# From the Secretary's Office

# To Members Of The Kentucky High School Athletic Association

As provided in Section 1 of Article X of the Constitution, the following proposals for changes in the By-Laws and Tournament Rules, to be acted upon at the coming annual meeting, are hereby submitted to all members of the K. H. S. A. A. for their information. No amendments other than those submitted in the Secretary's April letter may be considered at the annual meeting except by a two-thirds vote of the delegates.

### PROPOSALS

I. The Board of Control proposes that the following be added as a second paragraph of the new By-Law XXXIV, passed by referendum vote of member schools last January: "Any student who has reached draft age and who has been given occupational deferment shall be ineligible during the time of such deferment to participate in high school athletics."

II. The Board of Control proposes that a new By-Law to be known as By-Law XXXV be added, to read as follows: "No member school of the K. H. S. A. A. shall engage in football practice between the dates of December 31st and August 15th, except that a school may elect to have a maximum practice period of three calendar weeks in the spring and to begin its regular fall practice

not earlier than September 1st."

III. The Board of Control proposes that the following be substituted for Tournament Rule 15: "The games of the State Basketball Touranment shall be played on a playing space 82 by 50 feet, outside dimensions."

IV. Principal Leon Cook proposes that the last clause of Tournament Rule 1 read as follows: "and a State Tournament on the third week-end in March to be located at the Armory in Louisville." The last sentence of this rule is to be eliminated.

V. Principal Leon Cook proposes that Tournament Rule 2 be changed to read as follows: "The State shall be divided into sixteen regions of four districts each." The last sentence of Tournament Rule 2 should be eliminated.

VI. Principal Roy Knight offers the following resolution: "In order that the many basketball fans throughout Kentucky who are unable to attend the State Basketball Tournament, may be able to hear a playby-play description of as many games as possible, the Board of Control is authorized to investigate the possibilities of having these games broadcast so as to reach all sections of the state, either by a strong station like WHAS or less powerful stations located in different sections of the state. It might be possible to use less powerful stations during the day and WHAS at night. After full investigation, the Board is further authorized to act as it thinks will best serve the interest of the public. However, if the members of the Board prefer not to assume responsibility for final action, they may submit the best proposition or propositions which they are able to get to the member schools in a referendum."

VII. Coach Ralph Carlisle offers the following proposal: "The coach of each of the sixteen teams that play in the state tournament shall be given a front row box seat for every session of the tournament."

VIII. Coach Ralph Carlisle proposes the following: "Each of the sixteen teams that participate in the state tournament shall receive from the K. H. S. A. A. fund sixty dollars (\$60.00) over and above expenses already assumed by the Association."







# U. S. Physical Fitness Committee Active

The National Physical Fitness Committee at its recent meeting, devoted much time to the high school fitness program. This committee has been active as a liaison between the school organizations and the various federal agencies.

RELEASE OF CRITICAL MATERIALS for the making of physical training and athletic equipment such as inflated balls, helmets, football pads, basketball goals, backboards and supporting equipment and gymnasium apparatus has been secured through conferences with the War Production Board. As an illustration of the work along this line, here is a quotation from a recent letter which was received from Chief George W. Nachtrieb of the Durable Goods Division of the Office of Civilian Requirements.

"The facts you have so clearly established are most helpful in supporting the program we have presented on athletic products. In order to carry on these most important athletic programs these products must be made available and this means having definite allotments made of this critical material. We thank you for your support."

THE SUB-COMMITTEE ON SCHOOLS and Colleges presented plans for activity during the remainder of the current school year and a long range program for the school year of 1944-5. Action along the following lines was sanctioned by the National Committee.

- Research to determine the actual effects of certain types of conditioning exercises was authorized and will be carried out in cooperation with Army and Navy authorities.
- 2. Schools and communities will be urged to cooperate with industrial firms in their attempts to provide a full physical fitness program for their employees and the larger high schools and colleges will be urged to introduce courses which will train men and women to direct physical litness and recreation programs sponsored by industry.

programs sponsored by industry.

3. Greater attention will be directed toward the women's division of the National Physical Fitness Council.

- 4. An appeal to the War Manpower Commission for aid in keeping the school physical litness programs going was authorized. This appeal includes the recommendation that the work be listed as preinduction training and that as such, it be considered one of the school activities which is an essential war activity.
- 5. A public statement relative to the great need for continued school activity along fitness lines was drafted and is being presented to those federal agencies which have some control over materials or limitations which might affect the welfare of such program in the schools.

COMMENT ON ITEM 4: The appeal for manpower aid was drawn up by a small committee made up of representatives of the American Association of Health, Physical Education and recreation, the National Physical Fitness Committee, the state departments of public instruction and the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations. The appeal was discussed with representatives of various interstate federal agencies and has been presented to the War Manpower Commission. If such appeal should be accepted, it will not mean deferment of all physical training instructors as a class but it will give local Selective Service boards definite authorization to use

judgment in preventing the elimination of the physical fitness program in any school through taking the last trained instructors before the school authorities have had adequate time to make a readjustment to insure the continuance of the fitness program.

ADMINISTRATOR PAUL V. MCNUTT addressed the group at a luncheon meeting. He commended the schools and similar organizations for organizing their physical fitness programs in a short space of time in a manner which is "little short of miraculous." He drew attention to the fact that regardless of what occurs at the war front, the war activities are certain to be on the increase for the next half year or more. For this increase for the next half year or more. For this increased activity, men and women "must be made physically fit." If the work of the National Fitness Committee and of the school departments which are cooperating can "shorten the war by even one minute all the effort that is being expended is worthwhile." He expressed the conviction that this increased attention to the need for a bishay decrease. increased attention to the need for a higher degree of physical fitness in the nation must go on and that "this is one of the best things that will come out of this war." He indicated that the values of this work are appreciated by him and that the National Committee and the organizations which are on the firing line in this work can count on every possible help from the War Manpower Commission and the Social Security Agency.

CHAIRMAN JOHN B. KELLY expressed the opinion that it is something of a national disgrace to have so many men classified as 4F. He expressed the belief that some of the "slow downs" in industry and some of the strikes which have stopped production in essential industries have resulted from nerves which are "on edge because of fatigue." If proper stamina can be built in all workers, the number of these cases will be reduced.

DR. W. P. JACOBS, President of Presbyterian College, outlined suggested fitness programs for industrial firms. In his opinion the times are now such that there is a finer spirit of cooperation between all groups that are interested in physical fitness than there has ever been before. Hundreds of industrial firms are now launching plans for a fitness program which will reach all employees. Such programs are being initiated and discussed by groups of employees and the employers are finding that it is a good investment for the firm when they help finance such a program because it increases worker efficiency and welfare.

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
