

YOUR NATIONAL OFFICERS

The National Federation legislative body is the National Council, made up of one representative from each member state. This council elects the Executive Committee consisting of seven members, each of whom is a member of his state high school association board of control.

The executive committee chooses a president and vice-president from its own membership. These two officers of the Federation are shown above.

Space does not permit the inclusion of information relative to their training and accomplishments. Both are successful school administrators and have had considerable experience in connection with the interscholastic athletic program. A few of their views are indicated by the following short quotations.

Meets And Tournaments Should Be Sanctioned

The tournament and meet sanction machinery set up by the National Federation and the member state associations is necessary and is a valuable part of the school activity program. The sanction machinery tends to minimize the commercialization of high school athletic teams through the medium of tournaments sponsored and supported by non-school groups.

Interstate and sectional contests are often given an exaggerated value. It is necessary that there be sane limitations on distant trips, on the adulation that usually accompanies such trips and on the inconveniences which are caused other departments of the school. The sanction machinery provides a system of checks and balances.

The basketball clinics for basketball officials showed gains in attendance in all but one which was Owensboro. The reason for the decline in attendance at Owensboro was because of its being scheduled on Friday night in competition with some basketball games; however, most of the officials from that region attended one of the other clinics. The aggregate attendance was higher this year than last. A large number of out of state officials attended in towns near the State's border.

Much praise is due the local managers; all serving did a swell job. Clinic managers provided adequate publicity preceding the meetings, suitable meeting places and facilities were available, players were furnished for demonstration work, and sessions began promptly. Without a doubt it is the local manager who makes a clinic of this kind successful. Each local manager is to be commended.

Each of the clinics lasted approximately two and one half hours. Two hours were spent in discussion of the rules and their application as presented in the prepared outline. The officials and coaches showed much eagerness in discussing certain play situations and interpretations. Thirty minutes were spent in actual demonstration, i. e., a short scrimmage game and then various game situations. Each clinic furnished an official for the scrimmage. The demonstration was omitted at the Louisville meeting because the discussion was held in the Kentucky Hotel.

Basketball Situations Not Definitely Covered By Rule And Subject To Interpretation By State Associations.

Rule 5-3: Third Q.: Three teammates entering simultaneously is interpreted to mean between time play is suspended and time play is resumed.

Rule 6-11: Scorers are urged to: (a) Charge time-out to player asking for it rather than to the captain; (b) Indicate an awarded free throw by a C and complete the 0 if it is not waived. An X inside will mark a successful throw. When multiple throws are awarded, a connecting bar should form a double 0-0. If first is for technical mark T above first 0.

Rule 8-6: On jump ball or throw in from out of bounds, teammates may not be in juxtaposition on restraining line or circle if opponent desires a place between them.

Rule 10-1-note: If only one official is used, he should handle the ball when it is awarded to a player from front court but he is not required to hand it to player.

Rule 13-1: (a) If captain has exercised an option, it cannot be changed unless a subsequent infraction changes conditions; (b) Don't permit choice until after first throw on a multiple throw; (c) On a multiple throw officials should always get possession after first throw.

Rule 14-7: (a) If a field goal is cancelled because of travelling, the ball should always be awarded on the side of the court; (b) Ball should also be put in play on the side of the court when a single point is cancelled. Make it clear that the score did not count.

Rule 14-7: When A1 throws ball in from out of bounds or when any bounce pass is made, it is a violation if B1 stops ball by placing a foot to one side.

In the Constitution and By-Laws of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, Rule XXVIII, section 1 D states "All registered officials will be expected to attend at least one Clinic and Rules Interpretation Meeting, to be held by the Board of Control during each football and basketball season." The following men met the above requirement:

From The President's Office

The Board has seldom seen fit to give much publicity to interschool athletic controversies, preferring to spare those involved any undue embarrassment.

Recently, however, a case was heard that is mentioned here because of its implications for other school officials, particularly tournament managers.

Immediately after the playing of the Regional Basketball Tournament at Prestonsburg last March a protest was filed against the manner in which the tournament was conducted. It was contended that after a meeting of the principals concerned in which there was unanimous agreement regarding the management of the tournament, that the tournament manager failed to carry out his instructions and did actually secure the services of officials to whom there were objections.

Investigation by the Board of Control revealed a fairly general satisfaction with the tournament but a rather violent protest against the manager's action in securing officials other than the five originally unanimously agreed upon.

After hearing the evidence presented by Mr. G. L. Ramey, Principal of Meade Memorial High School and the replies of The Prestonsburg School Officials, the Board authorized the president to write the decision. A letter was sent to Mr. Claybourne Stephens, Principal of Prestonsburg High School in which the following statement was included:

"After the Lexington meeting-the Board felt that

- 1. There was in substance an agreement as to what actually took place at the time of the drawings.
- 2. That there was not any evidence of deliberate intent to throw the tournament to anyone.
- That the officials finally selected were probably competent and did work in a manner that was generally acceptable.

However, the Board was also of the opinion that

- Mr. Hyden, who had a team in the tournament, should not have been selected as tournament manager.
- 2. When some five or six officials had been unanimously agreed upon, you or Mr. Hyden should have made much greater effort to secure them.
- 3. Mr. Hoskins and Mr. Looney should not have been employed without contacting others besides Mr. Williamson or in some way notifying them. It is particularly regrettable that you passed Mr. Ramey by without stopping to explain this procedure.

While it is recognized that the tournament rules provide for securing officials upon nomination of the competing schools, it is felt and generally agreed that the tournament manager should be guided by the unanimous agreement of the schools' representatives. When you failed to do that, you nullified the whole purpose of such group meetings and violated the spirit, if not the letter, of our rules. If the schools can not expect that their unanimous agreements will be carried out, why should they have meetings of this kind?"

The Board felt that Mr. Ramey was justified in his position and that every effort should be made to impress tournament managers with the responsibilities of conducting tournaments in accordance with the wishes of the participants.

The Board felt in this case that even though there had been a violation of the spirit of the rules that they would not be justified in suspending the Prestonsburg School from the association. The present tournament rules provide no penalty for mismanagement of a tournament due to inability, carelessness, or even deliberate intent.

Certainly when school principals get together and mutually agree on the details of their tournament they should have the right to expect the managing school to carry out those details.

Of course tournaments can not be thrown out and replayed. However, schools always have one recourse: they are not compelled to vote the tournament to a school with whose management they have been previously dissatisfied.

Tournament Managers in 1942 will be warned of their responsibilities to the other member schools for whom they are the appointed agents.

Another article on Tournament Management will appear in an early issue of "The Athlete."

Scott Succeeds Englund For Badgers

Wisconsin basketball supporters were worried this year when the Badgers faced a defense of their Big Ten and National Collegiate titles without All-America Gene Englund. But out of the ranks has come Harlo Scott to score 37 points in four games. He is second only to Badger ace Johnny Kotz in team scoring. One of eight children, Scott is a native of Platteville, Wis.

BASKETBALL STATISTICS AND EXPERIMENTATION

Each year the high schools have made a valuable contribution to the development of basketball through the collection of game statistics and through experimentation with various phases of the game. Statistics are needed so that the game of this season can be compared with last and the game in one section of the state with that in another section. Uniformity is promoted through attention to matters of this kind. Such statistics give information relative to the degree of accuracy in free throwing and in field goal attempts, relative to the number of time-outs

which are actually used in a game and relative to the number of fouls which are charged to the offense and to the defense.

Another phase of the game which lends itself to further study is that connected with the small backboard and the four-foot end space and with the amount of congestion in the area immediately in front of the backboard. It is desirable that students of the game know what effect the small backboard and the four-foot end space have on the scattering of play to the areas at the side of the backboard and in the end area. Statistical blanks have been designed so that observations along these lines may be recorded with a minimum of effort. They are available at the state office and will be sent on request to those who are interested in this work.

A number of possibilities for game improvement are outlined on page 60 of the Inter-scholastic Edition of the Basketball Rules Book, Coaches are urged to experiment with one or more of the following proposals:

- If a single free throw for a personal foul is successful, award the ball to the free thrower's team out of bounds at mid-court (same as after a technical foul).
- Paint an alley mark on each side of the free throw lane directly under the backboard and permit an extra player in the alley between the backboard and the end line.
- 3. Try various color combinations (through mutual consent of both teams) on the basket ring and supports. One possibility is to use white paint on all of the basket except the ring and leave the ring in black. There is also the possibility that if the ring were painted an orange color, it would make it stand out more prominently than when it is in black. It is worth trying.
- 4. Arrange by mutual consent to have the game end automatically when one team is 35 points ahead of the opponent. This would prevent some of the one-sided scores which result when there is no equality of competition. In most cases, such competition is not interesting and merely results in the humiliation of the opponent which is hopelessly outclassed.
- Require one of the officials to go to the Scorer's bench when a substitution is to be made and complete the substitution at the bench.

POST-SEASON AND ALL-STAR CONTESTS

The post-season and all-star epidemic returns with the same regularity as that of influenza. In some ways it is more dangerous because it often sneaks up on the school system disguised as a benefactor. As such, it appeals to a sentimental part of the public which is gullible enough to absorb that part of the argument which outlines the benefits of All-Star competition to the underprivileged boy who allegedly has not had enough opportunity in his own school schedule to play football or basketball.

Such contests are usually sponsored by individuals or organizations who claim to be

thinking only of the interests of the players. By their actions, they that those imply in charge of the school system have not used good judgment in the amount of regular schedule competition which has been provided. The benefactor groups are not satisfied with an orderly working of the school athletic program. To thoughtful people, it is evident that if the men in charge of the school system felt the need of post-season and all-star contests and of more competition of a similar nature, they could easily provide it by arranging for interstate, national international even championships. As matter of fact, it would be easy for such educa-tors to fit such a program into the South American Good Will

policy or even into a worldwide good neighbor policy. It isn't merely oversight or lack of desire to contribute to patriotic movements that causes them to refrain from such extension of the athletic program. Rather, it is because the experiences and studies in connection with these post-season contests have convinced them that the disadvantages in attempting to prolong the season for star athletes or for star teams far outweigh their few values.

In the words of one leading educator, "All- star and post-season contests are threatening to become a serious menace to a sane amateur-spirited school athletic program." Another prominent educator expresses himself as follows: "When high

school teams are dispatched to distant points to play other local champions the responsibility for drumming up sentiment for such competition usually falls upon enthusiastic and well meaning local citizens. The thing that most educators lament, and rightly, is that games 'built up' in this fashion constitute an invitation to a brand of commercialism that is harmful and are often sponsored not in the interests of the players but of the sponsors themselves. The funds used to defray the expenses of such trips could be put to far more valuable and effective use if spent upon facilities and programs for the average student who has little op-

portunity, as things go,

for athletics."

Many states have a very definite rule which limits the number of contests in a major sport to a specified number. Usually this number is such that there is no opportunity for games other than those included in the regular playing schedule. Some states also fix a definite time for the ending of each major sports season and no athlete or team is permitted to engage in an organized contest in this sport after the close of the season. These rules are based upon considerable experience and upon the considered judgment of men whose business it is to know what is good for the school program and and for the participants. Unfortunately, the trend

of the times is toward looseness in connection with amateurism. To date the high schools have avoided many of the pitfalls of this trend through their ability to enforce their state association rules. These often protect a community against itself during a season when it has a widely publicized player or a team that "can lick its weight in wildcats.". A "Wildcat" team may be a source of great satisfaction—but a wildcat post-season contest is just another cause for headaches.

The welfare of the entire educational system is somewhat dependent on the ability of educators to direct and regulate activities which are as vital and as popular as those in the athletic department.
