

BRECKINRIDGE HIGH SCHOOL State Champs 1946





# K.E.A. Football and Basketball Clinics

Something new has been added to K.E.A. this year with the announcement of football and basketball clinics to be sponsored by the Jefferson County Playground and Recreation Board on Saturday morning, April 13th. Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant will conduct the football clinic assisted by outstanding high school coaches who are being contacted. Coach Adolph Rupp, also of the University of Kentucky, has been contacted to serve as clinic director for the basketball clinic.

Actual demonstartions of offensive and defensive football as well as the demonstration of the fine points of basketball coaching are planned. Local high school players of the Jefferson County communities will be dressed and used in the demonstrations. A local high school gymnasium near downtown Louisville will be used for the clinic work. The exact location will be publicized the first week in April.

All Kentucky coaches desiring to have certain problems of coaching presented and taken up in the clinics are invited to write the Jefferson County Playground and Recreation Board, 402 Fiscal Court Building, Louisville, Ky., stating the particular phase of football or basketball offense or defense they would like to see presented and the clinic directors will strive to make those coaching points clear.

The Jefferson County Playground and Recreation Board cordially invites all Kentucky coaches and officials to come to the K.E.A. Clinic.

# U-K Winner of Invitational Tourney


back over a long teaching experience which started in 1920 in Anderson County after




Kentucky sportsmen. We salute Grant Jones and his great Buffalo team.


