by the four meetings which have been held. Mr. Johnson, while expressing his thoughts that the original alignment should have been submitted to the committee prior to its release to the media, acknowledged that the media's presence at the last Board of Control meeting necessitated its release.

Committee members then discussed other topics relevant to football and its problems. Owen Hauk submitted a problem within Class AAAAA whereby a decision

to rectify a previous situation of Jefferson County schools alternating had impacted his school when a subsequent decision was made to correct it. He again expressed his concern over any exception within the play off bracketing. Mr. Fromeyer asked for support of the committee on his proposal to try to place before the Board of Control an alternative which would allow for the non-competing schools to have some form of post season playoff. Mr. Haywood and Mr. Hilton echoed the sentiment of many committee members in stating that all schools realize that geographic boundaries were the primary factor in making any alignment decision and that the committee did not factor in traditional strength, strength of schedule, history or performance on the field. Mr. McCoy thanked the committee for the opportunity of serving with them and looked forward to working with them in the future.

Mr. Tackett then summarized a few items he wished the Coaches' Association to address, including the scheduling of home football games at 7:30 PM when possible which would allow for maximum media coverage, the problems with holding the Coaches' Association meeting on site during the finals and the possibility of designating certain weeks for district competition. It was the sentiment of the committee that due to traditional scheduling obligations, the scheduling of district games was better left to the individual schools. Mandatory dates would probably cause more problems. He also requested that the Coaches' Association remind each individual school to designate the local officials' association to service the game when signing football game contracts. Mr. Hilton relayed his feeling that a blind draw for the semifinals might create additional interest in football, but was reminded that the Football Coaches' Association had considered this idea in the past several years and had been soundly defeated.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, Mr. Tackett declared the meeting adjourned at 12:15 PM. He thanked all members for their service and reminded them of the need not to release any information until the appropriate time and asked for fax numbers so information could be sent to committee members as quickly as possible.

Committee Sends Alignment To Full Board

FOOTBALL MINUTES

NOVEMBER 9, 1994

The Board of Control football committee meeting was called to order at 10 a.m., Nov. 9, 1994 by Chairman Ozz Jackson. Members present were Tasso Harris, Grant Talbott, and Frank Welch. Wendell Thomas had called earlier expressing regrets about a last minute conflict and could not make the meeting. Also present for the meeting were Business Affairs Director Julian Tackett, Board of Control member Teresa Isaac, a non-voting member of the committee, Jim Watkins, director of athletics for Jefferson County Schools, and KHSAA staff members Ken Tippett and Brooks Downing.

The first agenda item was to review the minutes of the football coaches' committee. Mr. Jackson detailed the minutes of the committee meeting of Oct. 19, alignment considerations and other issues related to football. The committee was formed to consider the 1995 realignment, but this committee will remain intact to advise on playoff issues and other concerns of the KHSAA football program. Three items were noted in the minutes of the meeting of the coaches committee. First, by a 7-3 vote, the committee had recommended to the Board's football committee that 100% of all special education students be counted when considering enrollment. The second was a motion that was approved 10-0 that schools continue to be allowed to play up. The third discussion regarded the cross-bracketing possibility in the semifinal games be denied and that straight-bracketing be utilized in all classes. The coaches had recommended the change by a 10-0 vote.

The second item of discussion was enrollment counting for non-ninth-grade schools. Mr. Tackett informed the committee that through the process, it had been discovered that there were six schools that did not have freshman in the same building, but had ninth-graders participating in their football program from a single feeding middle school and that following the draft alignment, these ninth-graders had been factored into the enrollment for East Carter, Central Hardin, Henderson County, Lewis County, Russell County, and West Carter. Tasso Harris moved, seconded by Frank Welch, that these enrollment numbers be adjusted to where all KHSAA member schools were classified on the same number of grades. Motion carried 4-0.

A lengthy discussion then ensued regarding the counting of special education students. Mr. Tackett advised the Committee that the Department of Education personnel had recommended counting 50% of the special education students due to the varied nature of reporting. However, he also reported that the coaches' committee had recommended 7-3 that 100% of special education students count. After considerable debate and discussion, it was the motion of Grant Talbott, seconded by Tasso Harris, that 100% of special education students count to remove any inconsistencies in the classification numbers. This motion passed by a vote of 4-0.

The next item on the agenda was the playoff format particularly for the semifinal rounds and all rounds of the playoffs as it relates to the coaches' recommendation that all bracketing be straight. It was a discussion of the committee, followed by a motion by Frank Welch with a second from Grant Talbott, that Jefferson County, Regions II and III of Class AAAA, continue to cross bracket in alternate years for their playoff games. This decision would have little impact on the rest of the state and staff was directed to work out the site problems which may have resulted for the cross-bracketing. The motion passed 4-0. All other classes and all other regions will remain as they are in the 1994-95 KHSAA football tournament rules for postseason brackets.

The proposed alignment was then presented as an item of discussion. The first action by the committee was to resolve the issue of schools playing up to a higher classification. It was a motion of Tasso Harris, seconded by Frank Welch, that tournament rule C (1) in the KHSAA Handbook not be altered, and that schools be allowed to play up to a different classification upon voluntary request of the principal of the school in an even-numbered year to go in effect for the next odd-numbered season. It was noted that this rule does require schools to remain in the higher classification for four full years. The motion carried.

The alignment was then presented and specific issues addressed from the draft. The alignment, which was attached to the minutes, shows only a handful of changes from the draft presented. In Class AA, Washington County's request to move from Region 3, District 1 to Region 2, District 2 was approved. In Class AAA, Clay County moves from Region 4, District 1 to Region 4, District 2 while

Johnson Central moves from Region 4, District 2 to Region 3, District 2. This allows for a balancing of the districts and answers a geographic concern by a couple of the member schools.

In Class AAAA, the proposal as submitted was amended to place Lafayette High School from Region 4, District 2 to Region 4, District 1 and move George Rogers Clark from Region 4, District 1 to Region 4, District 2. After these amendments were discussed, a motion was made by Frank Welch, seconded by Grant Talbott that the alignment as amended be approved and recommended to the full Board for adoption at its meeting on Dec. 3. The motion passed 4-0.

The next item was a consideration of what could be done for schools wanting to appeal. It was the consensus of the committee and a vote of 4-0 on a motion by Tasso Harris, seconded by Grant Talbott, that the football alignment adoption be an agenda item for the Board in December and no specific provisions be made for schools desiring to appeal. It was noted by the committee that schools have had ample opportunity to utilize the process for concerns to be addressed. It was also a consensus of the committee that many of the requests had been granted and that the process had been very successful.

There was a standing item in the football committee regarding a survey on 8-man football that was deferred until adoption of alignment. Tasso Harris moved, seconded by Ozz Jackson, that the survey be done of schools that are not playing football to determine their interest in 8-man football. This motion passed for 4-0.

A proposal, presented by Steve Frommeyer of Eminence High School, was then discussed to allow for an amendment of limitation of seasons to allow schools not competing for the district championship to play an additional football game following the end of the regular season. After considerable discussion including assertions that this was not feasible, it was Grant Talbott's motion, seconded by Frank Welch, that the request be denied.

Revenue sharing was then discussed as it relates to postseason play and as it relates to expenses paid to teams during playoff travel. While taking no formal action, the committee directed staff to continue development of a manual for football playoff games and to address particular concerns of the finan-

D.C. Coach Tees It Up For Care Award

COACHES CARE AWARD

CHICAGO, Ill. -- Willie Stewart is the head football coach at Anacostia High School in Washington, D.C., and a beacon of hope for many of the young men who play for him. "I use football as an educational backdrop for life," explained Stewart, a marketing teacher and graduate of Elizabeth City State College in North Carolina. "Life has many ups and downs. But the bottom line is that you have to learn as much as you can from your experiences in life, whether they're positive or negative."

Many of Stewart's athletes have taken his advice. Three of his Anacostia graduates play professional football and

many others have received scholarships.

"It's great when players come back to Anacostia from college or the pros because it inspires our kids to work harder to emulate their success," Stewart said. "I believe that each and every one of my athletes can find success if they make the commitment athletically and academically."

Fighting Must Be Stopped In All KHSAA Games

I want to share a concern I have had for some time at the high school level. It involves the issue of sportsmanship -- fighting in particular. There is no one more concerned about the adverse direction our games of basketball, football, soccer, etc. is taking than I.

There is no place in athletics for fighting, taunting, baiting, etc., and quite frankly, I am of the growing opinion that if it is to be stopped -- our officials are the ones who must do it. I would say 99% of our coaches also want it stopped.

I would recommend to all the officials to take control and have the courage to enforce our sportsmanship rule. I would hasten to add, as a former official, that your problems might be diminished if the tone for your control is established early in the game. Sometimes, it is too late, before we decide to regain the uncontrollable.

In addition, a growing problem is that we all too often want to solve these problems by eliminating or ejecting everyone in sight. As an official, you are paid to perform the job and your job is to protect the player trying to protect themselves as well as punish the individual who pursues a fight. It does not stand to reason that a player must allow himself to be mutilated in order to avoid being thrown out of a game for fighting.

Be alert and observant and punish those who instigate fights and avoid ejecting those who are trying to do everything short of losing their life to avoid it. Review the rules and their significant impact on a player or coach and penal-

ize those who should be penalized and protect those who are trying to avoid fights.

And don't forget to report all ejections to the KHSAA immediately!

1994-95 Rule Interpretations

SWIMMING

SITUATION #1: When a meet is timed with 3 different systems, what is the order for the system used to establish the official time?

RULING: The priority of timing systems is: 1. the automatic (touch pad) system; 2. the back-up button (semi-automatic) system; and 3. the stopwatch (manual) system. (2-7-8)

SITUATION #2: The number of exhibition divers is limited so that the total complement of divers does not exceed the number of swimming lanes in the pool

RULING: Correct procedure.

COMMENT: Allowing more than the designated number of divers may unduly extend the duration of the meet. It is appropriate to permit a full event, however, even if some are exhibition entries. (3-1-2, 3-2-1a, 9-3-1)

SITUATION #3: In a dual meet conducted in a 6-lane pool, Team A finishes 1-2-3 and Team B finishes 4-5-6 in the 200 freestyle relay. Team A receives 12 points and Team B scores 2 points.

RULING: Correct procedure.

COMMENT: A team may only score 2 places in the relay events. Therefore Team B shall receive the third-place point although it finished fourth. (3-1-2 Note, 7-1-2a)

SITUATION #4: In a championship meet the coach enters a swimmer in two individual events and lists the same swimmer for all three relays. As the meet progresses the swimmer swims two individual events and the first two relays including the 200 freestyle relay. The 200 freestyle relay does not advance to the finals so the coach enters the same swimmer in the 400 freestyle relay.

RULING: Illegal. The 400 freestyle relay team is disqualified.

COMMENT: The fact that the swimmer competes in four preliminary events limits participation in finals to those four events. (3-2-1 2)

SITUATION #5: In a championship meet Teams A and B both have eight names listed on all three relay cards. There is a tie between Teams A and B after the medley relay for sixth place. The teams report for a swim off and Team A has the same four names on the swim-off event entry card but Team B has substituted two other swimmers from their relay card.

RULING: Legal. **COMMENT:** All six swimmers Team B used in the swim-off are charged with an event. (3-2-2, 5-4-5)

SITUATION #6: Several team members have permanent or temporary body mark-

ings perceived by the officials to be offensive. Referee directs such markings be removed or covered.

RULING: Correct Procedure. (3-3-4, Points of Emphasis)

SITUATION #7: A swimmer reports to the blocks wearing an ankle brace to prevent further injury during competition. The referee permits the swimmer to compete.

RULING: Correct procedure. (3-3-2)

SITUATION #8: A handicapped swimmer is unable to perform a stroke properly but is not disqualified and is allowed to score points in the event

RULING: Incorrect procedure.

COMMENT: All swimmers must conform to all stroke and kick requirements. The only exceptions made for handicapped competitors are stated in rules 3-3-3 and 8-1-1

SITUATION #9: An exhibition swimmer violates the turn rule. The swimmer is disqualified by the referee.

RULING: Correct procedure.

COMMENT: Exhibition swimmers are officially entered swimmers. They are charged with events and are subject to all rules except they cannot score points. (3-4-Pen 1)

SITUATION #10: Swimmer A is listed on all three relays. During prelims he swims the medley relay, 100 freestyle and 100 breaststroke. During finals he swims the medley relay and 100 freestyle. After competition of the 100 freestyle (all swimmers are finished) he re-enters the water without permission. Swimmer A is disqualified from the next scheduled event.

RULING: Correct procedure. **COMMENT:** If the coach designates Swimmer A to compete in 200 freestyle relay, the relay will be disqualified as the next scheduled event. All relay (200 freestyle relay) swimmers will be charged with an event. If the coach elects not to have Swimmer A compete in that relay, Swimmer A would be disqualified from the 100 breaststroke as the next scheduled event. The swimmer would then be eligible to be used in the final 400 freestyle relay (3-5-2, 5)

SITUATION #11: The starting system has recall provisions in the form of an underwater sound system (10 feet from blocks) and blinking underwater lights 40 feet from the end wall.

RULING: Legal. (4-2-2, 3)

SITUATION #12: A timed finals meet has been seeded with 3 swimmers in the first heat. Prior to the start of the race, Swimmer A in the first heat declares a false start to the referee. The referee accepts the declared false start but does not have the heat reseeded.

RULING: Correct procedure. (5-3-5)

SITUATION #13: A championship meet is conducted using timed finals rather than prelims and finals.

RULING: Legal.

COMMENT: Choice of meet format rests with meet management. Use of the timed finals format should not be used in combination with qualifying heats in the same meet. (5-3-6, 7)

SITUATION #14: There is a tie for sixth place after preliminaries. Six places are being scored in an 8-lane pool. The referee rules a swim-off will be accomplished by both swimmers swimming the "finals" heat in lanes 6 and 7. Of these two swimmers the one placing ahead of the other will place in the top 6 at the place earned, the other swimmer will place in the consolation (7-12) at placed earned

RULING: Permitted procedure. **COMMENT:** Eliminates the need for swimmers to swim twice. (5-4-5)

SITUATION #15: There is a false start and a swimmer from Team A jumps into the water.

RULING: The swimmer who jumped into the water is disqualified from the remainder of meet. The referee may elect not to disqualify Team A's entries in this event but is not required to do so. **COMMENT:** Jumping in on top or in front of swimmers is a dangerous practice. (8-1-3, 4)

SITUATION #16: As a backstroke initiates a turn, he/she rotates past the vertical toward the breast and glides into a flip turn.

RULING: Illegal; disqualification.

COMMENT: After the shoulders rotate past the vertical toward the breast, an immediate single or simultaneous double-arm pull must be used to initiate the turn. Thereafter, kicking or gliding is permitted into the wall. (8-2-1 e)

SITUATION #17: In the individual medley the swimmer uses the backstroke "roll-over" turn to change from backstroke to breaststroke but comes off the wall less than 90 degrees toward breast when feet leave the wall.

RULING: Although individual medley is considered to be all one race and the turn rules apply, the swimmer is disqualified for not being in proper body position when leaving the wall. (8-2-2)

SITUATION #18: A swimmer in the 100 butterfly enters the water on the start keeping arms stretched out in front with shoulders level. The swimmer performs only the butterfly kick the entire length of the pool. The swimmer is not disqualified.

RULING: Correct procedure.

COMMENT: A stroke cycle for the butterfly is not defined. (8-2-3)



SITUATION #19: The fourth swimmer in the medley relay executes a flip turn, pushes off the wall and kicks several yards while still on the back. The swimmer then rotates onto the breast and completes the race.

RULING: Illegal. **COMMENT:** Although the rule does not specify when the turn ends, the intent of the rule is to prevent the swimmer from swimming in a position other than on the breast. (8-2-5b,e)

SITUATION #20: In a triangular meet the coaches meet prior to the meet to draw for lane assignments. Team A draws 1 and 4, Team B draws 2 and 5 and Team C draws 3 and 6. The coach of Team A wants his/her divers to dive in the fifth and sixth positions.

RULING: Incorrect procedure.

COMMENT: In triangular meets, the order of divers shall correspond to the lane assignments drawn by lot. (9-2-4)

BASKETBALL

Situation 1: The calling official has reported the foul at the table and proceeds to the free throw lane area to administer the first of two free throws awarded to A1. B1 and B2 are: (a) huddling in the lane or (b) two B players are not occupying the two marked spaces next to the end line as required.

Ruling: In (a) if the huddle delays the officials' administration, Team B shall be warned and the warning reported to the scorer and recorded. If Team B had been previously warned for free throw delay, a technical foul shall be charged. In (b) Team B will be directed to occupy the required spaces. If there is delay, a technical foul shall be charged to Team B. (10-1-5c)

Situation 2: As the officials move to their dressing room at halftime, the assistant coach of Team B follows them and directs profanity at them while berating and accusing the officials of favoring the home team.

Ruling: The assistant coach is charged with a flagrant technical foul and ejected. The head coach of Team B is charged indirectly with a technical foul. The 2nd half begins with the 2 free throws. Team B has one 2nd half foul toward the bonus situation. (4-8; 10-4-1a,c)

Situation #3: During a dead ball situation, one official is beckoned to the table by the scorer. While the official is at the table, the head coach and assistant coach of Team A direct disrespectful comments at the official.

Ruling: The assistant coach is charged with a technical foul. The head coach is charged with one direct and one indirect technical foul. The direct technical is for his or her own behavior and the indirect

is for the assistant's conduct.

Team B is awarded 4 free throws, plus the ball for a division line throw-in opposite the table. (10-4-1c Pen)

Situation #4: During the 3rd quarter of play, A2: (a) delays the free throw administration by handslapping with the free thrower A1; or (b) delays the game by tossing the ball out-of-bounds after being charged with a player control foul.

Ruling: While both situations involve "delay," they are administered/penalized differently. In (a) Team A is warned for delaying the free throw via contact with the free thrower. In (b) A2 is charged with a technical foul for delay. (10-1-5c; 10-3-7a)

Situation #5: A1 has been fouled and is awarded 2 free throws. A1 enters the free throw semicircle. A2 and A3 huddle in the lane while the calling/administering official: (a) is reporting the foul at the table; or (b) is proceeding to the lane area after completing the report; or (c) has the ball and is ready to administer the first free throw.

Ruling: There has been no delay of the free throw in (a) and (b). However, in (c) Team A is warned for free throw delay. If Team A had been warned previously, a technical foul shall be charged. (10-1-5c)

Situation #6: The score is tied when A1 is fouled in the act of shooting and the try is unsuccessful. Playing time for the 4th quarter expires while the ball is in flight. No players are allowed along the lane. A1's first free throw attempt is successful. Immediately following the made free throw: (a) the occupants of the Team A bench rush onto the court and a mini celebration takes place; or (b) a couple of Team A substitutes momentarily step onto the court, but immediately return. **Ruling:** In (a) a technical foul is charged. The two free throws will be attempted after A1's second attempt. The results of the free throws will determine which team wins or whether an extra period is required. In (b) no penalty as the spontaneous reaction and confusion may result in bench personnel inadvertently stepping onto the court. (5-6-4; 10-4-2) **Comment:** The game did not end when A1 made the first free throw as there are no rules or provisions which allow setting aside an awarded free throw. The coach is responsible for and is expected to control the bench area until the game

is over and the final score has been approved. This is true even in the type of situation described.

Situation #7: Thrower A1 inbounds the ball to A2 and immediately receives a return pass. A1 has: (a) both feet off the floor after jumping from out-of-bounds; or (b) one foot touching inbounds and one out-of-bounds; or (c) one foot is off the floor and the other touching inbounds when he or she catches the pass.

Ruling: In (a) and (b) it is a violation by A1 for causing the ball to be out-of-bounds. In (c) A1 is inbounds and play continues. (4-33; 7-1-2)

Situation #8: Team A is awarded a throw-in near the division line. The administering official by mistake puts the ball at B1's disposal. B1 completes the throw-in and Team B subsequently scores a goal.

Ruling: No correction can be made for the mistake by the official. (9-6) **Comment:** A specific procedure has been adopted to correct a throw-in mistake, but it only applies if the same team throws in and scores again following a goal or made free throw by that team. The procedure does not apply in any other game situation.

Situation #9: A1 has the ball out-of-bounds for a throw-in. B1; (a) deliber-

ately jumps out-of-bounds and guards A1 without contacting A1 or the ball; or (b) reaches through the throw-in boundary plane and waves his or her hands. Ruling: A technical foul in (a) for being out-of-bounds illegally. In (b) a throw-in plane warning is issued unless Team B had already been warned. In that case, a technical foul is charged to Team B. (9-2-11; 10-1-10; 10-3-4) Comment: In situations with the clock running and 5 or less seconds left in the game, a throw-in plane violation should be ignored if its only purpose is to stop the clock. However, if the tactic in any way interferes with the thrower's efforts to make a throw-in, a technical foul for delay shall be called even though no previous warning had been issued. In this situation, if the official stopped the clock and issued a warning, it would allow Team B to benefit from the tactic.

Situation #10: While A1 is dribbling the ball from A's backcourt to frontcourt, A2 and A3 begin fighting. Before order is restored, both players have punched each other and have wrestled on the floor in addition to using profanity in verbal abuse.

Ruling: Both A2 and A3 are charged with flagrant technical fouls and are disqualified. Team B is awarded 4 free throws and the ball for a throw-in. Two team fouls are added to Team A's total to reach the bonus. The fighting and unsportsmanlike conduct cannot be ignored just because it involved teammates instead of opponents. (2-3)

Situation #11: A1 is advancing the ball in A's backcourt and lobs a pass to A2 near the division line. B1 leaps from B's frontcourt intercepts the pass and lands in B's backcourt.

Ruling: A backcourt violation by B1. (9-9)

Situation #12: The game clock shows 3/10 of a second to play in the 4th quarter. The score is tied and Team A has a throw-in in A's frontcourt near the division line. A1 lobs the ball to A2 near A's basket. A2: (a) taps the ball; or (b) catches it in the air, turns and releases it in a try for goal. In both cases the ball leaves A2's hand(s) before the horn sounds and it enters and passes through the basket.

Ruling: Score 2 points in both (a) and (b). The time remaining is not a factor if the ball is in flight before the horn sounds and no obvious timing mistake has occurred. (2-14; 5-1)

Situation #13: A1 is dribbling in backcourt and ends the dribble, but defensive pressure prevents a pass to A2. A1 then passes the ball so it touches B1. A1 then recovers the loose ball in backcourt and dribbles again.

Ruling: No violation. When A1's pass was touched by, or touched another

player, he or she may start a new dribble. The 10-second backcourt count continues. (9-5-3)

Situation #14: A1 is fouled during an unsuccessful try and is awarded 2 free throws. During A1's successful first free throw, A2 fouls B1 along the lane. Team B is not in the bonus. The lane is cleared for A1's 2nd attempt. A1 then violates by having a foot through the free throw line plane prematurely.

Ruling: The free throw violation by A1 cancels the 2nd attempt. Since Team B is not in the bonus, it results in a designated spot throw-in from the nearest spot out-of-bounds from where A2's foul occurred. Team B may not run the end line as the last free throw was unsuccessful. (7-5-7; 9-1-7)

Situation #15: Team A has just scored a goal. The ball is bouncing close to the end line when: (a) A1 calls for a time-out; or (b) A1 contacts B1.

Ruling: In order to rule accurately, it depends on whether the bouncing ball is judged to be at the thrower's disposal. If the covering official judges it is at the thrower's disposal, he or she would start the count and the ball becomes alive. In this case, in (a) no time-out is granted and the foul in (b) penalized. If the ball is not at the thrower's disposal, the time-out is granted in (a) and the contact in (b) is ignored unless it is intentional or flagrant (4-4-7d, 6-1-2) Comment: In this situation, the covering official must give the new throw-in team a moment or two to recognize it is their ball for a throw-in and get a player into the area to pick up the ball. If the ball is near the end line, it is the throw-in team's responsibility to secure it and throw-in from anywhere out-of-bounds along the end line. The covering official shall start his or her throw-in count when it is determined the ball is available.

Situation #16: A1 is fouled by B1 while in the act of shooting and the try is successful. The administering official erroneously awards and announces 2 free throws instead of 1. A1's first attempt is unsuccessful and B1 rebounds. Play continues briefly with B1 advancing the ball before the official blows the whistle to award the 2nd free throw.

Ruling: Since A1 has attempted the merited free throw he or she was entitled to, the is no further correction to be made. Play shall continue with a throw-in by Team B at the out-of-bounds spot nearest to where play was interrupted (2-10-2)

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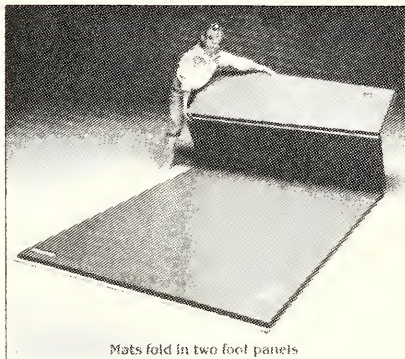

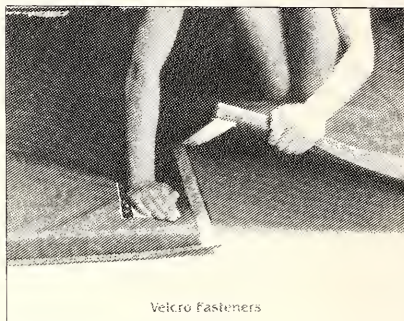


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
