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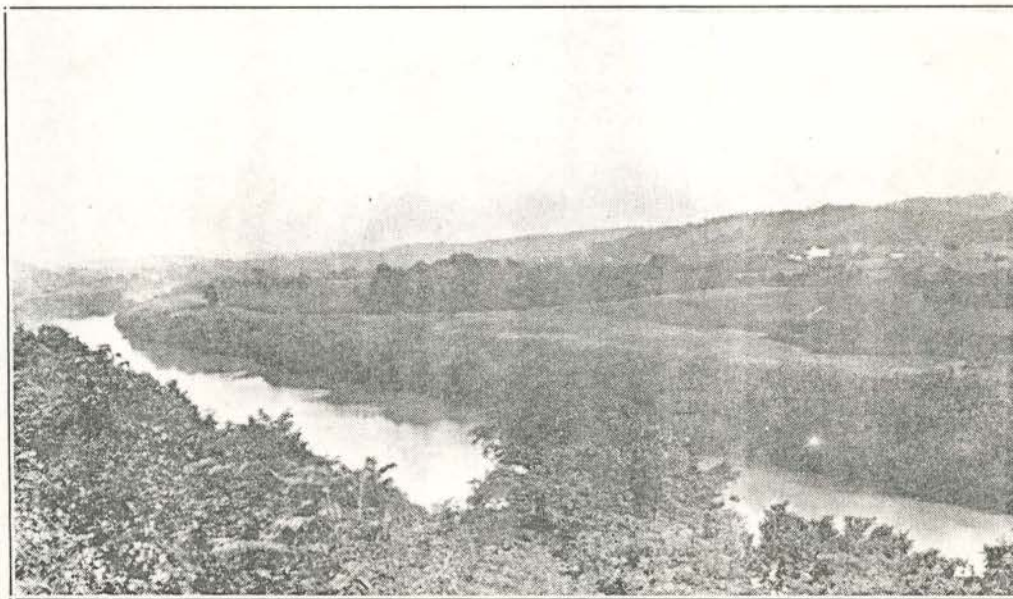
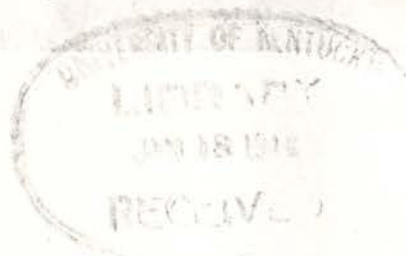

## Report of Basketball Clinic Work

In my trip over Kentucky representing the K.H. S. A. A. and conducting the 1943-44 basketball clinics, I came to realize fully what is meant by southern hospitality. It seems that most of this southern hospitality has been centralized in one state, our state of Kentucky. From the mountains to the Pennyrile and from the northernmost section to the southernmost I found coaches, officials, and school administrators to be the "Cream of the Crop" in their display of genuine friendliness, courtesy, and hospitality. One has to make this fifteen hundred mile trip over the state himself, and meet these fine school men, to really appreciate the high calibre of the men who conduct the athletic programs in the various sections of Kentucky.

The program for the clinics was constructed to accomplish three aims: (1) A sound interpretation of the basketball rules, (2) promotion of uniform officiating throughout Kentucky, (3) promotion of a better understanding between coaches and basketball officials. The average time consumed in carrying out this three-point program in the sixteen clinics was two hours and fifteen minutes. Some sessions used more time as various discussions arose in some clinics which did not in others. Only one clinic failed to run at least two hours and that was the Bowling Green session which was scheduled for 9:30 p. m., an hour and a half later than the usual time of 8 p.m. in other towns. This was so scheduled because of the fact that it was on Friday night and most officials and coaches were busy with the usual Friday night basketball games.

It was generally agreed over the state that it was not only necessary for officials to have a thorough knowledge of the rules, but that it was doubly important that they know how to apply the rules in order that a more uniform style of officiating might be accomplished all over Kentucky. All of the coaches and officials were eager to see officiating become uniform enough to permit teams from any section of the state to compete with those from sections hundreds of miles away without being handicapped by officiating which is entirely new and foreign to them. With this idea of uniformity in mind, each

clinic discussed the various inconsistencies of officiating, came to certain agreements, and made definite recommendations to officials for the accomplishment of uniform officiating in Kentucky. These recommendations and a brief summary of the discussions which caused them to be adopted follow:

- (1) Officials in different sections of the state have been using different sets of signals. Therefore, the sixteen clinics agreed that the standard set of signals shall be: (a) the open palm extended arm's length over the head toward the scorer's table, moved in a sidewise motion for time-out, (b) a chopping motion with the hand for time-in, (c) thumbs up for held ball, (d) sifting hands across each other pointed toward the floor to indicate "No Goal".
- (2) Many fouls and violations are not called promptly, or the official delays his whistle until another play has started, or sometimes the official anticipates a foul or violation and calls it before it actually occurs. The first instance is the situation generally known as the "slow whistle", whereas the second is commonly called the "quick whistle". The unanimous recommendation to officials to be sure that a foul or violation has taken place before sounding the whistle, then sound it immediately.
- (3) The technical official came in for quite a bit of discussion. Coaches and officials all over the state condemned this type. Everyone was opposed to the calling of technical fouls on the crowds for booing. It was strongly advised that school officials get their crowds under control. The coach is hereby asked to refrain from showing his emotions by jumping up from the bench when an official seemingly has made a mistake or missed a play. The crowd watches the coach, and, when he shows his displeasure, it was agreed that the crowd follows suit. The unanimous recommendation was for officials to avoid technicalities when they have no ef-

## Report of Basketball Clinic Work

fect on the game and when they are obviously unintentional. Be very careful about calling fouls on the crowd as it generally makes a bad situation worse. The responsibility for the control of crowds was placed squarely on the shoulders of the school officials.

- (4) Because officials have been a little too technical in the interpretation of the rules, it was felt that many times players are disqualified for unsportsmanlike conduct when possibly they should have been given the benefit of the doubt which may have existed in the official's mind. In the case of the loose ball, when it may seem that two players are striking each other in an attempt to gain control, or when an official may think that a player has cursed him, or when he may think that a defensive player has driven the shooter into the wall intentionally, the recommendation to officials was: In case of doubt warn the player. Disqualify him on the next offense of a similar nature.
- (5) Because held ball is called too closely in many sections of the state, and because many coaches felt that their teams were being deprived of scoring opportunities by having jump ball called when actually it was not tied up according to the rules, lengthy discussions took place in regard to defining "held ball". The rules state that held ball does not take place until two players of opposing teams have their hands so firmly on the ball that neither can gain possession without undue roughness. In order that this play might be called uniformly, and in accordance with the rules, every clinic was heartily in favor of giving either opponent engaged in the act of tying the ball an opportunity to jerk the ball from the other. This does not apply in cases where held ball is called when one player in the front court is withholding the ball from play while closely guarded, or when held ball is called when a player has the ball while prostrate on the floor and an injury might result if other players are allowed to dive for it. In these two cases, the rules are clear about the calling of held ball. The recommendation to officials was to be sure that held ball had taken place, then call it immediately.
- (6) In order to eliminate the lazy official, or the one who likes to call all of the plays from one or two spots, it was the unanimous recommendation that officials should shift their working positions as the play shifts. By this procedure, it was believed that officials would be in more favorable positions to see what is actually taking place and that better officiating would result.

The third aim of the clinics was that of the promotion of better understanding between coaches and officials. Everyone was eager to see a better relationship accomplished over Kentucky. Coaches agreed that regardless of how poor the official happened to be that there was no benefit to be derived from persecuting him since he was doing the best he could possibly do. They decided that in such cases they would endure the official for one night but that he would not be re-hired unless it was felt that he had an off-night and was competent. In any event, coaches agreed that their remarks would be confined to constructive criticism of officials' work as there was absolutely nothing to be gained from personal criticism. Out of this discussion grew the recommendation that officials and coaches should display a friendly attitude toward each other before, during, and after the game.

It was further brought out that many times coaches have requests to make of officials but fail to make them because they feel that the official will make it hard on them the next half of the game. To illustrate this the following example is used: During the first half of a game, a player of Team B was guilty of violating the three second rule in the foul lane repeatedly. The official was missing the violation. In this case, the coach wanted to call the official's attention to this error at the half but hesitated to do so feeling that the official might resent his doing so. The unanimous agreement of all of the coaches and officials was that it was wise for the official to listen to courteous remarks or requests from coaches between halves or after games. It was emphasized that if the official is asked courteously to watch for a certain foul or violation by a coach, that he watch for it, and, if it is actually taking place, that he call it, but to be careful about being baited by coaches. If, after being requested to watch for a foul or violation, it is not actually taking place, then, of course, nothing can or will be called. The coaches also wished to let all officials all over Kentucky know that they expect no apologies from them for mistakes made, as they realize that officials are human, and that in the lightning decisions which must be made, that there will be some errors of judgment. Consequently, it was recommended that officials make themselves as competent as possible and offer no apologies for the mistakes which everyone realizes are bound to occur.

In conclusion it was unanimously agreed that: A good official is one who keeps the game running smoothly with as few interruptions as possible.

### HANDBOOK CORRECTION

National Federation Secretary H. V. Porter calls attention to two errors in the Basketball Game Administration Handbook. They both occur on Page 27. In the first line of 8-5-1, the reference should be to 5c instead of 4c and in the fifth line of 8-5-2 substitute "4" for "3."



## THE BASKETBALL CLINICS

Charley Vettiner did a great job conducting the clinics. His work was splendidly organized, and it was presented in a fashion that demanded attention and maintained interest. If the many officials, coaches, and school administrators, who took advantage of the sessions, will put into practice the recommendations resulting, both officiating and conduct of games should be definitely improved.

## BASKETBALL EXAMINATION

Eligible officials will be allowed to take the National Federation basketball examination in January. Marks made on this examination will be the basic for the "approval" and "certification" of officials, who will be notified directly from the secretary's office concerning the time and place of taking the examination.

## CAVALCADE OF SPORTS

Soon after member schools of the K. H. S. A. A. receive their copies of the current issue of the magazine, each school will also receive a copy of the "Cavalcade of Sports." This material, which is a contribution to the nationwide Physical Fitness Program, is supplied by the National Federation, and is sent to those states which subscribe to the National Federation Press Service. It is sent to Kentucky principals with the compliments of the K. H. S. A. A. and the National Federation. It will be enclosed in a National Federation folder and will be sent by third-class mail.

## WHAT IS PHYSICAL FITNESS?

Let's take for a definition of physical fitness this statement made by Col. Theodore P. Bank, Chief, Athletic and Recreational Branch of the U. S. Army: "In the Army, we figure on physical fitness as freedom from disease; enough strength to do easily the heaviest tasks a soldier has to face; enough muscular endurance to be able to persist without undue fatigue through the most strenuous day; enough cardio-respiratory (heart and lung) endurance to perform easily any long-continued exertion that the

soldier is called upon to do; enough speed, agility, and flexibility to be able to handle himself effectively in tactical operations."

## SPORTS AND GAMES

Man is a fighting animal—a competitive animal. In primitive times, strength, speed, and skill were necessary to preserve life—and they are equally necessary in today's warring world. Our track and field games—the races, the jumps, the discus throw, the javelin throw, and the shot-put—come down to us from the mists of history as necessities for the stern business of War. The Greeks regarded sports as indispensable in building sound and healthy bodies. The Romans came to regard them as spectacles for entertainment, and when Rome became a "bleacher nation," the Roman empire fell.

In peace times Hitler drove all young Germans to athletic competition in preparation for the war to come.

In America, an estimated five per cent of our boys engage in athletic competition. Draw your own moral.

## WHAT IS THE VALUE OF PHYSICAL FITNESS TESTS?

The United States Army Basic Field Manual on Physical Training says: "The only way a comparison can be made between a standard to be reached and the ability of an individual or group is by tests. Tests have a very important place in any physical training program. They give the soldier an opportunity to compare his ability with that of others and, consequently, are of tremendous value in stimulating his interest and effort."

Physical fitness tests will not in themselves make an individual physically fit, but they will provide the incentive and the challenge to any one to improve his physical condition once he has the courage to match himself against the standards and is brought face to face with his deficiencies. Furthermore the opportunity to measure one's physical capacity by competing only against standards will offer much less resistance than having actually to compete against superior performers.

1. He lives clean, plays hard and for the love of the game.
