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

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



### Basketball How and When Introduced

On November 6th, 1861, James Naismith was born in the little village of Almonte, Ontario. After graduation from high school he decided to prepare for the ministry. In due course, he was admitted to McGill U. in Montreal where he made a high standing. Not only was he brilliant in studies, but he was prominent in football, lacrosse and other sports. Graduating from the university, he entered the Presbyterian Theological College, where his record secured for him the silver medal. At this stage Naismith decided to enter Springfield College.

In the fall of 1890, Dr. Naismith registered at the Training School of the Y. M. C. A. College at Springfield and thus was brought into close association with Dr. Luther Gulick, the head of the Physical Education Department. Dr. Gulick was never satisfied with following systems, but was always exploring the possibilities of something better. He decided that more recreative sports were necessary, especially to fill in the time when outdoor games could not be played. About the early part of December, 1891, the Physical Education students were challenged to bring in suggestions for new games which could be played indoors. The games were to be for groups of men, must be clean and free from rough play and give exercise to all parts of the body and could be played by all.

Naismith's previous experience had brought him into knowledge of outdoor games and the comparative values of such games. Combinations of various games were worked upon until he had just what he wanted. As soon as the opportunity presented itself, Dr. Naismith produced the set of rules he had drawn up and explained what he wanted to have demonstrated on the gymnasium floor. Teams of nine on each side were lined up in a gymnasium measuring about 45 x 64 feet, with a playing space about 35 x 50. The ball used at first was a soccer ball. The referee for the first contest was Dr. Naismith. Two half bushel peach baskets were used as goals and from them came the name—"Basket-ball."

The original rules as compiled by the originator are as follows:

- The ball may be thrown in any direction by one or both hands.
- The ball may be batted in any direction by one or both hands (never with the fist).
- 3. A player cannot run with the ball. The player

must throw it from the spot on which he catches it, allowance to be made for a man who catches the ball when running, if he tries to stop.

- The ball must be held by the hands; the arms or body must not be used for holding it.
- 5. No shouldering, holding, pushing, tripping, or striking in any way the person of an opponent shall be allowed; the first infringement of the rule by any player shall count as a foul; the second shall disqualify him until the next goal is made, or, if there was evident intent to injure the person, for the whole game, no substitute allowed.
- A foul is striking at the ball with the fist, violation of rules 3, 4 and such as described in rule 5.
- If either side makes three consecutive fouls it shall count a goal for the opponents (consecutive means without the opponents in the meantime making a foul).
- 8. A goal shall be made when the ball is thrown or batted from the ground into the basket and stays there, providing those defending the goal do not touch or disturb the goal. If the ball rests on the edges and the opponents move the basket, it shall count as a goal.
- 9. When the ball goes out of bounds it shall be thrown into the field of play by the person first touching it. In case of a dispute the referee shall throw it straight into the field. The thrower-in is allowed five seconds. If he holds it longer, it shall go to an opponent. If any side persists in delaying the game, the referee shall call a foul on that team.
- 10. The referee shall be the judge of the ball and shall decide when the ball is in play, in bounds, to which side it belongs, and shall keep the time. He shall decide when the goal has been made, and keep account of the goals, with any other duties that are usually performed by a referee.
- 11. The time shall be two 15 minute halves with 5 minutes rest between.
- 12. The side making the most goals in that time shall be declared the winner. In case of a draw, the game may, by mutual agreement, be continued until another goal is made.

It will be noted while the rules are changing from year to year, the principles of the game are practically what they were on that afternoon in December, 1891. The same possibilities for intense competition are still present.







# About Your Summer Athletic Program



RELATED FACTS: States such as Iowa and Minnesota have now started a fine summer athletic program. This includes a series of baseball contests sponsored by the State Association. In states such as Michigan, Wisconsin, New York and Georgia, scattered conferences sponsor such a program between teams which continue to represent their schools during the summer.

METHOD OF OPERATION: One or more members of the school athletic staff are usually retained to work with other community organizations in supervising the summer activity. When a team represents its school, it is customary to permit participation by any boy who was

eligible at the time school closed in the spring and any boy who has graduated from the eighth grade and will enter high school in the fall. The sponsor should carefully check to be sure that the program is fully in conformity with the state association regulations. In large cities, competition may be between schools in the same city. In smaller communities, nearby high schools may be grouped in a summer conference. Schedules are arranged to avoid interference with regular summer work done by players.

FEDERATION AIDS: When schools organize a summer program, various aids are available through the efforts of the National Federation and Organized Baseball.

- 1. Baseball films are available. The sponsor may choose to advertise a showing of the film in connection with any program and to charge a reasonable amount with the understanding that funds will be used to further the baseball program. These films may be secured from the sponsors' State High School Association or through the Federation. The only cost is postage and handling.
- 2. The attractive Federation edition of the Baseball Rules Book may be secured at negligible cost and the sponsor may choose to have these resold at list price with the understanding that receipts will help finance the summer program.
- 3. If clinics are planned to reach a reasonable number, an instructional team can often be secured. Ability of the Federation or the State Association to send such team depends on whether the clinic can be worked into a circuit so that a maximum number may be serviced with minimum travel and expense. If admission is charged to the clinic, receipts may be used to help finance the summer program.
- 4. Certain groups of schools are designated as an experimental unit. In this unit, if schools agree to hold their teams together for summer competition, such groups can be allotted a small fund to cover cost of baseballs, officiating and similar necessary expense for the final series of games.

FIRST STEPS: Contact neighboring schoolmen to determine the possibility of extending the school activity into the summer. Contact other community organizations so that a maximum number will be accommodated. If a schedule is arranged, contact the state and national high school offices and state your desires in connection with the aids mentioned above. Rochester, Minnesota, is an example to show what may result. That city has recently extended the contract of all of its staff to a twelve month basis. The staff is paid accordingly and they are expected to spend the summer months in the interests of the young people of the community—with proper allowances for vacation period.



# Baseball Developments

Last year there was a resurgence of interest in high school baseball.

A MISSISSIPPI newspaper states: "High school baseball has staged a comeback that has resulted in this sport sharing honors with football and track as major high school competitive sports." President Sale Lilly reports that this year has brought another 15% increase in number of schools that will play baseball. The southern states have turned to this sport as an addition to a well balanced school athletic program. Competition does not close with the ending of school in the spring but is continued in a series of summer contests.

Several leagues in the upper peninsula of MICHIGAN start a schedule before school closes in the spring and continue through the summer. The states of IOWA and MINNESOTA have taken the lead in expanding a summer program under sponsorship of the schools and this promises to be one of the most significant sports developments in the last ten years.

Reports on the recent baseball questionnaire indicate that a number of states will encourage a statewide series of contests for the first time this year. ARKANSAS is planning activity along this line. A recent issue of the TENNESSEE state association bulletin contains the following comment: "Other states report an increase in number of schools playing baseball of from 20% to 300% (Georgia). Of course, Tennessee can't compete with Georgia in number of Governors, nor in such an increase in baseball but by half trying we ought to get in the 50% class."

In states such as ILLINOIS, the rules concerning summer competition have been rather strict and have prohibited participation by school teams during the summer vacation. If any high school boy desired to participate in a summer contest, it was necessary for him to participate as an unattached individual and not as a representative of his school. At the last meeting of

the Illinois Board of Directors, it was voted to recommend an amendment to the Illinois by-laws which would remove this restriction. Such modification would permit a team to participate in the summer while representing its school and under eligibility rules slightly more lenient than those which apply during the time school is in session. In anticipation of favorable action on this liberalized rule, the larger high schools in the southern part of the state have already voted to retain one or more members of the school athletic staff through the summer months to supervise summer activities, including a baseball series which will extend through June, July and August.

In NEW YORK, prominent conferences plan to continue their summer baseball program which was started last year and which proved to be popular. Schools participate in a conference schedule which extends through the summer months. The teams are supervised by a member of the school athletic department, who is retained through the summer months and games are played at times when there is little interference with a player's summer job.


Many states are making use of the base-ball films which are made available through the efforts of the Joint Baseball Committee. Two new films are being sent to those states which have indicated a desire to set up machinery for distribution to member schools. Approximately 30 prints are being used for this purpose. These are "World Series of 1946" and "Batting Fundamentals." Each is a 16 mm. sound film which runs about thirty minutes.

The 1947 edition of the Baseball Rules books has been shipped. These will be widely distributed and used as the basis for discussion in a series of baseball meetings. The Iowa High School Association is sponsoring an all-day meeting for baseball leaders and this meeting will be followed by a series of district meetings. 
