From the President's Office

A player who is ineligible the first semester but who will become eligible at the close of the semester is not permitted to play in games scheduled for the last calendar week of the first semester even though all papers have been graded and the first semester has been declared officially closed before the day or hour of the game. The eligibility list for games to be played during any week is due at the close of the preceding week and only players who are eligible at the time the list is due may be placed on it. There is no authority for placing the name of an ineligible player on the list in anticipation of his becoming eligible.

Let it be resolved now, as a New Year's resolution not to be broken, that we shall report promptly all violations of the rules rather than to withhold this information until the deadline of February 15th. It is one of the embarrassing experiences of this office that there are received in February so many protests that should have been made in December and January. Protests should be made as soon as our member schools have the information to justify such action. When many protests are received at one time, it is almost impossible to give them the consideration which they should have. It requires weeks to investigate some cases.

While the Association fixes February 15th as the last date for protesting the eligibility of players for the tournaments, the Board of Control will not knowingly permit an ineligible player to participate in the basketball tournaments even though such player's eligibility is not protested before February 15th.

The rule providing that a protest can not be made after February 15th was adopted primarily for the convenience of the Board of Control. Its main purpose was to force schools to protest in time for the Board to make an adequate investigation of the charges on which the protest was based. The rule seeks to avoid hasty decisions before the tournaments but has nothing to do with the final determination of guilt. It certainly was not intended to protect schools in their violations of the rules.

To hold that schools can play ineligible men after February 15th without endangering their standing in the Association is to establish a kind of open and closed season for carelessness, indifference and outright dishonesty. Of course the Association doesn't take that ridiculous position. The eligibility rules govern all contests throughout the season, not just those up to February 15th, and the penalties to be imposed are as mandatory in March as they are in October.

The Kentucky High School Athlete has received the following letter from Mr. John G. Cramer, Manager of the Phoenix Hotel:

I do not want to close my file on the recent All-State Kentucky High School Football Game on December 3rd, for the benefit of the children in the Lexington, Kentucky, unit Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children, without writing a word to you and to Secretary Sanford as an expression of personal appreciation and gratitude to the Kentucky High School Athletic Association for their generous and kindly consideration in making the game possible.

Regardless of the net financial value of the results in dollars and cents, so much else happened in connection with it all to make me happy that I want to tell you about it.

1. The purpose of the game was truly a laudable one. It is hard to describe in dollars and cents language the pleasure of sending a healthy, normal child home from our hospital that came to us crippled and deformed a few months before.

2. The young "gentlemen" who were with us on this occasion set a new standard in group behaviour. They were as fine a lot of "future citizens" as were ever assembled in Lexington.

3. It was my privilege to assist our Chief Surgeon and Superintendent in showing them through the Shriners' Hospital and in showing them the moving pictures and X-Rays of the children, showing the progress of each child from its admission to its discharge. The various types of disabilities and deformities were explained to them by Dr. Brown so that they would know for what they had been asked to play.

I have never experienced a more deeply interested group than they were. The character and result of the game they played speaks for their whole-hearted determination to do their best.

The ladies of Oleika Temple provided approximately fifty very attractive young girls as dancing partners for the high school players at the Shriners' dance that was held on Saturday evening after the game.

The Football Executive Committee of Oleika Temple has not yet made a final statement but give encouraging reports that we are on the safe side.

In behalf of Oleika Temple, the Shriners' Hospital, and the Phoenix Hotel, please accept our sincere assurance of grateful appreciation for your kindness.

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**SANITATION IN HIGH SCHOOL
ATHLETICS**

If we are progressive administrators, and if our coaches are real educators, then we should be willing to put into practice much of our theory which we expound daily to our classes. We are willing to see that the boys who take part on our athletic teams get a square deal and give a square deal in the matter of health and safety.

Hundreds of schools the country over are providing some form of insurance for athletic injuries, and it is well that they should. Certainly such protection is desirable and they are to be commended for this protection which they are providing. However, the same persons and thousands of others continue to teach health and sanitation in the classroom throughout the day, and then toss out the common towel and pass around the water bottle at the game that night.

During the basketball season when epidemics of colds and influenza are common it is well to give special care to health practices as well as health "theory."

Last year the Illinois Athlete and some of the other Official State Bulletins carried a series of articles on this subject. One such article, **Practical Sanitation in High School Athletics** by C. O. Jackson, University of Illinois, asked school men some very pertinent questions:

1. Are medical examinations for varsity athletes required seasonally? After illness?
2. Do varsity athletes receive some nutritive food, such as cod-liver oil, orange juice, hot chocolate, or milk after each practice?
3. Is a sanitary type of floor finish used in your gym?
4. Is it cleaned daily? By accepted sanitary means?
5. Are locker and shower rooms cleaned and disinfected daily?
6. Are toilets and urinals disinfected and cleaned daily?
7. Do you provide sanitary drinking facilities in your gymnasium?
8. Do you furnish personal athletic equipment (socks, supporters, jerseys)? Are they cleaned adequately each week?
9. Do you clean gym mats frequently, using approved sanitary methods? Are flannel mat covers cleaned frequently?
10. Do you furnish clean towels daily for your athletes? Are these laundered by accepted sanitary methods?

Can you conscientiously and whole-heartedly answer "Yes" to every question? Now, you can give a loud and emphatic "NO" to the next two.

1. Do you approve of such practices as:
 - a. Exchanging personal equipment (sweat clothing, practice jerseys, socks, supporters, or helmets)?
 - b. Sharing a common water bottle, sponge, towel?
 - c. Sucking a common lemon or orange?
 - d. Spitting on the playing floor or behind wall pads?
2. Has an epidemic of boils, colds, sore throat, or athlete's foot occurred among your teams in the past two years?

"If you were able to answer all of the questions as suggested, you are to be congratulated for giving the students in your school a real opportunity to participate in sports under clean and healthful conditions. If you have skipped certain items because they worried you or because you couldn't answer them honestly, perhaps the time has come to study your entire athletic set-up and policies."

**Sportsmanship - Honor System Used
High Cagers Call Own Fouls**

This headline recently appeared over a United Press Article telling the story of an experiment in Cleveland under the direction of Floyd A. Rowe. Mr. Rowe has recently put into practice for what he thinks to be the first time in the world, what he chooses to call the "player control system." The captains of the two basketball teams have complete charge of their game and settle any controversy that may arise. Any player committing a foul raises his hand. The official whose real purpose is to interpret the rules, then blows his whistle and administers the specified penalty.

According to Mr. Rowe, both players and spectators liked this arrangement very much and both groups felt that it greatly reduced the amount of rough play, contributed to better team play, and a more satisfactory game than the old official-controlled game. Mr. Rowe believes that there is great possibility for carry-over value to the classroom. "We believe—and we are checking our theory—that the players will assume a greater sense of responsibility and become better citizens in school and in later life," he said—"This method of putting honor into athletics and of making teachers rather than policemen, of officials, may change the whole nature of sport. They intend to test the practice thoroughly in the Cleveland Schools and if it continues to prove satisfactory to carry the idea to all parts of the nation.

This sounds like a 'noble' experiment" and it should have cooperation and support of other school people. Who will be the first to try out such an idea in Kentucky? Perhaps it is not a new idea. Have you ever tried such a plan?

NEWS FROM SOME OF THE CONFERENCES

Western Kentucky Athletic Conference

The basketball program of the Western Kentucky Conference has developed slowly. For many years it was completely overshadowed by football. The first basketball championship was awarded in 1935 when Central City was declared the winner by the Dickinson System. Under the leadership of their veteran coach, George Taylor, they won their second championship in 1936. In 1937 Central City, Clay and Mayfield ended the season in a triple tie for the honors. In 1938 the Conference adopted the tournament plan for determining the champion. The Conference was divided into two parts, the East and the West. The two teams having the best record on February 1st in each section were selected to represent their part of the Conference. The tournament was held in the spacious new gymnasium of the Madisonville High School. Paducah and Murray represented the West, and Central City and Madisonville the East. Paducah won first place. The same plan will be used this year. At its annual meeting in December a committee consisting of George Taylor, Archie Riehl and J. O. Lewis was appointed to arrange for all the details of the tournament. This committee will meet about February the first to select the teams and the place of holding the meet, which will be held on Saturday, February 18th.

Conference basketball gets off to a slow start each year, due to the fact that all members do not begin practice until December the first, due to football. As the natural result the non-conference teams get off to a much better start. At the present time Owensboro and Henderson seem to be the outstanding teams of the East, while Murray and Paducah seem to be tops in the West. The Hickman Wildcats, a non-conference team, are easily the best in the Conference region at the present time.

The greatest handicap to basketball in Western Kentucky is the scarcity of competent officials. This is due largely to the fact that the Conference has not fostered basketball clinics as it has football clinics. This will be remedied in time through the functioning of the new plan adopted by the State Association of holding clinics in every part of the state.

The Suburban Conference

Although the Suburban Conference of Northern Kentucky is one of the smallest in the state it is by no means the least active. This 4-school Conference of Campbell County was formed in 1935 with some very definite purposes in mind, most of which they have been able to accomplish:

1. Provide opportunity for winning and awarding team championships.
2. To promote better sportsmanship.

3. To stimulate better and greater interest in athletics in the small high schools.
4. Give opportunity for player recognition.

Each year the Conference winner holds a banquet to which the members of the All-Conference Team and the other member coaches are invited. This has gone far toward bringing about better sportsmanship and a friendly spirit among the schools and the players. The All-Conference Team is selected from the players nominated by the coaches. In choosing the team they take into consideration

- a. Knowledge of fundamentals.
- b. Team play.
- c. Defensive ability.
- d. Offensive ability.
- e. Sportsmanship on and off the floor.

This conference has been called by the sports department of one of Northern Kentucky's Daily Papers "The most active conference in the state." Alexandria, the present leader in the basketball race, has established the enviable record of 50 victories in the past 54 games. That is a nice record in any conference.

Member schools are: Alexandria, Silver Grove, A. J. Jolly and Cold Spring.

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The Purchase Athletic Conference

This conference in the far western part of Kentucky is composed of 12 schools that emphasize basketball and track. According to Mr. O. M. Schultz, Jr., Principal of Clinton High School and Secretary-Treasurer of the Conference, the standings of the basketball teams as of January 2, 1939, are as follows:

Little Six Conference

Competition in the Little "6" is as usual very keen. Dayton with a very fast group of boys looks good at this early date, as does Lloyd of Erlanger. The Juggernauts coached by Lyman Penn and led by their sharpshooting star, Clint Henry who has averaged nearly 20 points per game, should give the Dayton Greendevils a great fight for the championship. In non-conference games the members of this conference have been making for the most part a good showing.

During the recent Holiday Season this Conference together with Newport and Simon Kenton High Schools conducted a Blind Basketball Tournament for the benefit of the Athletic Insurance Fund. The three sessions netted \$195.50 profit for the fund.

Northern Kentucky (Campbell, Kenton and Boone Counties) has 21 schools with basketball teams. Of these, 16 are in Northern Kentucky Conference; one, Newport, is a member of the All-Kentucky Conference; and 4 are members of no conference. Simon Kenton, Holy Cross, Beechwood, and Holmes of Covington are the non-conference schools.

Holmes, under their veteran coach, Bill Jones, look to have the best team in their section of the state and perhaps one of the best teams that they have had since the days of the Holmes, Ashland, Carr Creek struggles. An early season loss to Hazel Green is the only blemish on a fine record that includes overwhelming scores over Dayton and Manual of Louisville.

Newport, coached by "Blue" Foster, has another of their fine teams that may develop into Championship Calibre if they are not that already. Their only loss was a close game dropped to Blanton Collier's Paris Greyhounds, while a 50 to 20 victory over a fair Highlands team and 6 other victories mark them as the team to be watched. "Blue" Foster has had his sights trained on that state championship for several years, and 1939 will be no exception in so far as the Wildcats are concerned.

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THE COVER PICTURE

The picture on the front page is that of The duPont Manual Training High School Football Team that made a record of National Prominence during the 1938 season. Sweeping through a nine-game schedule with the speed of a hurricane and scoring a point a minute they established a record that secured for them an invitation to play New Britain for the Mythical National Championship.

Mr. L. E. (Brad) Jones, Athletic Director of Manual High, in a brief comment on the team and their season said: "During the regular season we played nine games, scoring 428 points against 38 for all opponents. In only one game did our boys fail to score forty or more points. The games we played were as follows:

Teams from 28 states applied for the invitation and all were given consideration. New Britain had a very fine team which outweighed the Manual team by approximately 15 pounds per man. Both teams played excellent football and every one who saw the game said that it was one of the very best games seen this year in either high school or college.

This was the first of these Championship Games. The Louisiana Sports Association intends to make it an annual affair. There were about 15,000 fans present for this game, many of them, including Governor Chandler, there from Kentucky to see Manual play perhaps their best game of the year."
