1946-47 MEMBERSHIP DUES

Schools will soon receive statements for their 1946-47 membership dues. The blue statement form should be filled out in full, with the names of the coaches indicated for only those sports that will be maintained by the school for the current school year. The booklet should be consulted for the correct number of the district and region.

PARTICIPATION LISTS

A few schools have not filed their eligibility lists of participating players for the 1945-46 school year. These lists should be sent in to the secretary at once in order that these schools may be eligible for membership in the K.H.S.A.A. This information should be given on one of the standard eligibility blanks.

SPORTSMANSHIP RATINGS

Each year a large number of member schools and registered officials fail to send in their sportsmanship rating sheets. Because of this, many officials and schools receive no ratings at all. This is unfair to all parties concerned. It will be greatly appreciated if all schools and officials will make it a point of honor this year to send in their ratings.

RULES INTERPRETATIONS

By-Laws XVI states that "All requests for rulings and interpretations should be directed to the President and must be specific, and in all cases in which players are involved the names of such players must be given." Many times each year the secretary and other members of the Board of Control are written for eligibility interpretations. The letters are then forwarded to President Bridges. Much time will be saved if principals will keep By-Laws XVI in mind.

OFFICIALS

Fees for registered officials are \$2.00 in each sport. Application cards will be mailed to previously registered officials. New officials who wish to register should write to the secretary.

FOOTBALL CLINICS

Officials will be notified directly from the secretary's office concerning the dates and sites of the 1946 clinics for the training of football officials. These clinics will probably be held early in September.

PROTECTION FUND

The majority of the K.H.S.A.A. member schools are not taking advantage of the Protection Fund. The fees are nominal. Every high school athlete in Kentucky should have this protection. For a supply of examination cards and a full explanation of the plan, write the secretary.

The state association executives in the states of ARKANSAS, FLORIDA and TENNESSEE have reached the point where the school men of those states feel that a full-time office is necessary. Accordingly, they have chosen full-time officers who will devote their entire time to this work. In FLORIDA the veteran state association pioneer, LaFayette Golden, has been placed in charge of this work. His office will be at Gainesville. In ARKANSAS, J. M. Burnett, who has served on the State Board of Control for a number of years, will be in charge of the work and his office will be in Little Rock. In TENNESSEE, A. F. Bridges, who has been active in state association work, has established a full-time office at Trenton. Congratulations to these states are hereby extended along with best wishes for a long and successful career to Messrs. Golden, Burnett and Bridges!

Male Golfers Cop Title

Louisville Male successfully defended its high school golf crown at the K.H.S.A.A. state tournament at the Country Club course in Fort Knox.

Medalist Bob McBride of Male rounded the 54hole event in 235 for individual stroke laurels with Teammate Jack Payton only four strokes behind. Louisville St. Xavier's Jack Stemle was third with 244.

The Purple team of McBride, Payon, Ches Mc-Call and Eugene Meyer needed only 970 swings to keep the tournament trophy in Louisville, 66 less than the Male team required last year.

ST. X. SECOND

The St. X. squad was second with 1,015 and Hopkinsville third with 1,083. The trio repeated the 1945 finish.

Following the leaders were Manual with 1,092 in fourth, Bowling Green with 1,115 in fifth, Fort Knox with 1,144 in ninth, Lexington Lafayette with 1,154 in seventh, Shelbyville with 1,131 in eighth, Anchorage with 1,144 in inth, Lexington Lafayette with 1,154 in 10th, and in last place, St. Henry of Erlanger with 1,164.

McBride's 76 was the lowest single round recorded. Meyer shot a 77 while Andy Blane of Hopkinsville recorded a 78.







FOOTBALL UP-TO-DATE

FOOTBALL UP-TO-DATE represents the most recent development in the motion picture field. It puts the football rules and play situations on the screen and thus carries out the pioneering efforts which were started on a small scale in the early days of the National Federation code. The new picture is of professional quality. It is full of interesting sidelights on rules development, facts about the high school athletic organization, inspirational football traditions, refreshing humorous touches and colorful play situations, some legal and others which demonstrate infractions. continuity thread is the Football Code, its development and the part the high school athletic groups have had in keeping the game progressive and up-to-date.

The approach is scientific in that it analyzes the whole game of football and resolves it to a few fundamentals upon which the football code is built. It is science pitched to the level of the player and fan but such as to give the more technical coach or game official plenty of food for thought. Through the entire picture there is a balance of easily understood situations mixed with more technical rules decisions and thrilling playing strategy which tends to stimulate appreciation for the game and its code and foster agreement with the narrator when he says "And so, - each Friday or Saturday afternoon in season, football is king!"

This is not a picture of a football game, although individual plays are there. But the stimulating game atmosphere is plentiful—stirring band music, the whistle and drum roll at the kick-off and the gun to end a half. Fast moving college music is the background for the narrator's inspirational passages. The voice is that of the popular news commentator, Paul Harvey.

The rules book being opened to show rules headings, charts and diagrams is the background for the statement "Each school athletic department is a cauldron in which

the qualities of strength, leadership and fitness are distilled." The helmeted, padded and cleated players, "like valiant gladiators of old," swarm on the field and warm up by flexing ankle, knee and back muscles. It's "no place for a man with lumbago." A punt receiver runs a "marathon from there to here," a "sticky-fingered right end snares a pass and straight-arms and pivots his way to pay-dirt," and a "swivel-hipped galloping ghost zig-zags through right tackle." A slow motion spiral punt almost drops on the table of the National Federation Executive Committee, the men who represent 20,000 high schools. The Football Committee Editors "analyze a tough one in terms of A1, B2 and K6." The fundamentals of football are condensed to an animated diagram which shows the nature of the unit of football action which is called a down. Approximately 120 of these units make up a game.

The code fundamentals are applied on the field. It is Football Play Situations transferred to the screen. A kick-off is short and is a foul. Another goes into the receiver's end zone for a touchback. Code simplicity is stressed by broad all inclusive statements which, a few years ago, would have had to be hedged about by many complex exceptions. "A kick which goes into R's end zone becomes dead as soon as it touches there and it is a touchback. This applies to any kick whether free kick, return kick or kick from scrimmage."

"If a foul occurs during a kick-off administration is exactly the same as for a foul during any other kick, whether free kick, return kick or kick from scrimmage." In the words of the narrator, "Thanks to modern rules, it's simple as A-B-C. Well-l-l almost."

NEW NATIONAL RECORD HOLDER: One new national record in track and field was established during the spring meets. This was in the shot-put and the new record-holder is John Frank Helwig of the Mount Carmel Cathoilc School at Los Angeles, California. The new record is 59 feet, 5% inches.

HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL

HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL has been staging a comeback. Interest in the sport has greatly increased and reports for the year show a growth of about 20% in the number of schools now participating in this sport. In some states, this growth has been remarkable. Here is an excerpt from the Clarion-Ledger of Jackson, MISSISSIPPI. The editor states: "After a lapse of nearly twenty years, high school baseball has returned to Mississippi in a big way. . . . Not only did the schools who had dropped baseball return to the diamond, but many schools which had never fielded a team entered the state association-sponsored contests. . . High school baseball is indeed back, and back to stay if present indications mean anything."

In IOWA the number of participating teams (already higher than in any other state) grew to a total of approximately 600. This growth was further in evidence in their State Association-sponsored summer baseball program which attracted at least 100 teams in a summer schedule which ended with a baseball tournament in August.

The NEW YORK High School bulletin contains the following bulletin: "To bring the diamond sport back to the high schools of this area, the Niagara Area adopted a new and radically different plan for baseball competition." It involved a full summer schedule for school teams.

ILLINOIS, MINNESOTA, KENTUCKY, GEORGIA, FLORIDA and LOUISIANA report appreciable increases in the number of teams which participated in this sport during the past season. TEXAS, ARKANSAS and TENNESSEE plan a state-wide series of games for next season. WASHINGTON inaugurated a state-wide series this year. MINNESOTA set up a summer sports program in which baseball has a prominent part. The program is in its pioneering stages and many of the activities are now sponsored

in co-operation with other established groups. The plans are far enough along to indicate a significant growth during the coming season.

In MONTANA, summer baseball clinics were sponsored for the first time. In NEBRASKA, KANSAS, IOWA, SOUTH DAKOTA, ILLINOIS, NEW YORK, NEW MEXICO and OHIO, baseball was given a prominent part in summer coaching clinics.

A group of the southeastern states, including FLCRIDA, GEORGIA, MISSISSIPPI, LOUISIANA and TENNESSEE, carried the summer baseball activities through a series of contests which extended after the close of school and culminated in a tournament held at Atlanta, GEORGIA. The management encountered some difficulties in a health ruling which grew out of a polio epidemic and which prevented the FLORIDA representative from participating. They also had adverse weather and a schedule which caused early elimination of all of the nearby schools with drawing power. Despite the lack of financial returns, those who were interested in the tournament are convinced that this pioneering effort has gone a long way toward restoring healthy baseball interest in the high schools in those states.

Fifty thousand copies of the new edition of the RECODIFIED BASEBALL RULES were put to good use in study groups. Baseball motion pictures were widely distributed by the state high school associations or by agencies designated by them. Baseball publicity material was carried in all of the Federation publications.
