



From the President's Office

The two questions most frequently asked at this time of the year concern athletes who either lose or regain their eligibility at the close of the first semester. Those who have athletes who are ineligible during the first semester want to know when these athletes will become eligible. The answer is that they do not become eligible until Monday morning of the first week of the second semester. The fact that examinations have been given on Wednesday, Thursday or Friday does not make an ineligible athlete eligible before the actual beginning of the second semester. The explanation for this ruling is that the eligibility list for a game to be played during any week is due at the end of the preceding week and only players who are eligible at the time the list is due may be placed on it. In other words, there is no authority for placing the name of an ineligible athlete on an eligibility list that is due a week before the athlete will presumably become eligible.

The second question concerns the eligibility of athletes who are eligible the first semester but who will become ineligible under the 8 semester rule at the beginning of the second semester. The question is asked whether such an athlete may play in a game Friday or Saturday night of the last calendar week of the semester. The answer is yes. Since eligibility is by calender weeks, the athlete who is now in his eighth semester may play in every game scheduled during the last week of this eighth semester unless he becomes ineligible because of his age.

Both of these rulings appeared in the first volume of The Kentucky High School Athlete. They are repeated here because there are evidently a number of new coaches and principals who did not read the rulings when they were first published. The ruling probably benefits more boys than it bars. At least the correspondence in this office indicates that the number of boys losing their eligibility at the end of the first semester is greater than the number who will regain it.

At the December meeting of the Board of Control the possibility of reviving baseball as a high school sport was discussed at length with a representative of the Athletic Institute. This latter organization is operated by the athletic goods manufacturers of the U. S. A. for the promotion of athletics sports. The Institute offered to send its representative to Kentucky to assist in the promotion of baseball tourna-

ments to be held in cooperation with the professional baseball league members in Kentucky. It was reported that the managers of the several professional parks had offered to lend their facilities to the high schools and to assist in the promotional work connected with the tournaments. Mr. Sanford, the secretary of our Association, was authorized to explore the possibilities of this proposal. He will be glad to have your reaction to the suggestion that we hold baseball tournaments either in the spring of '40 or '41.

Sites for district and regional tournaments will soon be selected by our member schools. There is no desire on the part of this office to instruct the schools how their votes should be cast in this matter. However, we do believe that the best interests of our Association will be served by the selection of schools that are best prepared to take care of the tournaments. Many things should be considered. All things being equal, tournaments should be rotated in order to build up interest in all parts of the district or region. The size of the floor, the provision for dressing rooms and showers and the seating capacity of the gymnasium should certainly be considered. The accessibility of the tournament town is also very important. In general, the same type of sportsmanship which we are trying to promote in our inter-school contests should govern our votes in the selection of tournament sites.

While we are on the subject of the selection of tournament sites let it be recorded now that the Board requests all tournament managers to read very carefully the rules governing the tournaments and that particular attention be given to the sections dealing with the selection of officials and the pairing of teams. Although section 12 of the tournament rules provides that drawings for places in the district tournament may be held on Saturday two weeks before the tournament, the Board has ruled that this provision is directory rather than mandatory. The Board will not invalidate a drawing held on another date provided all schools have been notified that the drawing is to be held.

IN RETROSPECT

As Kentucky High Schools look forward with anticipation to the year 1940 and to all the successes it may bring, they may look back also with considerable pride to the achievements of 1939, now past.

Just one year ago, the January Athlete carried the story of the duPont Manual Football team, the National Interscholastic Champions. February and March brought to a close a great basketball season topped by a most successful state tournament. After 560 teams had been reduced to the 16 regional champions, Brooksville, representing Region 10, emerged with the trophy emblematic of the State Championship.

The State Track Meet, held at the University of Kentucky on May 19 and 20, saw Louisville duPont Manual overwhelm the best athletes from 35 schools with a total of 631/2 points. In piling up this margin of nearly 40 points more than Male High their closest competitor these Manual boys set up 5 new state

The State High School Golf Tournament held at the Ashland Country Club in Lexington was won by Chuck Healy of Rugby School, Louisville, while the team championship went to Anchorage High School.

In Tennis, Jack Byrd of Shelbyville took the championship by winning the final match in straight sets from J. D. Hamilton, Murray Training School, and then teamed with his brother, Ryland, to win the doubles from K. M. I., and thus make it a double championship for Shelbyville.

The 1939 football season, brought to a close by a thrilling 7-7 tie between the East-West All-Stars, witnessed the development of many excellent teams and individual stars. On another page will be found a list of the conference standings with the winning teams. These winners compare favorably with the outstanding teams of former years.

Space does not permit the recapitulation of all of the Association activities. However, it is worthy of note that football and basketball clinics have been held, officials better trained, and an Accident Benefit Plan set up to provide for the expense of treating injuries occurring in athletic contests. Truly 1939 has been a year of great progress.

"DIED AT 30; BURIED AT 60"

Maybe you think there is some mistake about this heading—people are buried two or three days after they die, not thirty years later. But you are thinking of physical death, and I have reference to something even worse-those folks who die mentally but continue to walk around until their bodies wear out.

On that basis, there are millions of dead people in the world—people of two kinds. There are those who got a little success and became satisfied, and those who got no success and became discouraged.

In either case the result is the same. The satisfied person has nothing more to fight for so he goes into a mental coma. The discouraged person has plenty to fight for but he doesn't think it worth the effort. Both are out of circulation in their busy world. They grow soft and stale. They might just as well be dead—they are dead from the neck up.

Sometimes we may think that life is pretty tough. But no matter what we think, we can't change it. Nothing worth having comes easy. The minute we start putting "t" on "can" we are licked. That's the law of the world in which we live. We must work and sweat and FIGHT to get any place—unless we do we are on the way out. We just don't count.

The year 1939 is gone. A lot of folks died in 1939 -but some of them are still walking around. They died in spirit-they surrendered to a tough world.

But WE have a new year, 1940, coming up with places to begin where others have stopped. Let it never be inscribed on our tombstones—"Died at 30, buried at 60."

NOT MUCH IS EXPECTED OF **EXECUTIVES?**

"As everybody knows...an executive has practically nothing to do...That is ... except...To decide what is to be done...to tell somebody to do it . . . to listen to reasons why it should not be done . . . why it should be done by somebody else . . . or why it should be done in a different way . . . to prepare arguments in rebuttal that shall be convincing and conclusive . .

"To follow up to see if the thing has been done to discover that it has not been done ... to inquire why it has not been done . . . to listen to excuses from the person who should have done it . . . and did not do it . . . To follow up a second time to see if the thing has been done . . . to discover . . .

"That is has been done but done incorrectly . . to point out how it should have been done . . . to conclude that as long as it has been done . . . it may as well be left as it is . . . to wonder if it is not time to get rid of a person who cannot do a thing correctly . . . to reflect that the person in fault has a wife and seven children . . . and that certainly . . .

"No other executive in the world would put up with him for another moment . . . and that . . in all probability . . . any successor would be just as bad . . . and probably worse . . . to consider how much simpler and better the thing would have been had he done it himself . . . in the first place . . . to reflect sadly that if he had done it himself . . . he would have been able to do it right . . .

"In twenty minutes . . . but that as things turned out . . he himself spent two days trying to find out why it was that it had taken somebody else three weeks to do it wrong . . . and then realize that such an idea would strike at the very foundation of the belief of all employees that . . .

"An executive had nothing to do."

Kentucky Coaches

The Kentucky High School Athletic Association has made remarkable progress in the past five years. The service it renders to the High Schools of Kentucky compares favorably with that of any State High School Association in the nation. There is no reason why our State Coaches Association can not be developed to the point where it will rank with the Coaches Association of our neighboring States.

No state has better trained or more successful coaches. We have developed football and basketball teams in Kentucky that are equal to any State. We should now develop our professional organization to the end that through united effort we may raise all athletic activities to the level they should be in Kentucky.

The Coaches Association has progressed and is continuing to do so. We need the help of every Coach in Kentncky. It is your Association. Whatever it accomplishes depends on the amount of time and effort you put into the organization.

On February first we are sending to the managers of the District Basketball Tournament a number of Coaches Registration Cards signed by the Secretary. We are asking the Managers of the District, at the time of the Tournament drawing, to collect the 1940-41 Coaches dues and give to you your registration card at that time. He is to mail the dues, name and address of the Coaches in his District to the Secretary. We believe this method will be more convenient for both the Coaches and the Secretary.

If you have any suggestions, recommendations, or proposals send them to the office of the President of the Coaches Association by the first of February in order that he may tabulate them and send a copy to the District managers by March second. On March second each District is expected to select a representative to meet with the other representatives of his Region. On March ninth the four representatives are to select a representative to represent his Region on Saturday, March 16th, at the Phoenix Hotel, Lexington, Kentucky.

We would like to have the consolation game of each District, Region and State be played under the NO JUMP RULE. WE belive the NO JUMP RULE eliminates a large percentage of the roughness and tends to make better ball handlers. Twenty-five percent of the jump balls in a game results from a jump ball. So often in a close game very little basketball is played the last two minutes, most of the time is consumed by jump balls.

The difference between the NO JUMP RULE and the present Rule is whenever there is a tie ball instead of a jump ball it is put in play out of bounds by the team that was on defense at the time the ball was tied up. Tie ball on rebound goes to the team that was on defense at the time the try for goal was made.

I offer the following suggestion in regards to our State Basketball Tournament this year: Three sessions Thursday, two sessions Friday, two sessions Saturday. Two games Thursday morning, first game 10 A.M.; three games Thursday afternoon, first game 2 P.M.; three games Thursday night, first game 7 P.M.; two games Friday afternoon, first game 2:30 P.M.; two games Friday afternoon, first game 7:30 P.M.; two games Saturday afternoon, first game 2:30 P.M.; two games Saturday afternoon, first game 7:30 P.M.; two games Saturday night, consolation game 7:30 P.M.

Five games on Thursday afternoon as it was last year does not give the management enough time to clear the floor and prepare for the night games.

I also suggest that they sell only RESERVE SEATS this year. Last year during several sessions the Gym was so crowded a large percentage of the people could not see the games on account of the people standing in the aisles and in front of the seats. Furthermore, I doubt if it is safe to have such crowds packed in the Gym as was in there the Thursday afternoon session of last year. I believe the people will be willing to pay a little more per session knowing they will not be crowded in their seats and people not standing in front of them.

What do you think of suggesting some changes in the selection of the Coaches for the All-Star Football Game? I offer this suggestion: Divide the east into four Districts, the West into four Districts, and select a Coach from each District. No Coach may be selected two consecutive years.

PROGRAMS for BASKETBALL GAMES

In an effort to make our home basketball games more interesting to the spectators, we furnish free programs containing names, numbers, etc., of the players of the two teams. This courtesy has been well received by our fans.

The program is a mimeographed sheet which is printed in the office of the local superintendent. The cost of the materials used in making same amounts to approximately thirty-five cents per game. We usually run off four hundred copies for each game.

In order to secure the data necessary for the program, we write a letter to the coach of the opposing team about one week prior to the date of the game,

requesting that he send us the names, numbers, and heights of his traveling squad and also the color of the shirts his team will use and the team's record to date. We explain that the information is needed for our program. Only in a few cases have coaches failed to cooperate. One other point of information included on the program is the classification of the player. We obtain this information from the eligibility sheet.

Fans, now, do not have to sit in the stands and wonder who Player No. 50 is or how many years No. 8 has left to play in high school. The program gives him the "dope."


